Delegations will start over a week ahead of time, so that those from the Southwest will be in St. Louis in time to depart in a bunch from that city on a Burlington train on Thursday, September 1, leaving at 2:15 in the afternoon; and those from North and East will get to Chicago or Kansas City in time to join the bunch from St. Louis at Denver on Friday, September 2.

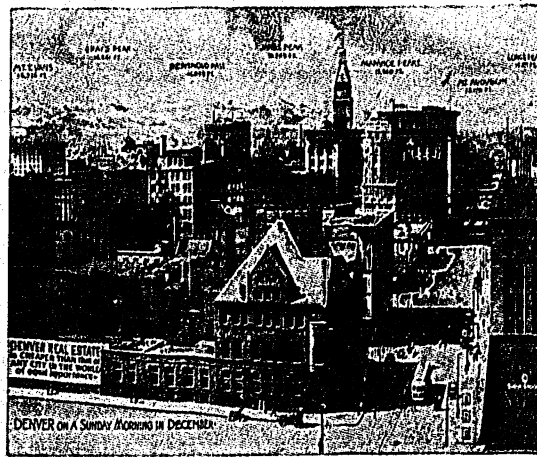

#### DOINGS AT DENVER.

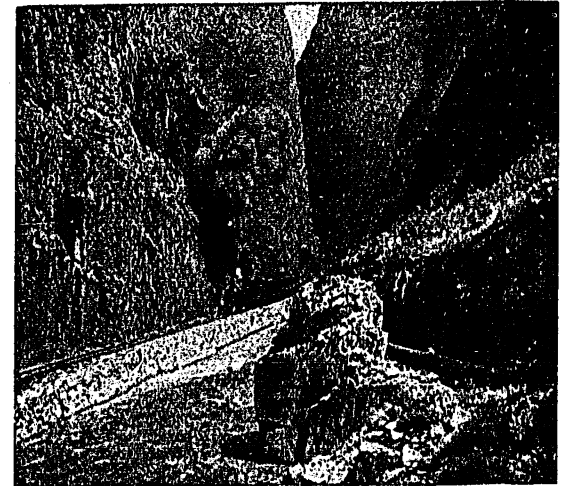
The gang arriving at Denver on the St. Louis train will have but two hours, but the Hoo-Hoo and Lumbermen will have charge of you during that time and nothing further need be said.

#### COLORADO SPRINGS.

Colorado Springs is the gateway to the Pikes Peak region. We will have a little bit of the evening there and some of the next morning. The sights will be seen. There are numerous roads—auto, steam and electric—leading from the city into the mountain country. Westward, lofty Pikes Peak looks over the city, while Chey-

enne Mountain is a close neighbor. Northwest of the town are the Garden of the Gods and Glen Eyrie.

In the city or close at hand are located: Modern Woodmen's Sanatorium, Colorado College, International Typographical Union's Printer's Home, and the State Institution for Deaf and Blind.

Manitou and its iron and soda springs, nestled at the foot of Pikes Pike, five miles from the city, is a historic little place at which the delegation will have a peep on this trip.

#### THE ROYAL GORGE.

The train leaves Colorado Springs at 10:58 Saturday morning and passes through the Royal Gorge in the afternoon.

The Royal Gorge is the narrowest and deepest portion of the Grand Canyon. On either side of the train, the walls rise almost straight up to over a height of 2,600 feet. The Gorge is so deep at some points that the stars above may be seen at mid-day. The Grand Canyon extends for ten beautiful miles along the beautiful Arkansas river.

After passing through the Royal Gorge—the most wonderful canon in the world through which a railroad passes—the train continues a gradual ascent to Buena Vista, at which point may be seen the three great Peaks, "Harvard," "Yale," and "Princeton," all over 14,000 feet in height; thence within sight of the mining city of Leadville, the highest city in the world; and over Tennessee Pass which is the Continental Divide. At the Western end of this great divide the train begins the ascent toward the Pacific Coast.

It is by this time becoming dark, and on the morrow one awakens to behold an entirely different type of mountain scenery, known to the Mormons as the "Entrance to the Promised Land." And here again another chain of mountains must be encountered and crossed, although the altitude is some three thousand feet lower than over Tennessee Pass, thence over hills and down through fertile valleys until our arrival at Salt Lake City at noon the next day.

#### SALT LAKE CITY.

Arriving at Salt Lake City, the delegation will be met by the Hoo-Hoo and Lumbermen, who will show the way for a wonderful sight-seeing trip. At the information Bureau in Temple Square, where stands the Mormon Temple, the traveler may join a party and be taken through the grounds and buildings by a guide. The tour includes a view of the interior of the Tabernacle, with

its organ, one of the largest and most beautiful-toned in the world; a brief descriptive lecture concerning the Mormons and their beliefs; a tour of the Temple grounds and an explanation of the Sea Gull Monument; concluding with a visit to the Desert Museum, with its interesting relics of the pioneers and prehistoric races. The Tabernacle has remarkable acoustic properties. A whisper or the dropping of a pin at the speakers' rostrum can be distinctly heard in any part of the spacious amphitheatre, which has a seating capacity of 8,000.

The rubber-necking over, we will go jump in the lake—that is, you know, we will mingle with the wild animals at Saltair Beach and Pavilion, quite a snobby place. We will leave Salt Lake City at about midnight, Sunday night, on the Salt Lake Route. By taking this night train the delegation will then be timed for sights almost as rare as the Royal Gorge. It will be a long trip, consuming all of Monday, as the train does not arrive at Los Angeles until 7:00 Tuesday morning.

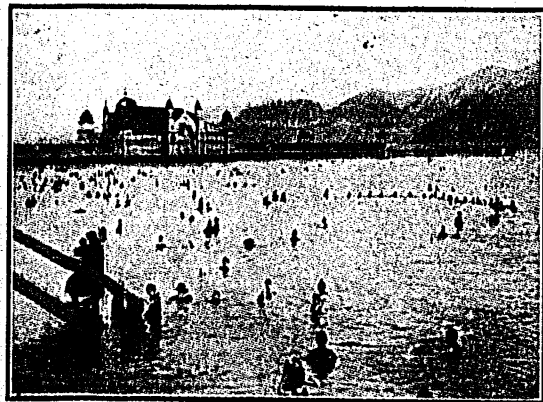
#### LOS ANGELES.

Elaborate preparations are being made at Los Angeles for entertaining the delegates. The Hoo-Hoo and Lumberman Angels will be on the job.

We can leave this city at 7:30 Tuesday evening—the day of our arrival—or on the same train the evening following and arrive at Fresno in time for the big convention.

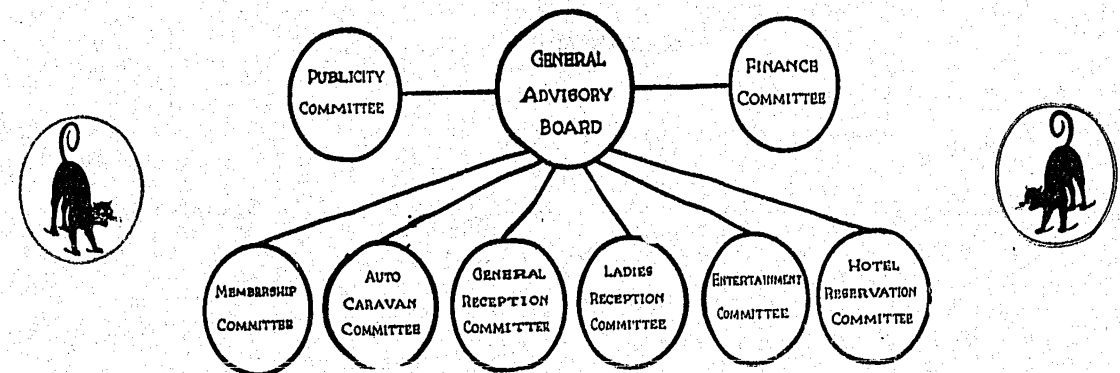

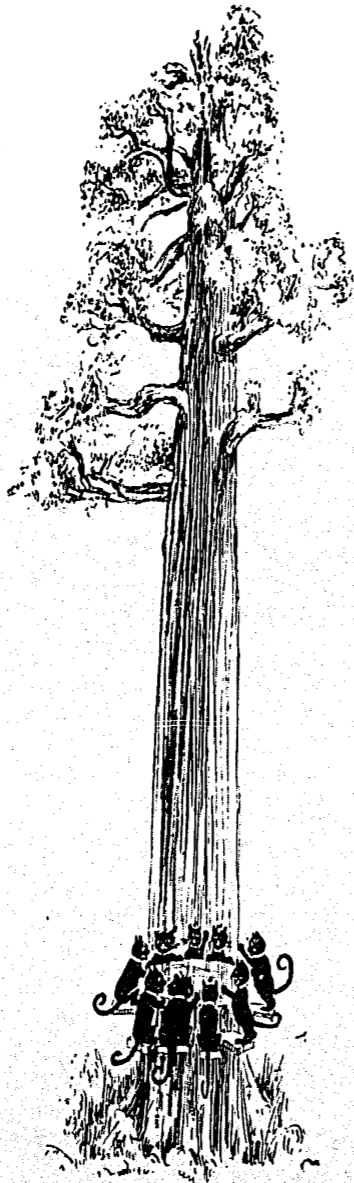

Whereas: Proper protective legislation by the Southern states and national government against forest fires, with graduated tax assessments to encourage reforestation on cut-over lands, and with state aid where reforestation is necessary on non-agricultural areas, will change this depletion of our great forests to a continually growing resource, essential to the home-building and agricultural needs of this rich section of our country;

Be it Resolved: That the Atlanta Hoo-Hoo Club thoroughly endorses the Southern Forestry Congress in their work to secure

the necessary forestry protection and encouragement from their several states, Maryland to Texas inclusive; and further:

Be it Resolved: That the Atlanta Hoo-Hoo Club pledges itself to render all the aid in its power to forward this work in the state of Georgia; and

Be it Resolved: To forward these resolutions to Hoo-Hoo headquarters with the earnest recommendation that Hoo-Hoo members throughout the country, and especially in the Southern states, give this movement their enthusiastic support;

And Be it Further Resolved: That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the officers of the Southern Forestry Congress, the Atlanta daily papers, and placed on the minutes of the Atlanta Hoo-Hoo Club.

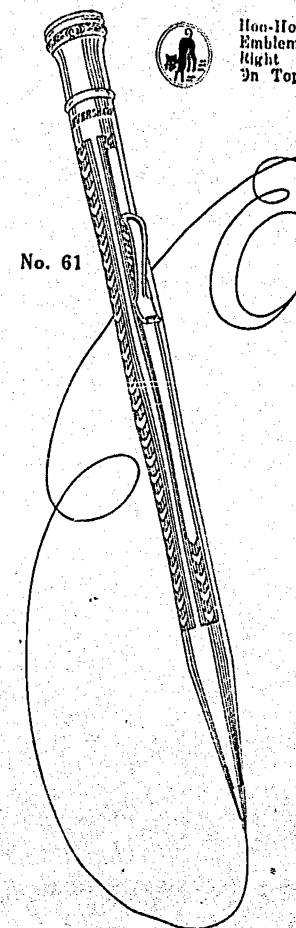
