

(They've promised no registration fee and private housing for those that want it and air fares have been lowered to as little as \$550. round trip); Should officer's and director's expense allowance be based on performance, rather than a fixed dollar amount set by the board?; Should clubs be allowed to send in proxy votes and if so, should these proxy votes be limited to the selection of a Supreme 9?; Should terms of officers be limited?; Should the Assistant Editor's convention transportation and registration fee be paid by International?; Should we establish some sort of lottery or drawing whereby convention trips are raffled? The Hobart (Tasmania, Australia) Club No. 235 conducted its first ever promotion on the occasion of World Forestry Day on March 21st, 1979, and it was conducted in our Beautiful "by mountain and sea capital city of Hobart".

A gallant group of people distributed some 1,000 Blue Gum seedlings to the public from our mall.

An information bulletin was given with each seedling which read:

This is a seedling of the species "Eucalyptus Globulus" commonly known as Tasmanian Blue Gum. On good sites it grows into a beautiful tree up to 200 feet in height and 20 feet in girth.

It is a fast growing tree and will grow about one metre in height per year.

This seedling should be planted in a site where it has room to grow. It will grow into a tree 20 to 30 feet high in a few years and then by lopping it can be kept as a lovely bushy tree for the home garden. It should be planted with the paper pot intact, as this soon rots away, allowing the roots to

The seeds of the Eucalyptus Globulus have been exported from Tasmania for many years, and now the trees are a common sight in California, Southern Europe, North Africa, South Africa and South America.

The timber from this species is very heavy and dense and it is frequently used for bridge and wharf decking as well as scantling in home construction. Last century many of the streets of London were paved with blocks of blue gum which came from Southern Tasmania forests. it is also ideal for making fine writing papers.

Tasmanian Pulp and Forest Holdings Limited are planting about 150,000 of these trees each year in our forests on the East Coast of Tasmania, Australia

So What Is A Hoo-Hoo-ETTE?

The first Hoo-Hoo-Ette Club was organized in 1951 by Miss Anne Murray, in Los Angeles, California. In April, 1963, the first convention was held in San Francisco, California and National Hoo-Hoo-Ette Club organized, comprising of the first nine clubs. Annually a two day convention is held.

The Order of Hoo-Hoo-Ette takes its pattern from the lumbermans fraternity of Hoo-Hoo; however, it is completely independent of that organization. Hoo-Hoo-Ette is now National in scope, with chapters located in Oregon, California, Arizona, and Hawaii. The initial purpose was to function as a social organization of women employed in the lumber industry and give the opportunity to get acquainted with each other -- to help ourselves in our profession by learning to play together so we may learn better to work together; to use the organization to educate and improve in their field of employment; to participate in the development of our local community through charitable contribution.

Hoo-Hoo-Ette offers a scholarship to a student in the forest industry annually. The recipient must be a third-year student and the scholarship is awarded in the basis of academic standing, financial need and dedication to the forest industry.

Hoo-Hoo-Ette makes available to its members financial aid through the National Friendship Fund during a dire emergency, employment contacts for job





It's also the location of the Hana resort district. Other Maui attractions include Iao Valley, the historic and picturesque whaling town of Lahaina and the fabulous Kaanapali and Wailea resort areas. Lahaina, Maui was the capital of the Hawaiian Kingdom until 1850 when King Kamehameha moved the capital to Honolulu.




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

"Who Can Join Hoo-Hoo"

Members sometimes run out of ideas as to where to look for new members. They'll also ask, "just who can join Hoo-Hoo?" Even though our by-laws answer these questions, more specific and up to date definitions reviewed periodically will prove helpful in signing up new members.

We all know that loggers, lumber producers, wholesalers and retailers can join. Also eligible are other members of the Forest Products Industry. This includes cabinet makers (such as the kitchen cabinet shop with 3 or 4 employees), mill men, pallet makers, millwork people, particle board people, fibreboard people (wood fiber, not cane), wood carvers, furniture makers, garden tool makers (wood handles), wood fence people, truss fabricators, panel manufacturers, pre-hung door people, glu-lam fabricators, tree surgeons, nurserymen and many other people doing something with wood as their livelihood.

The Forestry category includes U.S. Forest Service people, city & state park employees, soil service employees, private timber company employees, timber cruisers, consultants, and many other individuals holding Forestry degrees. (Many of the larger cities have Foresters.) Teachers can also be included in this category, provided they are teaching Forestry or a Forest Products type course.

Members and staff of Forest Products Associations are also eligible, as are members of the Forest Products trade press. This means that people working for the many magazines that come into your office probably join Hoo-Hoo.

Personnel involved primarily in transporting Forest Products can also join. The same holds true for those who devote their total efforts to the sale of machinery and supplies to the Forest Products Industry. A quick rule of thumb is, if he derives 51% of his income from the Forest Products Industry, he can join.

Dear Cliff:

Please enter my name as seconding the motion to eliminate the office of International Second Vice President. My comments to follow refer only to the position of International Second Vice President and do not apply to the talented, hard-working men who have held this office since its inception.

Since the office of International Second Vice President was created in 1975, I have often wondered about the NEED for this position, particularly within a small organization the size of Hoo-Hoo International. It was indeed unfortunate that the then (1975) vice president was unable to continue to become president (Snark). As Treasurer Bill Russell pointed out, since 1964 three vice presidents did not go on to higher office but in each case Hoo-Hoo international did not suffer, as highly qualified men rose to the occasion and overcame the challenge. Should an office be created to cover possible future disruptions of governing operations as just mentioned? I think not.

Secondly, let's look at the position of First International Vice President. The job functions and descriptions here are poorly defined other than taking over in emergency situations. I've held the office of International Vice President and quite frankly, felt frustrated as to the inactivity of that office. Why do we NEED to have two International V.P.'s when the need for one V.P. is required? In my opinion, the job qualifications of First International Vice President and Chairman need urgent clarification as to job function (Snark Gene - here's a good place for Permanent Membership Chairman you wrote about).

Thirdly, the argument for having a Second International Vice President is that it will give this person added experience to draw upon when he's president (Snark). Not so, if you've been this route, as I have. Your best preparation to become Snark comes with hard work as Jurisdictional Representative (Supreme 9 Member) within your home jurisdiction. If a person is successful as Jurisdictional Director, he will become a successful Snark. No amount of so-called training as Second or First International V.P. will change this basic premise.

In summary, and my opinion, the NEED for having an International Second Vice President has not been demonstrated. What is needed is a clearer job function as First International Vice President. If, and when, future job functions are too much for the First International V.P. to handle, then the NEED for having a Second International V.P. will become a supportable idea. Until that time, we have very little "NEED" for the position of Second International Vice President.

"HOW TO RAISE KITTENS"

Give them something to do during their first year in Hoo-Hoo. This will help them feel that they are a part of our organization.

Have the kitten understand that the initiation is merely the first part of his becoming a member. The second part is serving his "kittyship", much the same as a doctor serves an internship for a year or two following his graduation. During their "kittyship" a kitten can and should be asked to do certain things for the club. Examples are selling raffle tickets, writing a news release, picking up another member for his meeting and most important of all, signing up two additional members during his 'kittyship".

Put the kittens on your meeting call list. Assign members to each kitten to call for each meeting thereby affording the kitten the opportunity to meet other members in his club.

Most important of all, keep introducing yourself to new kittens so that they continue to feel important to your club. Ask a kitten to sit next to you at your next meeting. Better yet, bring a kitten to your next meeting.

Front Cover Pictures Needed

Second VP Bob Van Every has suggested we use more pictures of club activities for our front cover as we did last fall when we featured a tree planting ceremony. This can be done if the club will send an 8x10 picture taken with a good camera. Blowups of snapshots taken by Brownies or other small cameras just do not turn out well for front cover use. SUGGESTED **CLUB ACTIVITIES**

Our members have asked for an exchange of club activities. A brief outline of these activities is as

FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES -

The Vancouver B.C. Club sponsors an annual drawing that has a grand prize of \$5,000.00. Tickets to this dinner party sell for \$60.00 each with ticket sales limited to 350. The club grosses several thousands on this function each year. Specific details can be obtained by contacting the Vancouver B.C. club. They also sponsor an annual "ladies night" in October with ticket sales limited to paidup members. This latter affair is used to get members to pay their dues early. It's my understanding the club made between \$500.00 and \$1,000.00 on this ladies night function. Tickets to the ladies function sell for \$70.00 per couple and include libation and dinner. Each lady's name is posted on a board with the first drawn receiving \$100.00 and every 10th name thereafter receiving \$70.00. The grand prize at the ladies night is \$500.00 The last lady's name drawn receives the \$500.00. Side wagers between the ladies as to whose name is drawn first adds interest to the party.

Auction. An acution has made several clubs as much as \$4,000.00. Participating dealers and wholesalers donate their "cats and dogs" to the auction with the understanding that they are to receive 50% of the sale after the auction expenses have been deducted. In other words, if the auction grosses \$10,000.00 and advertising and auctioneer's expenses amount to \$2,000.00, the \$8,000.00 net is split between the club and the firms donating the material. Donated material is auctioned directly off of supplier trucks which arrange themselves in a circle at a pre-determined shopping center or other convenient location that generates a lot of traffic. Shopping centers are receptive to this type of promotion. Newspaper and radio advertising is also essential for the success of the auction.

Pin Count. In a pin count fund raising activity, a kitten or other member wearing his Hoo-Hoo pin is appointed by the president to check all members at a meeting to see that they are wearing their button. Members not wearing Hoo-Hoo identification are usually fined \$1.00 for this ommission.

Meeting Raffle. At each meeting, the club purchases a suitable door prize such as a bottle, Hoo-Hoo tie, belt buckle, etc., with the item being raffled off that night through the sale of raffle tickets. The prize can also be donated by a member

Golf Outings. Many clubs use a golf outing as a primary source of funds. Details of this can be obtained by writing the Eugene Oregon, Medford Oregon or other clubs utilizing the golf outing for

Turkey Shoot. This type of fund raising activity consists of usually shooting clay pigeons with the best shots receiving appropriate prizes of frozen turkey. Refreshments and sandwiches are usually included with the registration fee.

Turkey Trot. This function utilizes live turkeys and a pre-numbered floor area utilized for wagering purposes. Turkey droppings indicate the winning number plus the awarding of several live turkeys at the end of the evening make this function an interesting one. The N. Cascade can be contacted for further details.

50/50 raffle. 2,000 tickets are sold at \$1.00 a piece and when sale is completed, a \$1,000.00 prize is given to the winner. Sometimes the \$1,000.00 is broken down into 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes so that more members have a chance to win something. The remaining \$1,000.00 is kept by the club. The Washington D.C. Club can supply more information on this if necessary.

Hoo-Hoo Advertising. The club operations manual describes in detail our policy in selling space in the Log & Tally. Space sold by a club is subject to a commission for the club.

Local Club Advertising. Space on the club's monthly mailing or news release can be sold. The Washington D.C. Clubs sells their 37-40 spaces for \$50.00 a year each. The money derived from this income is used to defray the club's convention expenses. Special letters of interest are stuffed in their folded news letter containing the ads. Again, Washington D.C. Club will be glad to send you additional information about this.

Lumber Grading School. The Portland Oregon Club has successfully conducted 3 grading schools at a profit to the club. Again, the Portland Club will be more than happy to send you information concerning this item.

Convention Raffle. The Houston Club developed a convention raffle for the purpose of increasing attendance at their meeting. It was highly successful in 1978 in that 10 members won travel packages to the Toronto Convention. To be eligible for the final drawing, members are required to be in attendance and purchase tickets at a high percentage of the meetings. This program is highly successful and you should contact the Houston Club for final details.

Dues Collection. Operational costs of running clubs are usually met through the collection of both local and International dues. Most clubs add from \$5.00 to \$10.00 to the International dues and keep the difference for running the club. It also keeps members in good standing with International.

SERVICE RELATED ACTIVITIES -

The Sacremento Club operates a blood bank for the benefit of its members. This is easily arranged through your local Red Cross or blood bank center.

Scholarships. Several clubs offer yearly scholarships to deserving forestry students. The Fresno Club gives away a \$2,000.00 scholarship every year.

High School Woodworking Contests. More and more clubs are utilizing a high school woodworking contest as a service function for the club. Details of this can be found in the operations manual or by contacting the Spokane or Toronto Clubs.

Model Home. It's possible for a local club to work with a vocational school in the building of a model home. This can also be utilized as a fund raising activity for the club if the local lumber dealers are willing to cooperate in that fashion. Don Knecht of the Rapid City Club can furnish more information relative to this item.

Speaker's Bureau. The Spokane Club has successfully offered the services of a speaker's bureau to local grade schools, high schools and professional organizations. Forestry films and slides presented by Hoo-Hoo members enhance the interest in this work.

MISCELLANEOUS SERVICE WORK

Wooden fences erected around hospital swimming pools, picnic benches for convolescent homes, forestry signs and other wood related projects can all be successfully accomplished by clubs wanting to do these things. It usually involves some good healthy outdoor work and can result in positive publicity for the local club.

SOCIAL FUNCTIONS

An interesting drawing used as an inducement to

encourage attendance has been successfully utilized by the Northwestern Montana Club. A small donation of 50° or \$1.00 is made by each member attending a meeting. A member's name is then drawn from the club's paid membership file and if the member is in attendance, the funds collected are sent to his wife with a letter of congratulations. In the event the member is absent, the funds are carried over to the next meeting and a letter of condolence is sent to the absent member's wife advising her how much money she would have won had her husband attended the designated Hoo-Hoo meeting. Needless to say, attendance at the meeting increases in proportion to the size of the pot available.

Life memberships are also raffled off as an inducement to encourage meeting attendance. The Shasta-Cascade Club utilizes this form of raffle.

Beer-Crab feed and style show. The Spokane Club has successfully sponsored this function in early December. It offers all the beer you can drink and crab you can eat, plus chances on several evening gowns. The style show is pre-arranged with a cooperating boutique which provides models to show evening gowns, swim wear, sport clothes, dresses and other attractive women's apparel. This is a good type of meeting to bring in non-members, because it's an enjoyable occasion.

MISCELLANEOUS SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Clam bake, stag fish fry, Valentine party, Christmas party, club picnic, past president's night, race track trip and mystery night are but a few other social activities successfully put on by many clubs. The trend has been away from stag functions, even though several clubs still successfully sponsor this type of activity. Our increased membership shows that clubs with good programs and clubs that include the wives in several activities during the year, have stable membership and operate successfully year after year.

Our Hoo-Hoo promotion brochure entitled "What Makes a Club Go" should be must reading for each officer. It contains many additional helpful hints on club activities and how to run a club.







THE CLUB SCROLL

Dale Sverdsten 73618 born September 29, 1931 in Kellogg, Idaho was president of Sverdsten Logging Company of Cataldo. He was also an involved Hoo-Hoo having joined the Order at Coeur d'Alene in 1962 and serving the local club in many capacities including that of president in 1971-72.
