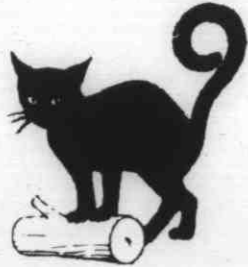

## MEMO

I told her if the Board of Directors would unanimously approve, I would accept it for her and for the memory of Gordie. The Board approved, I went on to be Snark in Gordon's place. I hope I have done what Gordon would have wanted done in Hoo-Hoo and I hope I have conducted myself as he would have done as Snark. I promised you I would do all within my capabilities to keep Hoo-Hoo the Great organization that it has been through the eighty-eight years it has been in existence. I hope that I have kept that promise, if I have not put more into Hoo-Hoo than I have taken out I would consider myself a complete failure.

I have traveled to every Jurisdiction in Hoo-Hoo land. From British Columbia to Orlando Florida; from Portland, Maine to Los Angeles, California and from Boston, Mass. to Singapore and Australia. All the gifts will be permanently displayed in my office or home. I cannot thank all the members and clubs enough, for all the hospitality and the beautiful gifts. Each one really brings back memories of the wonderful people that Betty and myself have been fortunate enough to have been with this Hoo-Hoo year. Visited with a few people that we met at our first Convention in Toronto in 1964. Fortunately for me Betty has traveled with me to keep my clothes half straight and has gotten me to every airport in time. She has handled all the reservations and schedules for all my travels.

The Board of Directors at our meeting Dec. 1, 1979 in New Orleans voted to accept the lease of the Log Cabin in Gurdon, Arkansas. The lease was signed with the City of Gurdon for \$1.00 per year for 25 years. The Board of Directors at this meeting pledged the first \$500.00 for the remodeling and re-roofing of the Museum. This was out of their pockets and not from Hoo-Hoo. All the costs will be paid by contributions from clubs and individuals. Nothing will be from Hoo-Hoo International funds. The roof is on and other remodeling is in progress. Flag poles are up and flying-the flags of the United States, Canada, Singapore, Australia and the State of Arkansas. Hopefully New Zealand will soon be added.-A beautiful sight. By Convention time it is hoped the Museum will be in top notch shape and ready to receive mementos.

We would like to request all pledges to be paid as soon as possible as the bills for the remodeling will be arriving soon and the time allotted for charter membership is drawing to a close.

## International Order of Hoo-Hoo Wood Promotion Trophy

The annual award of the Wood Promotion Trophy will be made at the Hoo-Hoo convention each year. The award is made to the Hoo-Hoo Club which, in the opinion of the judges, has made the greatest accomplishment in wood promotion activities during the previous Hoo-Hoo year. The trophy remains in the possession of the winning club during the Hoo-Hoo year. The club to whom the award is made will be responsible for delivering the trophy at the next convention.

The Snark of the Universe will appoint a special committee as judges for the award. All clubs are invited to participate.

### Rules Governing Club Trophy Award

1.) The club may submit evidence covering all wood promotion projects adopted by the club, including National Forest Products Week.

2.) The entrant club will make its presentation to the judges and the convention. Tangible evidence of the project(s) must be submitted by the club delegate, who must be conversant with the project from start to finish as he may be interviewed by the judges. This evidence may consist of newspaper clippings, photos, scrap books, samples, or display material. A slide projector will be available.

3.) Each participating club must submit a written outline of the wood promotion project(s) to contain the following: (a) a description of the project(s); (b) State the goal of the project(s); (c) Tell of the method of operation; (d) Specify the relative proportion of financial and/or manpower support from cooperating organizations; and (e) Statement of the results.

4.) DO NOT SEND CLUB CONTEST MATERIALS TO THE INTERNATIONAL HOO-HOO OFFICE. The Club delegate is responsible for all contest materials, and for providing the LOG & TALLY magazine with a complete story for publication. The delegate may ship the materials, addressed to himself, in care of the convention hotel,



marked "hold for arrival on September \_\_, 19\_\_."

5.) Decision of the judges will be final. A club is eligible to be awarded the trophy in two or more consecutive years. In the absence of an acceptable club presentation, at the discretion of the judges the trophy may be retained in the International Headquarters for one year. In addition to the trophy, certificates will be presented to the clubs placing first, second and third. No judge shall be appointed who is a member of a club making a competitive presentation.

6.) Hoo-Hoo Clubs wishing to make a presentation for the trophy

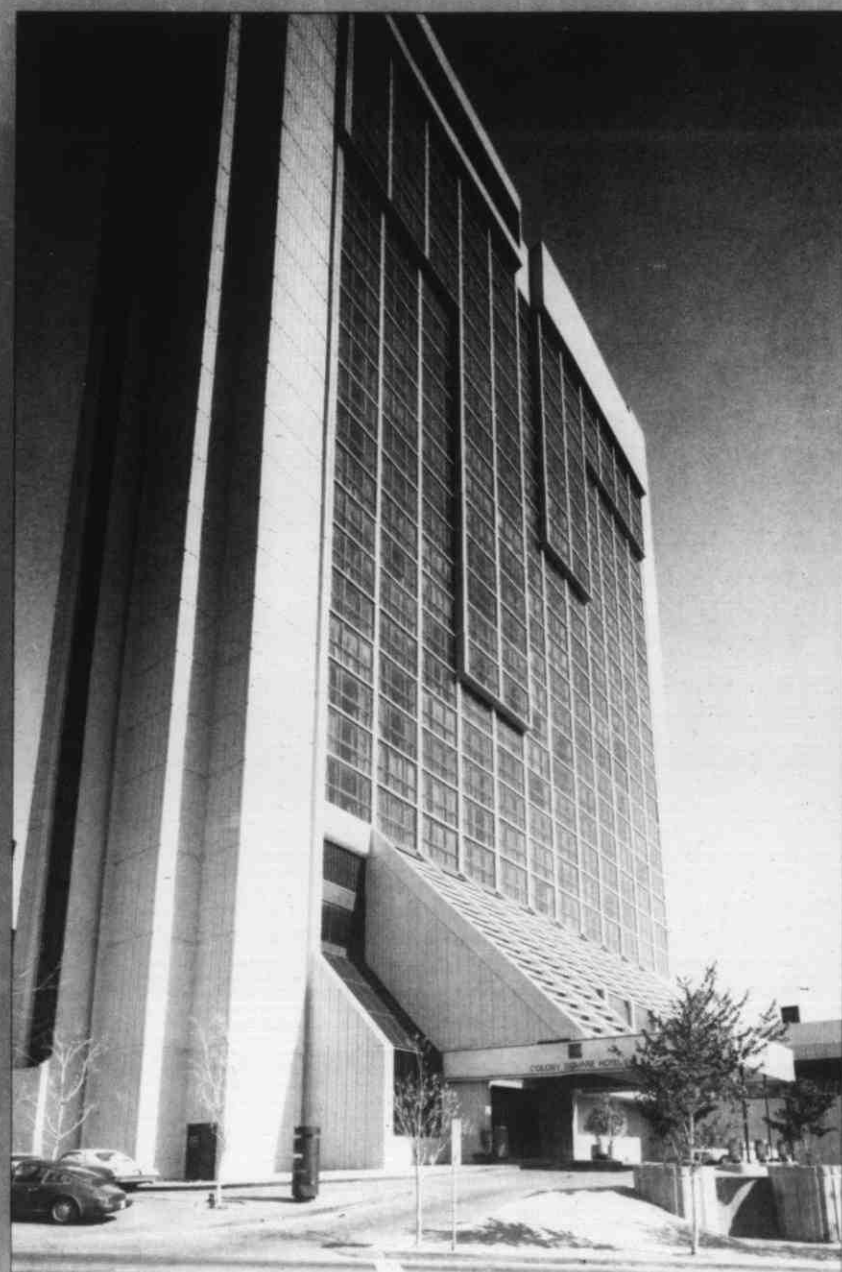
are requested to advise the International Office by letter prior to August 20th of each year.

7.) Each of the following facets of the wood promotion project shall be rated by each judge, independently of the others, on a scale of 1 thru 10 for letters G and D and 1 thru 5 for letters A, B, E, & F, 10 being the best.

- A - Accomplishment based on size of club.
- B - Involvement of members.
- C - Immediate effect on the community.
- D - Lasting effect on the community.
- E - Written presentation.
- F - Oral presentation.
