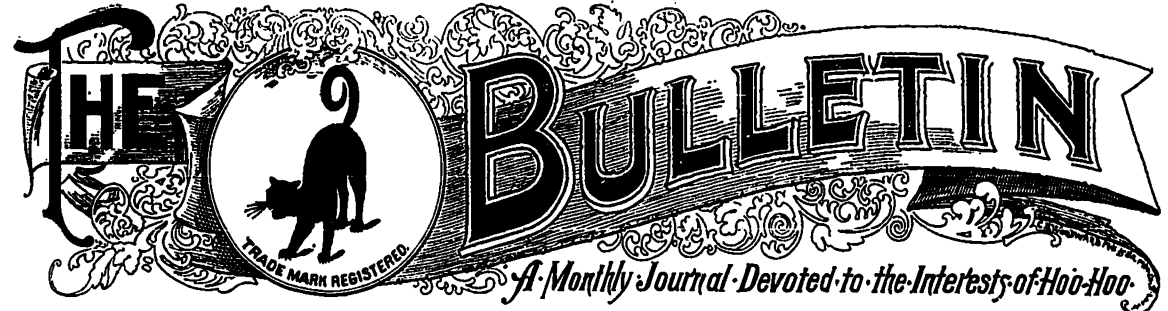

Obituary.

L. A. Shear, No. 3469.

From Pasadena, Cal., where he had gone in the vain hope of checking the progress of consumption, comes the advice of the death of Mr. L. A. Shear, on February 19th. Mr. Shear went to California in December last, and as late as February 6th he wrote the Scrivenoter's office that he was beginning to improve under the climate out there, and the chances were that he would recover.

Loren Andrew Shear was born at Newberg, N. Y., March 20, 1856. He was made a Hoo-Hoo at Minneapolis, Minn., August 5, 1895, at which time, and up to the time he became unable to work, he was a salesman for the Minneapolis Cedar Co.

The local membership at Minneapolis will arrange for his interment, as his prolonged illness had exhausted his means. He will be buried at Pasadena unless some of his relatives are heard from to the contrary.

A. A. Barth, No. 283.

Mr. A. A. Barth, No. 283, died January 20th, at South Bend, Ind., and was buried at that place January 30th.

Alphine Alexander Barth was born at South Bend, Ind., February 18, 1854. He was made a Hoo-Hoo at Minneapolis, Minn., January 24, 1893, at the celebrated "Concatenation No. 21," when sixty-four of the leading lumbermen of that city were taken in. All his business life Mr. Barth has been connected with the lumber or sash, door and blind business. He began his career as a salesman nearly twenty years ago, his first engagement being with Sanger, Rockwell & Co., of Milwaukee. Later he traveled for a time for the Paine Lumber Company, of Oshkosh, going from there to Minneapolis. He traveled a number of years for Smith & Wyman, and a year or so for the Curtis & Tale Company. His last regular work was with the Bardwell-Robinson Company. About two years ago Mr. Barth's father was taken sick and he went to South Bend to care for him. After his father's death Mr. Barth's health began to fail and nervous prostration followed, from which he never recovered, but gradually got worse until death resulted. Mr. Barth was a brother of L. L. Barth, Vice-president of the Edward Hines Lumber Company, of Chicago.

Fred. K. Gearing, No. 1116.

Mr. Fred. K. Gearing, No. 1116, died February 23d at his home at Pittsburgh, Pa. We have not as yet received full particulars of his death.

Frederick Kennet Gearing was born at Pittsburgh, Pa., December 30, 1852. He was made a Hoo-Hoo at Columbus, Ohio, January 23, 1894. All his life Mr. Gearing was more or less interested in politics. At the time of his death, and for the term of 1876-78, he was in the State Legislature. At the time of his death he was also a member of the Municipal Council of Pittsburgh. His connection with the lumber business dates from about ten years ago, when he became associated with his father, Mr. H. C. Gearing. The firm name was always H. C. Gearing, and the business conducted was wholesale and retail lumber and building material.

W. N. Culp, No. 3874.

Mr. W. N. Culp, No. 3874 of our Order, died January 31st at Mobile, Ala., of heart disease.

At the time of his death Mr. Culp was general agent of the freight and coal departments of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, with which road he had been connected for twenty-five years.

William Newton Culp was born at Harrisville, West Virginia, April 2, 1851. He was made a Hoo-Hoo at Louisville, January 22, 1896. He was a son of Amos Culp, deceased, and went to Louisville with his father in 1893, and ever after that made that city his home. He was a brother of J. M. Culp, Traffic Manager of the Southern Railroad, with headquarters in Washington, D. C. Mr. Culp's first wife was Miss Stella Jenkins, of Louisville. His second wife, who, with four children, survives him, was Miss Nela Cantrell, of Nashville.

Mr. Culp went to Mobile two weeks before his death, and was then a very sick man. He began a marked improvement very soon after his arrival, and his friends' hopes of his recovery rose high. He was thought to be much better the day before his death, and probably over-exerted himself. The end came quite suddenly the next morning. Mr. Culp's remains were carried to Louisville for interment.

Mr. Culp was very widely known as a splendid railroad man, and had friends all over the South.

V. H. Tout, No. 113.

V. H. Tout, No. 113, died Sunday, February 28, at Bebe, Ark. The only information we have is a telegram from Mr. George W. Gladding, of Memphis, announcing the fact of his death.

Virgil Homer Tout was born at Pittsborough, Ind., August 16, 1868. He became a Hoo-Hoo at Memphis, Tenn., February 11, 1892, at which time and up to the time of his death, he was traveling salesman for the Memphis branch of E. C. Atkins & Co. All his business life, with the exception of one year, when he was in the lumber business at Memphis, he was connected with the Atkins firm, either on the road or in the office.

Since he became a Hoo-Hoo Mr. Tout has been constantly on the road, covering Arkansas and Texas. Few men were more popular or had a larger acquaintance. He was a good Hoo-Hoo, and always had the interests of the Order at heart.

E. H. Myers, No. 1882.

E. H. Myers, No. 1882, died at his home in Cincinnati, Ohio, February 16th, after a painful illness of more than a year. He was the junior partner in the well-known saw mill manufacturing firm of Smith, Myers & Schmier, and one of the most popular young business men in Hoo-Hoo.

Edward Henry Myers was a native of the city of Cincinnati, being born there September 28, 1861. He became a member of this Order May 14, 1894. Mr. Myers was a self-made man, starting out as an apprentice in the machine shop of Cordesman & Egan, in 1876. He went to work for Smith, Myers & Schmier in 1882, and was admitted to partnership in 1891.

Mr. Myers was afflicted with something like Bright's disease, and, as stated, was a sufferer for more than a year. He bore up under the affliction with remarkable fortitude, and up to a few weeks ago was regularly at his desk.

Mr. Myers was one of the most devoted members Hoo-Hoo has ever had, and his personal acquaintance in the Order was very large.

The members of the Order assembled at Memphis last week appointed a committee to draft resolutions expressing regret at his untimely death in the midst of a successful business career. The resolution is as follows:

Resolved, That in the death of Mr. E. H. Myers, Hoo-Hoo suffers an irreparable loss. Mr. Myers was at all times an enthusiastic, intelligent and efficient worker in forwarding the objects of the Order. Perhaps no one in the city of Cincinnati gave more of his time and thought to the cultivation of the fraternal ideas upon which the Order is founded. While we bow our heads at the widow of an All-wise Providence, we feel the loss none the less of our friend and brother, E. H. Myers.

Timely Comments.

The following remarks in general on the subject of initiation into secret orders are written by Mr. Carl F. Drake from a recent issue of the "Southern Industrial and Lumber Review," of which he is an associate editor:

It is not necessary to go into details of what orders indulge in at initiations by way, ostensibly, of illustrating truths, but really to amuse and keep up the interest of older members; but there are feats which a fat man cannot perform which are perfectly easy to a lean and light one. There are startling phases which a sober man cannot unravel in his mind, but which are incomprehensible to another in liquor; and it is just here that the trouble comes. Incompetent masters of ceremony, in their ignorance, make grievous mistakes; while, when all assist, no consideration whatever is given. It would seem to the "Review" that an order which is based upon no deeper idea or motive than to torture and humiliate for the edification of laughing humanity any person, young or old, sick or well, brazen or modest, persons with or without dignity and self-respect, who may seek to join the order, had better go out of business. In those organizations which are engaged in the life insurance business the practice is absurd and abominable. In the Elks reasonable and harmless levity is permissible, as the order is based upon Bohemianism, pleasant social intercourse, and entertainment, and has no insurance feature; and so it is with Hoo-Hoo, which is confined to the lumber planets and their constellations. It is permissible to extract some fun from the boys when in attendance upon conventions; but even in such orders there is a limit, and everything which approaches even apparent brutality should be studiously avoided. The aims in all secret orders should be to impress their truths upon a new member more through the workings of his mind and his imagination than in physical demonstration. It should also be remembered that hundreds of influential members are denied to Hoo-Hoo because of the innate refinement and dislike of anything bordering upon hoodlumism which is natural to many. The work of Hoo-Hoo, when properly conducted, cannot be excelled, is most impressive, and absolutely safe for the most consumptive applicant; and the Vicegerents should prevent the holding of promiscuous concatenations, and see to it that when one is held an efficient Snark, Senior and Junior Hoo-Hoo are present. If this is done, the sorrow which has come upon the order of Elks may never be visited upon our own Hoo-Hoo.

ARTICLE I.

ARTICLE II.

The officers of this club shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer in one person; and they shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and serve for one year, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified, and shall each perform the duties usually pertaining to their respective offices.

Sec. 2. The President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, together with six other members, to be elected by ballot at the annual meeting for a term of one year, shall constitute a Board of Directors for the control of all the affairs of the club, subject to review by the club at any regular or special meeting called for that purpose.

ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The annual meeting of this club shall be held on the first Friday night in September of each year, terms of office to begin with October 1st following.

Sec. 2. Regular meetings of this club shall be held on the first Friday night in each month.

Sec. 3. A special meeting of the club may be called at any time on order of the Board of Directors, or upon a petition of nine members of this club to any member of the Board of Directors, who shall give not less than three days' notice of such meeting; but no other business can be transacted at such meeting than that stated in the call.

Sec. 4. Quorum. Nine members of the club shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

This Constitution and the By-laws attached may be amended at any regular meeting upon the vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that notice of the proposed amendment shall be posted in the clubroom for at least nine days prior to the meeting at which it shall be acted upon.

BY-LAWS.

Section 1. The dues of this club shall be three dollars quarterly for resident members, and five dollars annually for non-resident members, payable in advance. Failure to pay the same within thirty-three days after notice from the Treasurer shall subject the member to suspension, such notice to be posted in a conspicuous place in the clubrooms, and remain in effect until all arrears are paid.

Sec. 2. Any member suspended under Section 1 of the by-laws may be reinstated by payment of one dollar in addition to back dues.

Sec. 3. Any member of the Order of Hoo-Hoo in good standing may become a member of this club by subscribing to the rules of the club and paying the proper dues.

Sec. 4. The Board of Directors shall adopt such rules and regulations, governing the conduct of the clubrooms, as shall be deemed necessary; and these rules shall be posted in the clubrooms.

Sec. 5. The Board of Directors shall meet at any time upon call of the President, or upon a call signed by three members of the Board.

Sec. 6. The order of business at all regular meetings shall be as follows:

- Roll call.
- Reading minutes of regular and special meetings.
- Report of Treasurer.
- Report of committees.
- Appointment of committees.
- General business.
- Adjournment.

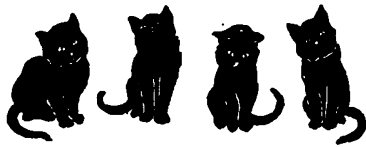
Sec. 7. All bills shall be audited by a committee from the Board of Directors, and paid by the Treasurer upon the presentation of a proper order signed by the President.
