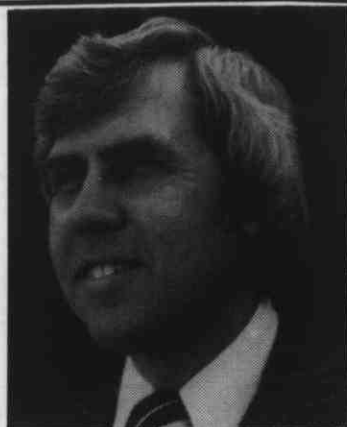

It's been 84 years since Hoo-Hoo became a reality and all through those years the aims and objectives of this great lumbermen's fraternity have remained firm and constant—fellowship, a high ethical standard, and health, happiness and long life for its members. May it ever be so.

There have been changes though, in the ways these aims and objectives were accomplished and experienced. Gone are the days when many hundreds in a community would gather for the annual Hoo-Hoo picnic. Clubs were regional rather than local and the Vicegerent Snark was a roving ambassador for Hoo-Hoo. Hoo-Hoo was "the" association for the lumberman.

Today our clubs are local and each has a Vicegerent Snark to guide it. There are a multitude of associations with special interests that our industry must support. The industry itself is no longer comprised only of lumbermen, but is truly a forest products industry. The diversification is so great it can only exist in an age of computers and air travel.

As Hoo-Hoo evolved over those years many decisions were made that were intended to accomplish our aims and objectives coincident with the times. As this evolution increased at a faster and faster pace, we found ourselves falling behind and the policies we were following inadequate. Our venture into the use of a computer some years ago created almost as many problems as we had hoped to solve.

The time had come to stop making decisions for today. Now was the time to invest in a future plan that would bring Hoo-Hoo International back into the position of leadership and guidance for the many diverse local clubs around the world.

Several years ago this regeneration began and only now can we begin to see the results. Our by-laws have been updated these past 3 years to bring them into line with today's world and to enable International to put into effect other plans. Through the proper use of our present computer programming the lines of communication have been speeded up and the figures produced are now of real value. We will know in January instead of September those who may have neglected to renew their membership and will be able to send them a letter reminding them of the many benefits to be had in being a member of Hoo-Hoo.

The quality of the Log & Tally has continued to improve and more and more clubs are contributing to it making it of greater value and interest to the individual member.

Perhaps the most significant change is in the revitalized role of Hoo-Hoo International in giving organized leadership to the local club. The operations manual that each will receive this month is packed with the experience of years of successful clubs. It tells of our history, it recommends proven club programs, executive organi-

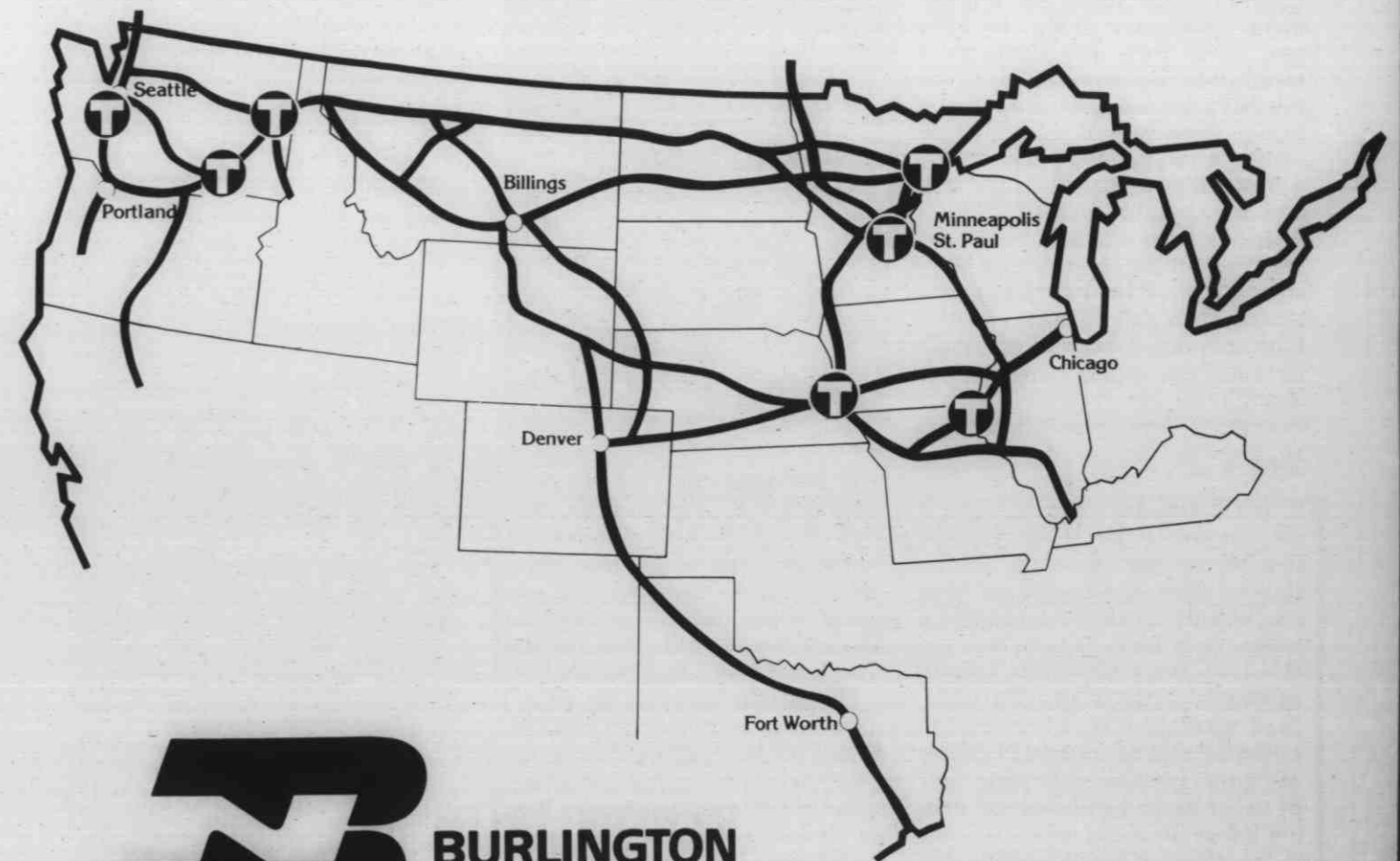

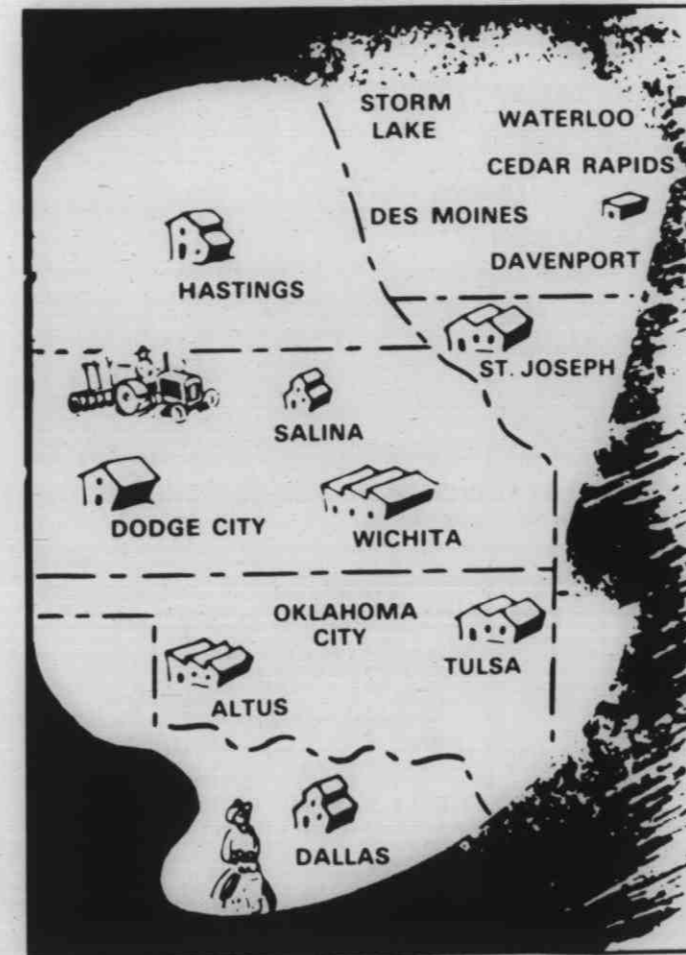

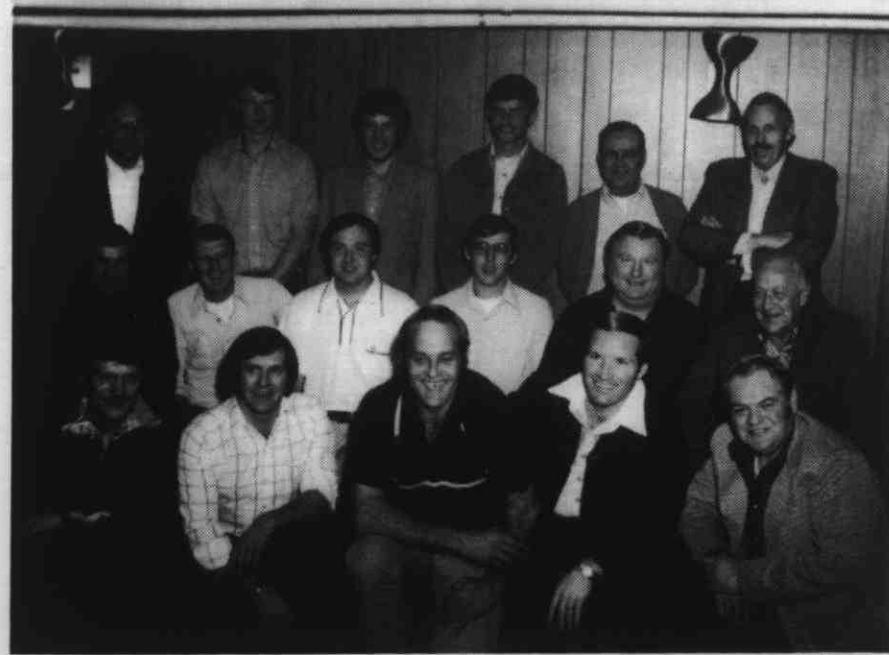
The Northwest Montana Hoo-Hoo Club held their November meeting at the Outlaw Inn in Kalispell, Montana on November 17, 1976.

Our understanding of this is that we would no longer have access in this area for logging, mining, ranching, recreation or any use whatsoever. The logging industry people in the area are opposed to the setting aside of this area, feeling that it would drastically cut the availability of marketable timber to the industry.

Another objection to this proposal is that the Fish and Wildlife Service has not filed an environmental impact statement, has not evaluated conflicting scientific studies regarding putting the bear on the endangered species list, and has not considered the impact of the act on the economy. 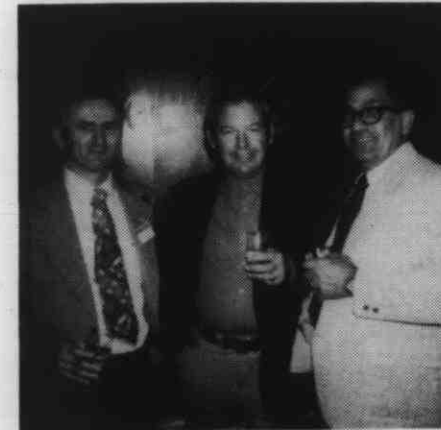
Later in the day, at 4:59 p.m., the officers joined other members of the fraternal order of lumber-

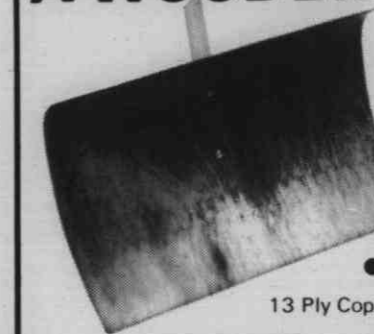

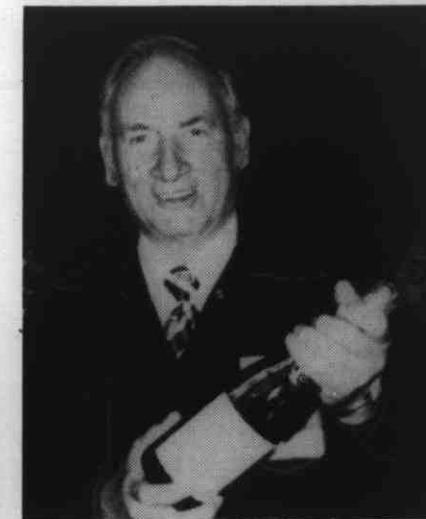

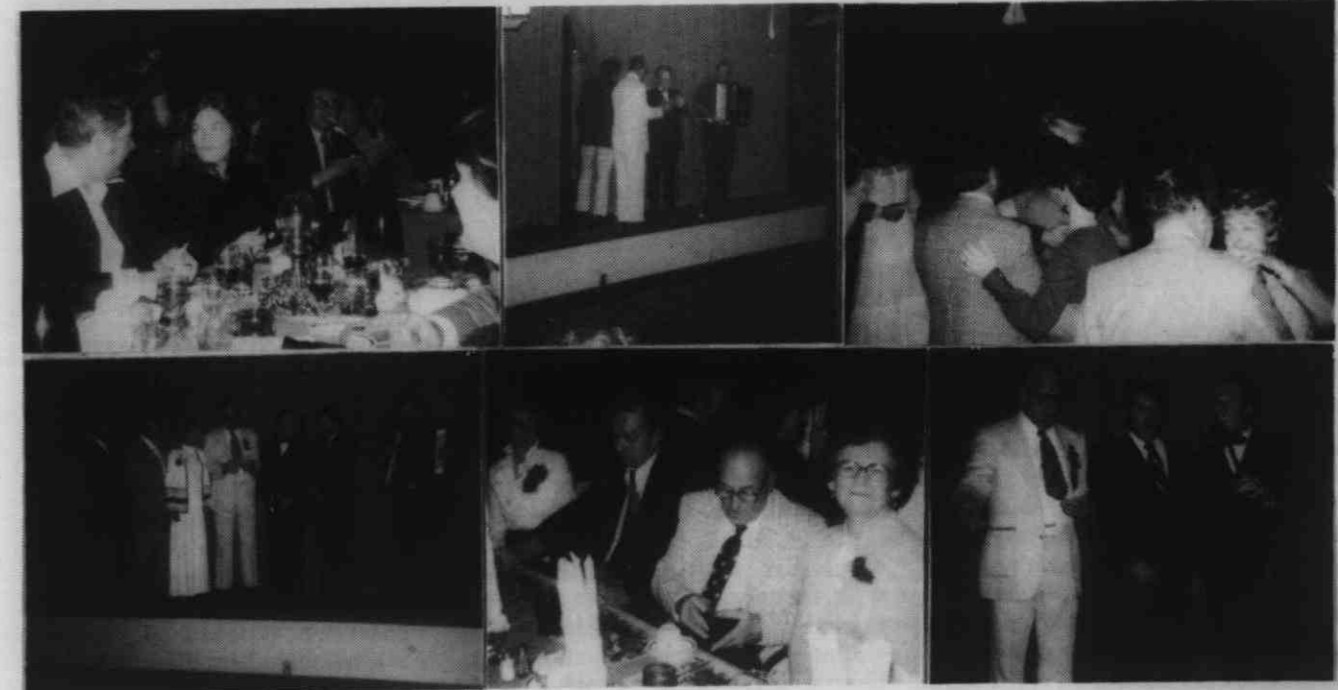

Australia Responds to Conservationists

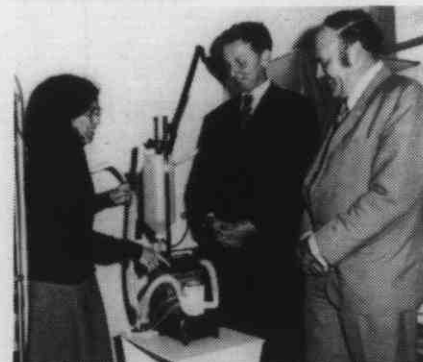

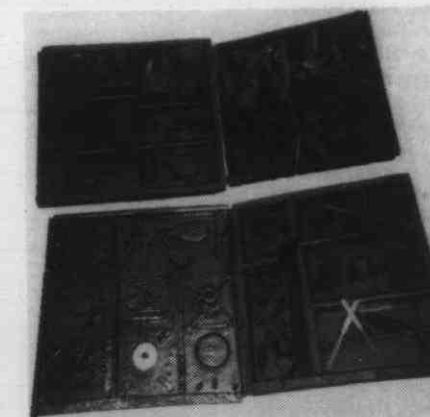

3-D Art at High Schools

Art students at the Goddard, Kansas, high school have been experimenting with three-dimensional wood sculptures, both relief and in-the-round types. The students have been striving toward Louise Nevelson's style and techniques of wood sculpture.



Louise Nevelson, a world famous sculptress, has 9'-10' tall wooden panels in museums and galleries all over the world. Both she and the Goddard students use pieces of wood—in various shapes, large and small. These are cut and assembled to form well-designed compartmentalized sections. The pupils had to create the right combinations of shapes and textures for well designed wood sculptures.

The search for usable wood things included old piano parts, spools, door trims, clothespins, as well as scraps and odds and ends from woodworking shops. Most of the units were then painted black to help integrate and unify all the parts. Some pupils, however, chose to stain their sculptures.
