

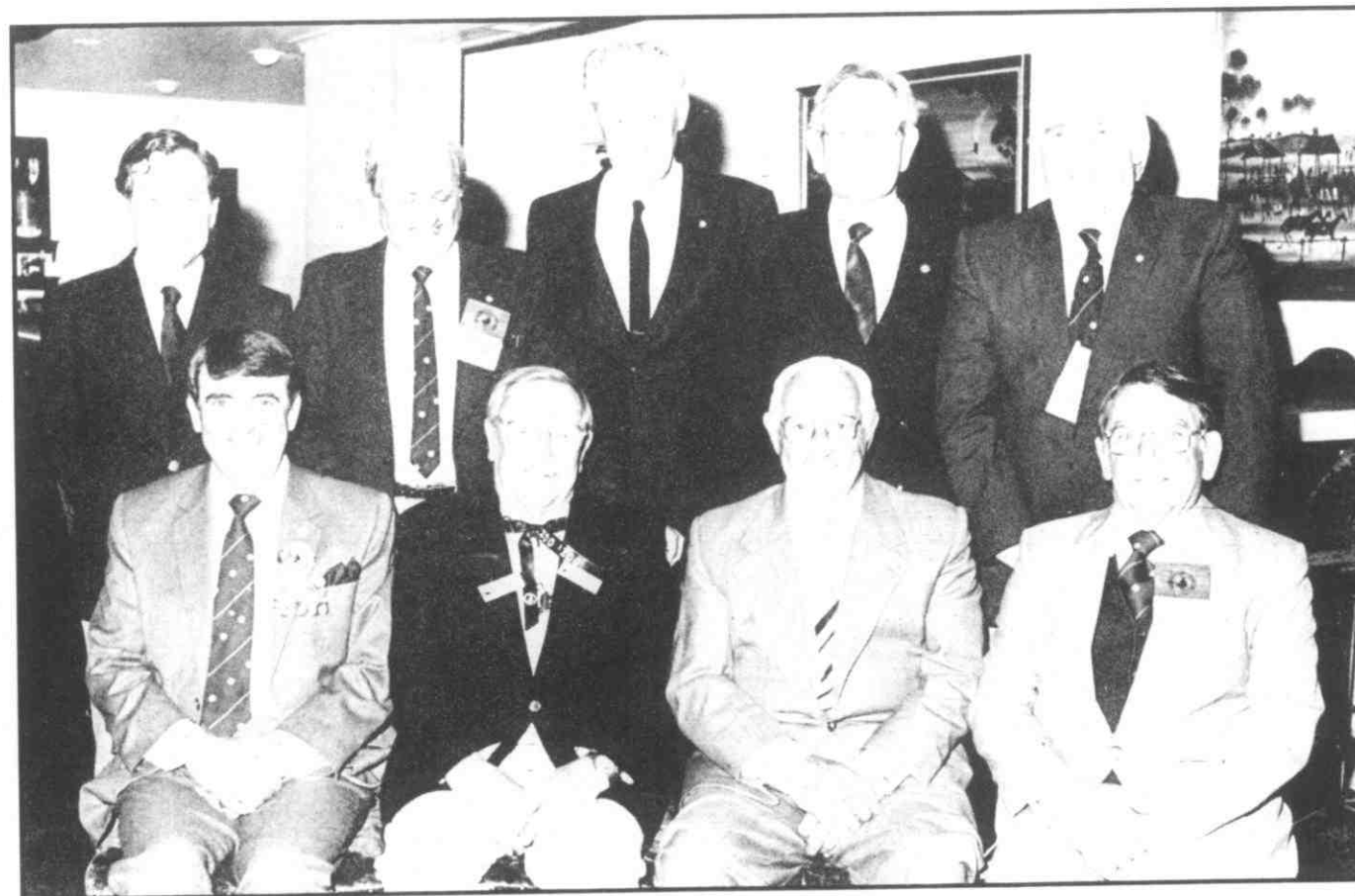

It is not fair to the officer, or the club, to appoint an inexperienced, good hearted volunteer, for one year, and then elect another for the following year. I guarantee that they will no sooner find the handle on the job, and it will be time for him to move on and the cycle repeats itself. A permanent man will collect dues, take care of reminders, get to know the tardy people and the appropriate action to take and most important, not have to relearn each year. Our best clubs, invariably have a permanent secretary/treasurer.

I had the good fortune, in December, to visit both Boston and Detroit clubs. These are two good "Old Line" clubs and we had a great time. You can tell an old club, within a short time following your arrival; you see a few elderly gentlemen in the group, usually with a couple of attentive listeners around them and sooner or later you get an opportunity to talk to one or two. These are the times that you learn about the history of our organization. These people are the repositories of our past, which, for the most part is unrecorded. As years pass, their ranks thin, and we are much the poorer for their passing, as with each one, a little more of our unrecorded past slips into obscurity, never to be heard again. Nearly every time I have an opportunity to chat with one of these fine old gents, I learn something about our order that I have never heard before. With almost 100 years behind us, I wonder how much has slipped through the crack.

Gordon Graham and I were on the cozy side of a couple of scotches in Detroit a couple of weeks ago. MESSAGE FROM THE SEER OF THE HOUSE OF ANCIENTS

It might be interesting for you to know a little something about some of the past SEER's.

One of the first SEERS that I knew was C. D. LeMaster #L-29727, "Le" or "C.D." as he was known, lived and operated out of Sacramento, CA. He owned and published the Western Building Material magazine. He was an early member of Hoo Hoo. He used to tell me about his meetings with Arthur Bolling Johnson #1. (the founder of Hoo Hoo back in 1892). "Le" was a very active member of Hoo Hoo and he would not miss a Hoo Hoo meeting were it possible for him to get there, and his wife was usually with him. He was secretary and treasurer of the Sacramento Hoo Hoo Club for many years. His death was a mystery. He left home for a walk and did not return. His body was found some days later in a nearby vacant lot. He lived for Hoo Hoo. A great guy.

Next in line for SEER, after "Le's" death, was Ben Springer. Ben lived and worked out of Milwaukee, where he represented Masonite and Hoo Hoo. He was a Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Wisconsin. His family had a theatrical background, which proved him to be quite an actor. He was only 5'3" and full of fire until his death. When he talked at Hoo Hoo meetings, and there were plenty of them, (many of which I attended) he aroused interest and enthusiasm in Hoo Hoo. Ben was National Secretary and Treasurer for many years and saw Hoo Hoo prosper to its heights. Those that knew him will never forget Ben Springer #L-34265.

After Ben passed away our next SEER was LeRoy Stanton #L-31930 of our Los Angeles Hoo Hoo Club. "Roy" as he was known, owned and operated E.J. Stanton & Son, a wholesale and distribution hardwood company in Los Angeles. Roy was a graduate of Stanford and an enthusiastic golfer. Next to hardwood his love was for Hoo Hoo. He dreamed of Hoo Hoo having their own building for headquarters. He saw this come true when this was accomplished in Gurdon. Shortly after becoming SEER he developed poor health and therefore was not very active.

To become Seer of the House of Ancients, first, you must have been Snark of the Universe. Second, you must be the oldest past Snark of the Universe and wait for the present SEER to die. Then he becomes SEER and can wear the CLOISTER, a NINE pointed gold STAR with a diamond on each point. This is passed on from the present SEER to the next.

Next, possibly we can learn something about our present SEER.

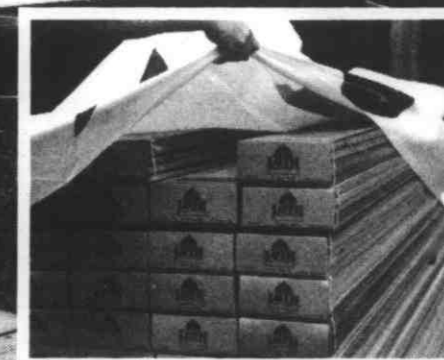
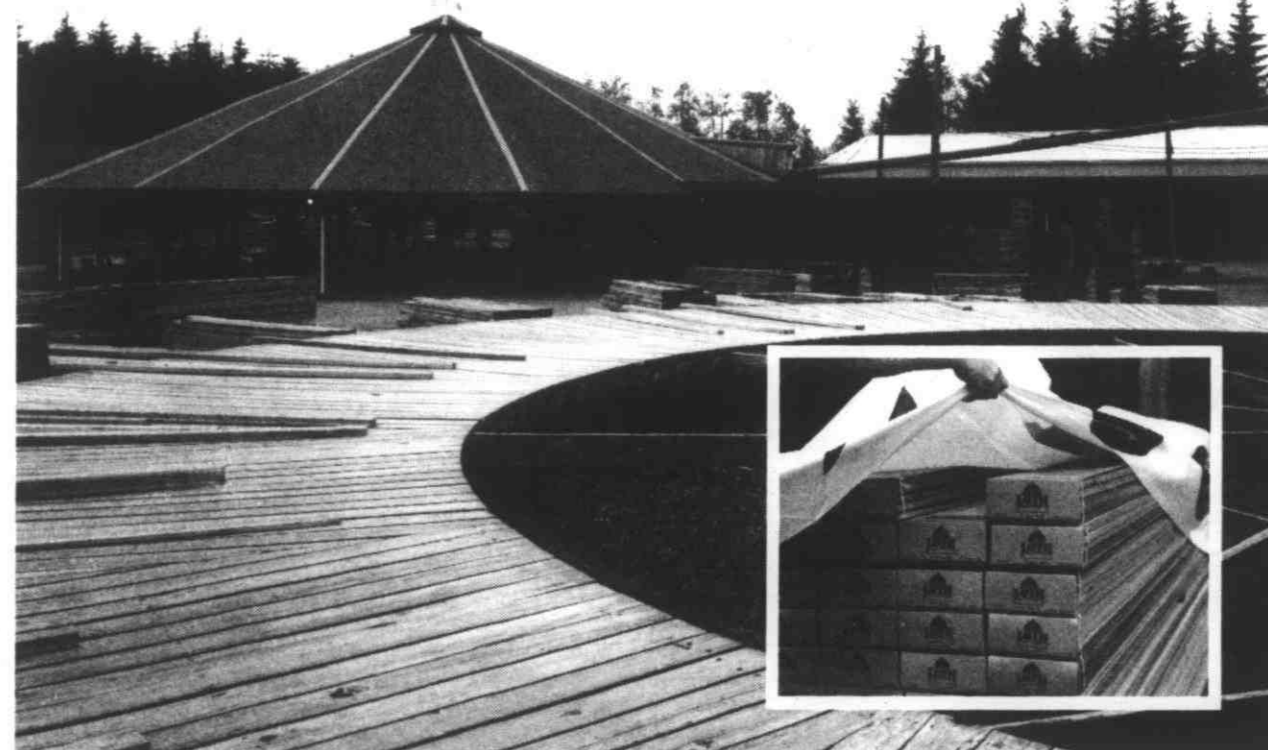

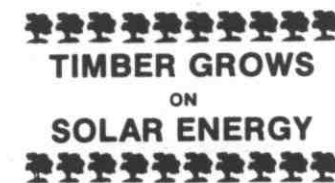

MT. Gambier Club 214 Celebrates 25th Anniversary!

The 25th Birthday of Mount Gambier Hoo-Hoo Club 214 was held on Tuesday, 1 December 1987 and at the same venue as the foundation meeting, 25 years ago, the Dining Room at Jen's Hotel, Mount Gambier. The foundation was on 1 December 1962.

Over 60 people attended. These included nine people who were present at the first meeting. Lindsay LeMessurier, Norton Ladkin and Max O'Reilly of Adelaide joined again with six of the foundation members Don Downs, Ian Hay, Leo Zed, Malcolm Morrison, Stephen Ollerenshaw and Keith Newman. Ian Ferguson was a kitten at the Charter evening on 4 May 1963 and also attended.

Fourteen Past-Presidents of Mount Gambier 214 were in attendance being Don Downs, Leo Zed, Malcolm Morrison, Stephen Ollerenshaw, Bob Cowan, Russel Hay, Brian Page, Geoff Doyle, Geoff Banks, Dennis Mutton, Bob Klintberg, Doug Lillyman, David Douglas, as was club President David Didwell. Four second generation members were Peter Zed, Michael Ward, Russell Hay and Brian Page. As well, there was a range of Vice Gerents, Presidents and Past-Presidents of other clubs, Hoo-Hoo life members, and Jr Past-Presidents.

Norton Ladkin, who was introduced by Malcolm Morrison, gave a key-address on the state of the industry in the late 1950's which lead to the need for and the formation of Hoo-Hoo which began in Adelaide in April 1962. The Timber Industry was in a shambles, competitor products were making inroads into markets on the basis of united efforts and providing needed products. Our industry had no unity, segments conflicted with one another such as local and importers and people cut what they wanted to, not what the market wanted. An ANZ survey calculated a 15 percent per-capita loss of timber product consumption in the previous 15 years and predicted a 20 percent loss, a further loss, in the next 20 years.

But why Hoo-Hoo? Norton continued. They had heard a lot of this American group which promoted wood at a grass roots level, its membership was universal and it fostered unity and fraternalism within the Forest Industries. So a

group which met in Don Downs office in early 1960, put together the idea of a Hoo-Hoo order in Australia. A spur was recent losses of weatherboard sales in Victoria — Radiata Pine expected to beat off Baltic Pine but lost to Brick Veneer with the usual dirty pool tactics — timber warps, checks, rots, gets eaten by insects, why use it? Despite the 1962 credit squeeze, the order came to life in early 1962.

Original membership was carefully invited to include all industry segments — agents, executives, foresters, forest-owners, unionists, merchants, wood-scientists, trade-press, box and case, plywood manufacturing and distribution and began in Adelaide. And a major contributor was Lindsay LeMessurier who determination keep the idea alive until it came to fact and within a short time, there were clubs in Adelaide, Mount Gambier, Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane. Fraternalism was meant to be a major part to remove or break-down barriers. And hence this germ of an idea in Mount Gambier in early 1960 came to pass as Hoo-Hoo. Two other key contributors were Al Gardiner and Ken Paterson.

Don Downs was introduced to tell the story, Part-2. Hoo-Hoo was where he first learnt the word concatenate and this the key need in the industry, the meaning of

this word. Despite the credit squeeze in 1962, Mount Gambier did not have any liquidity problems with members like Barney Symons, Bert Whiteside at his peak, Murray Clements and others. And much efforts was put into breaking the isolation between foresters, sawmillers, down-stream processors and end-users who one would have thought, were cooperative in a place like Mount Gambier but in fact, were as bad as anywhere else. And members took their duties seriously even to the provider of the vilest repasts at concatenations which probably explained why Ian Ferguson lost his hair.

Other speakers included Max O'Reilly, introduced by Leo Zed and Lindsay LeMessurier introduced by Ian Hay. Lindsay raised some very pertinent points. Club 214, Mount Gambier, was the first club to bring in second-generation members which must be what our industry is all about. Brian Tutton was one who put up the idea of meetings of clubs and hence our Hoo-Hoo conventions. And he was also famous for expressing what Hoo-Hoo was — at the inter-club meeting in Mount Gambier, Dr. Hopgood came down to represent the Premier and gave one of the most political speeches one could hear and was promptly told the meeting was not a political

OKTOBERFEST HOO HOO 262 HOSTS CONESTOGA STUDENTS

October 29, just two days before Halloween, the emblem of the black cat embarked on an adventure with students, to explore the manufacturing of black walnut logs into veneer.

It was full day of discovery as HOO HOO member Bill Blake (No. 91980) directed our bus load of 45 Conestoga College "Wood Products" students, to Interforest Ltd., Phoenix Veneers Ltd. and Kroehler Furniture. We observed the manufacturing of veneer from logs of red and white oak, white ash, walnut, cherry, hickory, as well as mahogany and other exotic species. Interforest is the largest veneer producer in Canada and ships domestic and export cut veneers to destinations around the world. At Phoenix Veneers, HOO HOO member Mike Mazurek (No. 81060) explained the process of using veneer flitches to lay up 4 X 8 panels and custom panels with reverse diamond match and borders. Our tour of Kroehler Furniture's Durham Ont. casegoods plant showed us the manufacture of wood furniture from the rough mill, through to packing.

Students and staff enthusiastically asked questions and took notes. Our thanks to Jerry Omand, President of our local HOO HOO, who, along with other members arranged this interesting and informative introduction to the wood industry.

Conestoga College of Applied Arts and Technology, located in Kitchener Ontario, is in the midst of building a \$6 million, 50,000 square-foot Woodworking Skills Development Centre. The Ontario government will provide \$5 million, and the other \$1 million will come from Ontario's secondary wood products processing industry. The industry was instrumental in identifying the need for such a centre, developing the project proposal and in getting it accepted.

The new centre is scheduled to be in operation by the fall of 1988 and will offer an integrated system of training for machine operators, apprentices, technicians, and supervisory and management personnel. Also, the centre will provide current industry employees the opportunity to retrain on state-of-the-art equipment.

The secondary wood products processing industry includes manufacturers of household furniture, kitchen cabinets, office furniture, sash and frames, mill work and other miscellaneous wood products.

Following is a letter received from Conestoga College faculty member Peter Findlay to Club 262 president Jerry Omand regarding the tour:

Dear Jerry:

The HOO HOO sponsored tour for

the Conestoga College wood products students was a great success. It was attended by 45 students, 5 instructors and Bill Blake. We left at 8:30 and returned at 5:30.

Each of the plants gave us excellent tours. The students were impressed with the size of the plant and the advanced machinery used at Interforest. At Phoenix they were interested in the lay-up of reversed diamond faces and the production line system for pressing, trimming, and sanding 4 X 8 panels. Kroehler rounded out the tour by providing the students with the opportunity of seeing furniture manufactured from start to finish. Most of the students had never been in a veneer or furniture factory before, and didn't know what to expect. We have been teaching them about veneer and furniture production machinery, including the hot press. This tour was a valuable learning experience for all of us. I have received many positive comments from the students and instructors.

On behalf of these students and instructors I wish to thank you and the HOO HOO members for the time taken to arrange the tour and for your willingness to pay for the bus.

Interforest provided an excellent spread of sandwiches for us. I have sent letters of thanks to the 3 companies.

I have enjoyed working with you and hope we can do this again next year.

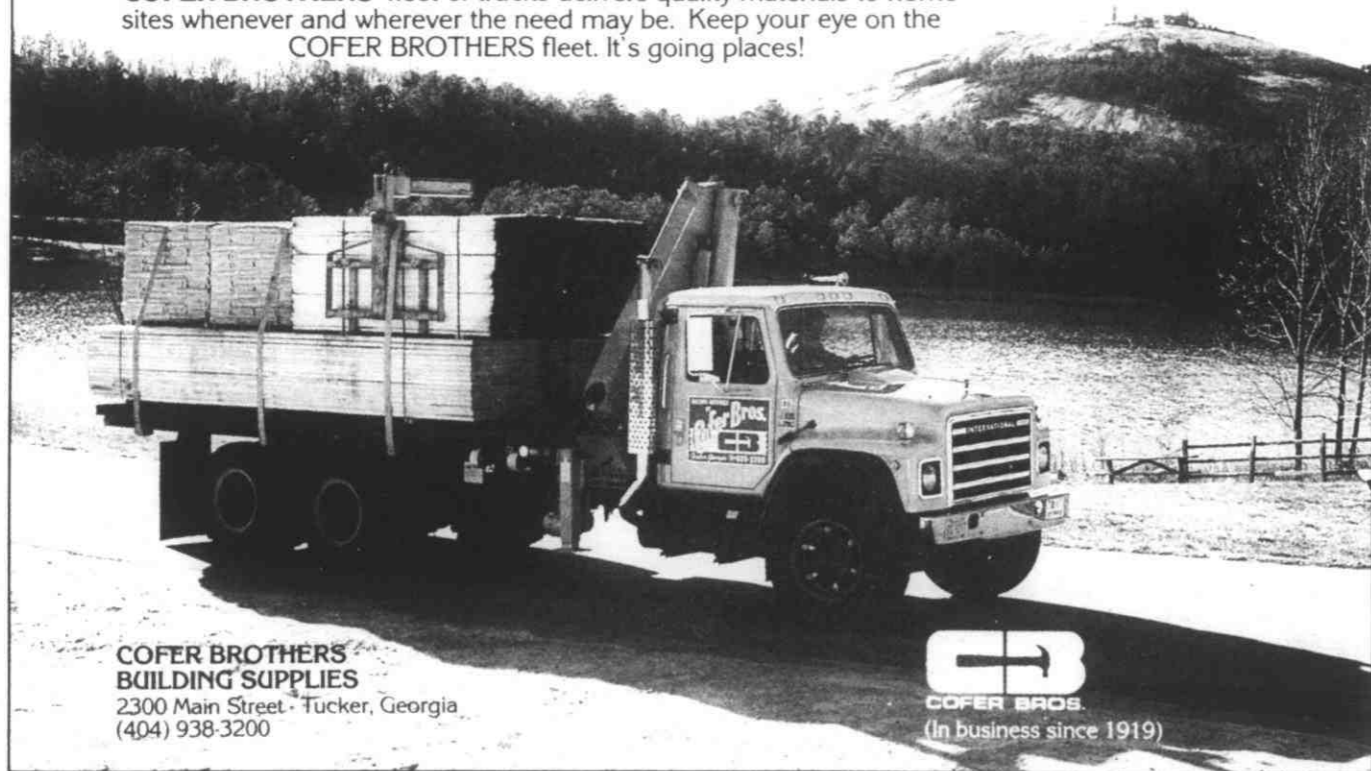

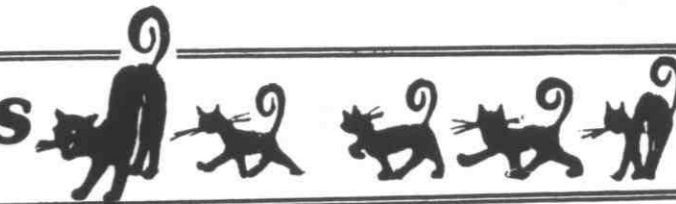
