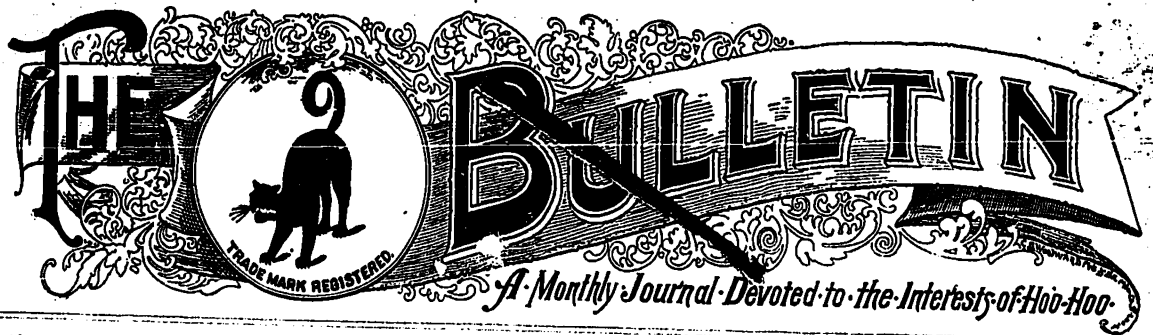

Suggestions on Initiation of Candidates.

To the request for an article on the Junior work of our Order, I can only give my conception of what may be done by the one filling that position. Having been appointed to the Garden of the Left, I should feel that it is a committee of one to entertain the assemblage, and by our system of initiation he is confined to no special lines or methods, therefore his opportunities are unlimited. By all means he should seek for original and novel methods of impressing the candidate, and repeat himself as little as possible.

The Junior, having entire charge of the initiatory ceremonies, after the candidates have been instructed by the Snark and Senior Hoo-Hoo, should insist on this provision of the ritual being obeyed, and permit no one to interfere with this work unless he requests help; for where others are acting all fine points are lost, and with a two or three-ringed circus established the attention of those present is distracted and the Junior must lose heart in his work. He should resent all disturbing conversations, permit no tiresome waits, feel that the candidate is simply a lay figure from whom he must extract fun, and permit himself to be as little self-conscious as possible, for where one feels that he must say or do something original or witty, he will probably fail, but all he has to do is to wait his time and the candidate will give him an opening. When a joke is turned on himself he should accept it as part of the show, and call every one's attention to it. When a joke misses fire it is well to attempt a combination and carry it into a second one which may prove more successful. He should always speak plainly and distinctly, and see that the candidate's answers are heard by all present. The Junior should always feel that the candidate is in his care and that he is responsible for any injury or hurt that may come to him. Above everything, he should permit no obscenity, vulgarity or roughness. A joke is only good when even the subject can laugh at it afterwards, and physical pain contains not the slightest essence of humor for the sufferer. A candidate on entering is looking for some joke to be played on him; he expects to be tripped, thrown down, paddled and otherwise maltreated. It should be our object to never give him what he expects. The opening ceremonies should be highly impressive, not only on the above account, but because the candidate ought to be thoroughly impressed by the teachings of the Snark and Senior. The Snark should, on opening, call the attention of all present, and require quiet until the time for levity had arrived. By the time the candidate reaches the Junior's station he has been lulled into a

feeling of comparative safety, and is ready for the first degree. It would be well for each Junior to give his imagination full play and invent a degree of his own.

I believe that all our ritualistic work, both written and interpreted, should be based on Egyptian history and mythology. Mr. W. H. Ellis, who has become an Egyptologist of note through his studies in connection with the Committee on Ritual, appointed at Minneapolis, has shown me the beauty and value of this idea. No doubt it will receive favorable attention at our next Annual Concatenation; in the meantime, any one with a smattering of Egyptian history and a vivid imagination ought to be able to find many entertaining incidents for the candidate, such as rebuilding the pyramids, or recognizing Willy Barns' mummified cat by the mere sense of feeling. Let the acting Junior remember that the opportunities for fun are world-wide, for he is confined by no bounds except the limit of human power.

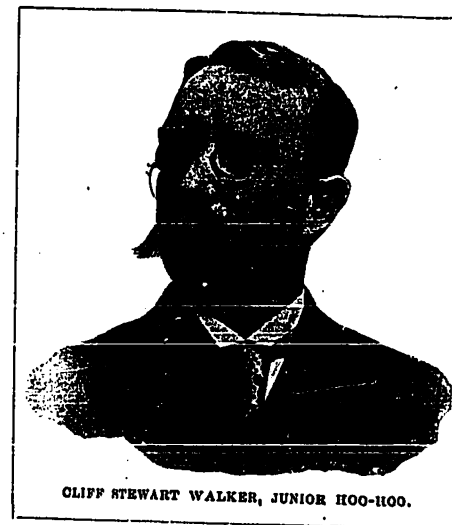

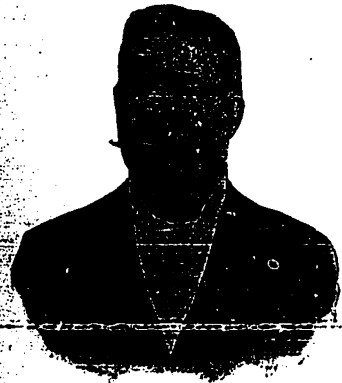

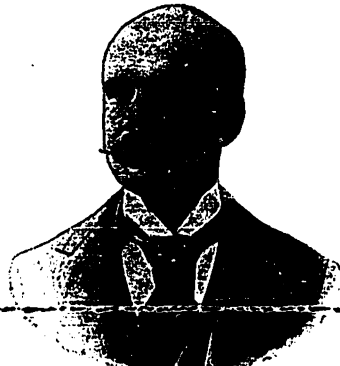


CLIFF STEWART WALKER, JUNIOR HOO-HOO.

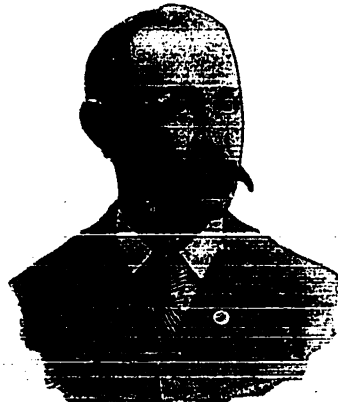

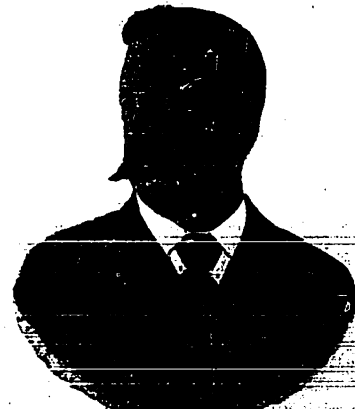

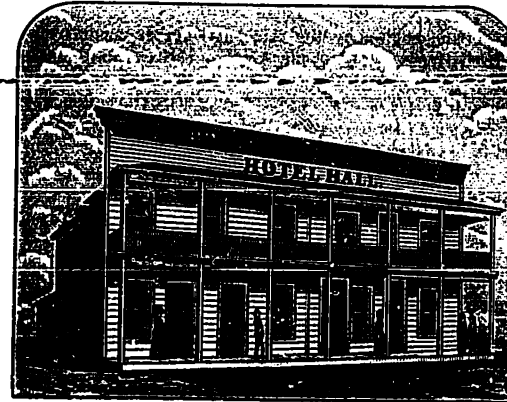

THE WAY IT CAME ABOUT.

Authentic History of the Formation of the Order.

The Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo was born in Gurdon, Ark., on January 24, 1892.

As it is desirable to tell the plain truth about Hoo-Hoo, it is proper to state that the organization was not the result of an accident, but was effected at the mature deliberation of six and not by nine men. B. Arthur Johnson, of the *Timberman*, Chicago; W. E. Barns, St. Louis *Lumberman*, St. Louis; George W. Schwartz, of the *Vandalia Railroad*, St. Louis; W. Starr Mitchell, business manager *Arkansas Democrat*, Little Rock; L. O. E. A. Strauss, of the *Malvern Lumber Company*, St. Louis and Malvern, Ark., and Geo. K. Smith, *Secretary Southern Lumber Manufacturers' Association*, St. Louis,

had six hours to wait for a train at Gurdon. These gentlemen had been attending a series of lumber conventions—one the day before at Camden, Ark., one at Kansas City five days previous, and during the previous thirty days, it was ascertained by comparing figures, they had jointly traveled 75,000 miles in attending lumber conventions. Some suggestion was made that it seemed a pity that the business interests of lumbermen were so diversified that no one organization could possibly obtain all the several memberships of the organizations then in vogue. It was proposed that there was only one common ground, pure and simple—that of good fellowship—upon which lumbermen or any other class of business men might meet; that if they first met upon the ground of good fellowship, that meeting might result ultimately in an organization which would care for both the business and social welfare of its members; that this had never been attempted other than in a fraternal way; that a fraternity founded on new lines, based on nothing which had ever before existed, making war upon the conventionality of marching in the street and the carrying about of edgeless swords, would ultimately accomplish the double purpose sought.

It was further proposed that this Order should not have for its purpose insurance; that it should not be like in name to that of any existing order; that its ritual should not be based upon that of any other order; that it should not be burdened down with badges, with their consequent enforced attendance upon meetings once a week or fortnightly; that it should be bound together by some secret means of communication so that, however large the fraternity might grow, each member, wherever situated, might communicate with any other member of the organization upon any matter of concern or interest. Touching this matter of common interest, it was there decided that only such people should be admitted to membership who, by the nature of their avocations, were naturally fraternal.

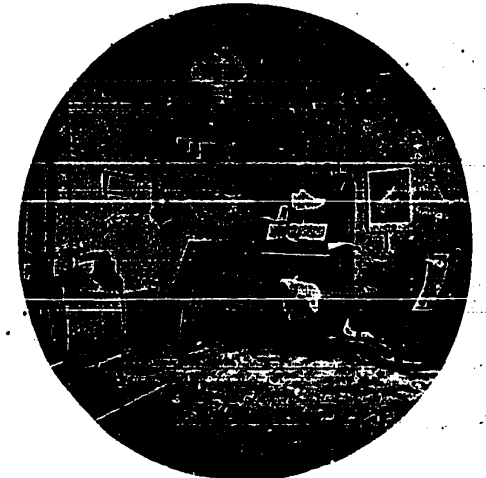
Then was given to these men at Gurdon, who desired to do something for the upbuilding of good fellowship, the tradition of Hoo-Hoo. There came to them, out of the glamor of history and tradition, the story of Hoo-Hoo. Hoo-Hoo was the soul of that Ptolemy I, with whose reign began that civilization of ancient

Egypt which built the pyramids. There was a transmigration of that soul from the first of those great kings to the body of the next in succession. It was the belief of that first known greatly civilized people that the form of that soul in a state of transmigration was that of a great black cat, and that finally, when Egyptian civilization was wiped away after the death of the last and ninth Pharaoh the disembodied Hoo-Hoo took up his abode upon a great cloud hearth rug in the heavens, to there abide until the earth was again in such a civilized condition as to merit the upbuilding once more of the good fellowship kingdom of "Health, Happiness and Long Life."

This second coming of Hoo-Hoo dates from that meeting of six that day at Gurdon. Hoo-Hoo acts through his representative, known as the Snark of the Universe. Little more was done on that day at Gurdon, except to determine the number of officers; that the colors of the Order should be white, black and gold; that the emblem of the Order should be a representation of the black cat worshipped by those of ancient Egypt, and that the purpose of the Order should be the promotion of the health, happiness and long life of its members.

With that end in view, it has become an organization with over 3,800 members, residing in nearly every State in the Union, and having representatives in England, South America, Central America and South Africa. The business affairs of the Order, outside of the care of the archives and the protection of its copyright and seal, is transacted by nine men, known as the Supreme Nine, elected on Hoo-Hoo day, which is the ninth day of the ninth month of each year. These nine officers have the following titles, the creation of which adds new words to the English language: Snark, Senior Hoo-Hoo, Junior Hoo-Hoo, Bojum, Scrivenoter, Jabberwock, Custocatlan, Arcanoper and Gurdon. The Snark is represented in each State that contains nine Hoo-Hoo by an officer, whose title in his territory is Vicegerent Snark.

The initiation fee is \$0.09; its annual dues are ninety-nine cents, the figure nine being symbolical of the nine lives which each black

cat of Hoo-Hoo possesses, and also bears some significance or relation in a way only known to good Hoo-Hoo concerning the dynasties of that Egyptian civilization from which the tradition of Hoo-Hoo has been transmitted.

The Order of Hoo-Hoo owns registered copyright in the States of the Hoo-Hoo emblem, which is used in many of its business, each paying royalty to the Order for the privilege of

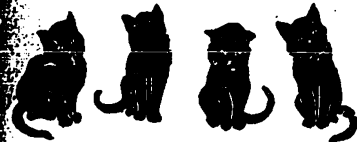

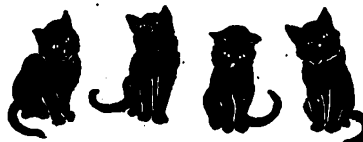
