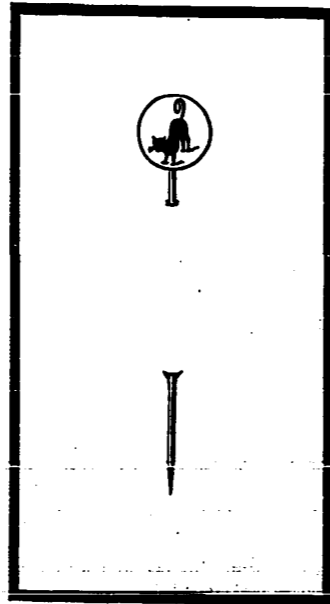

Future Concatenations.

Down in Texas.

In another column will be found some accounts of what Vicegerent W. H. Norris has been doing down in his State. He has the largest jurisdiction of any Vicegerent in Hoo-Hoo, but he is covering it most thoroughly. He announces concatenations at Galveston on March 23 and at Dallas on April 10. He will later hold meetings at San Antonio, and will wind up his year's work with a rousing big meeting at Houston in August.

At Denver, Col., on March 26.

Vicegerent C. M. Hicklin is stirring up things in Colorado. He intends to make his concatenation of March 26 "the biggest thing in the West." The Colorado, New Mexico, and Wyoming Lumber Dealers' Association meets in annual session at Denver on the 25th and 26th. The meeting is expected to be one of the largest the association has ever held; and as there are a great many members of it who have never seen the light of Hoo-Hoo land, it is a sure

thing that Vicegerent Hicklin will have all the candidates he can handle, even with the assistance of such veterans as the two "R. W.'s"—R. W. English and R. W. Stewart—and Brothers Preston, Hanna, and others. The following account of what will be done is from a recent issue of the Denver "Post," from which it is to be seen that Vicegerent Hicklin has convinced the newspaper people that Hoo-Hoo is to be the whole thing at this meeting. The announcement is accompanied by a two-column cut of the emblem:

"An army of Hoo-Hoo is assembling to invade Denver. The concatenated bandits will stealthily enter the city on next Monday, and on Tuesday, the 26th, they will assemble at the St. James Hotel. Several days will be spent in earnest discussion. Over three hundred representatives of the Colorado, New Mexico, and Wyoming Lumber Dealers' Association will talk over the lumber interests of the West. "The Colorado Railway Association, through their chairman, C. A. Parker, has declared a special rate of one and one-fifth fares for the occasion. Every preparation has been made for a royal celebration by Vicegerent Snark C. M. Hicklin. At the piercing sound of his prolonged new the Hoo-Hoo are hastily making their plans to be present. Statistics on the prices of lumber are being gathered as far back as the time of the flood.

"The lumber rates to prevail for the ensuing year will be discussed; questions relating to the supply and demand will be asked and answered; legislation affecting lumber matters will be considered; and the result of the meeting will affect the building interests of three States.

"Each Hoo-Hoo has a measure to propose. Animated debates may be expected. The New Mexico Hoo-Hoo intend to introduce a resolution legalizing their practice of selling dried lizard skins as pieces of eucalyptus tree bark. The Wyoming concatenated will violently oppose its adoption. Protests will be sent by them to the New Mexico Legislature. The position which Colorado's delegation will take is anxiously awaited by both the opposing factions of this mysterious Order. Secrecy as to their opinion on this important matter seals the bewhiskered jaws of Colorado fellows.

"Following the business discussions there will be a grand concatenation. Applications for membership have been flooding Vicegerent Snark Hicklin's office lately. 'Many are called, but few are chosen' to take the degree of the 'Playful Kitten.'

"Lumbermen all over the West are much interested in the outcome of this March meeting of the three States' association."

At Dallas, Texas, on April 9.

Brother A. G. Anderson, of Dallas, Texas, sends us the following account from the "Times-Herald," of that city, of March 16, of the preparations being made there for the fifteenth annual meeting of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, which occurs on April 9. Vicegerent W. H. Norris is working up a big concatenation as a sort of crowning feature for the occasion, in which he is most ably assisted by Brother Anderson and the other good Hoo-Hoo of Dallas. The "Times-Herald" says:

"The fifteenth annual meeting of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, an organization that embraces all the retail dealers and manufacturers in Texas and the manufacturers of Louisiana, Arkansas, and the Indian Territory, that represents hundreds of enterprises and millions of invested capital, will begin in Dallas on April 9, and will continue three days. It is expected to be the biggest gathering of the lumbermen of the Southwest have ever held. The lumber dealers will do the business, and the Hoo-Hoo will have the fun.

"At a preliminary meeting of the Dallas lumbermen on Friday the following local committees were appointed:

"Yesterday morning Carl F. Drake, of Austin, secretary and manager of the association, came to Dallas. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon he met with the above committees and outlined a programme for the coming convention. It follows:

"TUESDAY, APRIL 9.

"10 A.M. Directors' meeting at secretary's headquarters, Parlor C, Oriental Hotel.

"11 A.M. Convention convenes at City Hall; courtesies of city by Mayor Cubell; address of welcome by Judge G. N. Aldredge; response by President E. H. Lingo, of Denison; adjournment.

"2 P.M. Report of president, vice president, and secretary, and discussion of same; appointment of temporary committees; at night, concatenation of the Hoo-Hoo.

"WEDNESDAY, APRIL 10.

"10 A.M. Report of standing committees and discussion of same; reading of papers.

"Afternoon for entertainment; at night, reception at Oriental Hotel by citizens.

"THURSDAY, APRIL 11.

"10 A.M. Report of temporary committees; unfinished business; election of officers; selection of place for next meeting; adjournment; after adjournment, meeting of officers and directors to select standing committees.

"2 P.M. Meeting of the newly-appointed standing committees; at night, smoker.

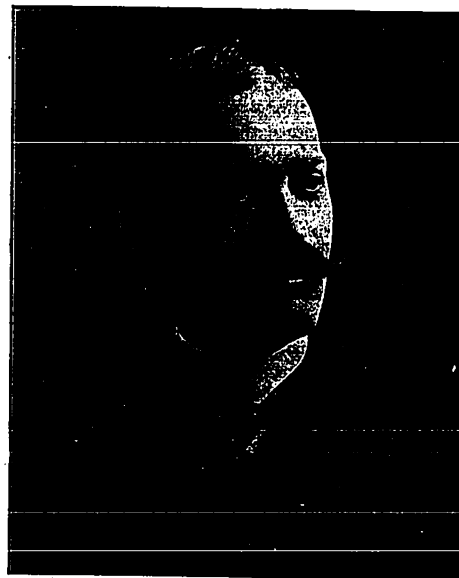
"Ben. F. Orr, of Dallas, has been appointed by Vicegerent Snark W. H. Norris, of Houston, to receive applications for membership in the Hoo-Hoo.

"The Hoo-Hoo concatenation on the night of April 9 is confidently expected to be a 'warm number.' A big crowd of candidates is anticipated. The local Entertainment Committee will see to it that every visiting lumberman enjoys himself."

At Tifton, Ga., on April 8.

Vicegerent C. H. Caldwell, of the Southwestern District of Georgia, will hold his first concatenation at Tifton on the evening of April 8. This will be, in a sense, in connection with the meeting of the Georgia Sawmill Association, which occurs at Valdosta on April 9. Many of the members of the association, who are almost to a man members of Hoo-Hoo, will arrange to spend the night of the 8th at Tifton and go on down to Valdosta on the 9th. Mr. Caldwell is being assisted in the preliminary work of the meeting by Mr. F. E. Waymer, secretary of the Georgia Sawmill Association, and one of the most energetic Hoo-Hoo in the Southeast. Snark Stillwell will be present, to permit of which the concatenation which Vicegerent Neal, of Savannah, had tentatively announced to occur there on the 9th, will be moved back a few days, and will probably occur on April 5 or 6.

In this connection we are more than pleased to present a portrait of Vicegerent Caldwell, with a bit of biography. His full name is Charles Henry Caldwell, and he is president and general manager of the Flint River Lumber Com-

pany, Bainbridge, Ga. Although young in years, having only celebrated his thirty-sixth anniversary but a short time ago, he brings to his assistance a ripe experience and a practical familiarity with every detail of the lumber trade. Of pleasing manners and genial disposition, his friends are legion all over the land, and especially in Georgia, Florida, and Alabama, among a people by whom he is best known. Hence his appointment as Vicegerent Snark for the Southwestern District of Georgia. Mr. Caldwell is a business man all over, and possesses executive ability of a very high order. He was born at Greenville, Ala., in 1864, and is the eldest son of the late Henry Martyn Caldwell, who was for twenty years prior to his death president of the Elyton Land Company and founder of the great and prosperous city of Birmingham, Ala. The Caldwells have long been in the lumber business, having established the firm of Miller, Caldwell & Flowers, at Rolling, Ala., thirty years ago. Mr. C. H. Caldwell went to Bainbridge, Ga., about six years ago, where he has since resided. He is also president of the Caldwell Real Estate

and Improvement Company, of Birmingham, owners of large holdings of improved real estate in what the world has come to recognize as one of the foremost towns in Dixie.

At Savannah, Ga., on April 5.

Vicegerent Neal, of the Southeastern District of Georgia, announces a concatenation at Savannah for April 5. He has been at work on it for some time, and has an excellent class provided; but it has not been convenient to fix the exact date until within the last few days, as he desired to avoid a conflict of dates with the several other meetings that are scheduled—at Tifton, Valdosta, and Atlanta, in Georgia, and at Columbia, S. C. Snark Stillwell will actively assist Mr. Neal in the meeting at Atlanta, and has engaged himself to be present at the other meetings named. Vicegerent Neal is a man of few words. He says: "Just tell them the time and place. They know what our Savannah concatenations are. If not, why not?"

The Second One in South Carolina.

On another page we give an account of the first concatenation ever held in South Carolina. As a result of the seeds sown at that meeting and as showing how quickly a little leaven, properly administered, tends to leaven the whole mass, we are more than elated to announce a second Hoo-Hoo meeting. It is scheduled to occur at Columbia, the capital city, on March 27. Mr. Seeley, the newly-appointed first Vicegerent of the State, has worked the meeting up, with the assistance of Brother W. B. Dozier, who recently took up his residence at Columbia, where he has established the Dozier Lumber Company. The meeting will be a success, as the advent of the Order into the State has awakened a widespread interest and enthusiasm. Snark Stillwell, and probably one or two others from Savannah, will attend the meeting, and furnish the veteran experience necessary for the occasion. The rapid and perfectly healthy growth of Hoo-Hoo in the South Atlantic States is a source of much gratification. The introduction of Hoo-Hoo into the two Carolinas and West Virginia rather "hung in the wind" until Snark Stillwell took hold of it with characteristic vigor, and showed his accurate measurement of men in the selections made for Vicegerents.

Another for West Virginia.

This fetches us to the announcement of another meeting at Bluefield, W. Va. It is to occur at 7:30 P.M. on April 20, and is to be held by that energetic worker, Vicegerent E. Stringer Boggess. Mr. Boggess is a prominent and widely-known hardwood dealer and exporter, of Clarksburg; and when he sends out his announcements, he is able to call a surprising number of sturdy sawmill men up out of the hollows of the mountains. His recent concatenation at Bluefield was as unique a one in some respects as has ever been held, but from the interest of it it is clear that it was a complete success. For example, this meeting of April 20 is being worked up in large part by those who were initiated at the former meeting; and, headed by Brother M. N. Offut, of the Tug River Lumber Company, of Bluefield, a large class of prominent hardwood manufacturers has been secured.

Still Another for Georgia.

Vicegerent William M. Otis, of the Northern District of Georgia, announces a concatenation at Atlanta for April 13. It has been nearly a year since a concatenation was held at Atlanta, and the last one, on account of the intensely hot weather, was not largely attended. Mr. Otis writes that the local members are all anxious for a sort of rally or reunion, and will make this meeting of the 13th the occasion for it.

Comments on Concatenations.

The First One in South Carolina.

The following excellent report of the first concatenation—or, rather, the first two concatenations—ever held in the State of South Carolina was sent in by Snark Stillwell, who officiated. There were initiated the following: Charles Holmes Evans, of D. W. Alderman & Sons Co., Alcolu, S. C.; Henry James McLaurin, Jr., Sumter, S. C.; Walter Lacy Rankin, of W. L. Rankin & Bro., Mar's Bluff, S. C.; William Hooper Haigh, of W. L. Rankin & Bro., Mar's Bluff, S. C.

"At the evening concatenation the following officiated: Snark of the Universe, William B. Stillwell; Senior Hoo-Hoo, George V. Denny; Junior Hoo-Hoo, W. F. Baker; Bojum, Z. W. Whitehead; Scrivenoter, Walter P. Ott; Jabberwock, W. B. Dozier; Custocatian, C. W. Howard; Arcanoper, H. J. McLaurin, Jr.; Gurdon, H. J. Lancaster. There were initiated the following: Robert Joseph Alderman, of D. W. Alderman & Sons Co., Alcolu, S. C.; Joseph Gordon Granbery, of D. W. Alderman & Sons Co., Alcolu, S. C.; Noah Hamilton Diggers, of the Diggers Lumber Company, Columbia, S. C.; Robert Coffin Shand, of the Shand Blacksmith Supply Company, Columbia, S. C.; Laurence Ward Gorfall, of the Santee River Cypress Lumber Company, Ferguson, S. C.

"Both of the concatenations were successes in every way and most enjoyable occasions. One of the afternoon initiates, in writing to the Snark, says: 'I have never spent a more pleasant day than yesterday (February 22), especially after I became affiliated with, and had my eyes opened to, the blessings of Hoo-Hoo land.'

"After the evening concatenation, adjournment was had to the restaurant of the Messrs. Manheim for the 'On the Roof.' A substantial collation, with the necessary concomitants, was served in elegant style. In the discussion of the same all were drawn nearer together, and it soon became apparent that under such circumstances Hoo-Hoo was shown at the best.

"After each of the States represented was heard from, speaking, story-telling, and singing took the rounds until each had spoken for the ninth time. As loyal Hoo-Hoo, we could not pass this number; and, with regrets on the part of every one, 'Auld Lang Syne' was sung and each went his way.

The Savannah "Morning News," in noting the return to that place of Snark Stillwell's party, says of the meeting at Sumter:

"The meeting at Sumter was the success of the season in Hoo-Hoo circles. The candidates initiated included some of the most prominent lumbermen of the 'Palmetto State,' and the occasion was one long to be remembered by those fortunate enough to enjoy membership in this noble Order of black cats. The great prince of 'Health, Happiness, and Long Life' descended from his palace in the clouds and took up his abode in the Masonic Temple at Sumter, where the concatenation was held. Then and there the purblind kittens were playfully led to the altar of Hoo-Hoo, and, amid scenes never to be forgotten, were permitted to gaze upon the beauties and grandeur of that unique empire for which Hoo-Hoo land stands solitary and alone and to enjoy the perfumes and fragrance of waving flower gardens and the incense of Hoo-Hoo burning upon the altar of the prince of black cats."

Obituary.

J. L. Bounds.

Jesse Leo Bounds died at Magdalena, N. M., about two months ago. Mr. T. A. Coulson, of Moss Point, Miss., notified this office; but he had no particulars, and did not know the exact date of Brother Bounds' death.

Brother Bounds joined the Order at Lumberton, Miss., on February 5, 1894. At that time he was inspector of the Wiscasset Mills, at Hattiesburg, Miss. He removed to Magdalena in 1899.

John E. James, who was for many years Northwestern Freight Agent of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railway, and who had headquarters in St. Paul, Minn., died of pneumonia in New York a few weeks ago. She had gone home to attend the wedding of a favorite sister, who was recalled from her wedding trip by a telegram announcing Mrs. Youle's death. Mrs. Youle was the daughter of Judge Holing Whitfield, of Brunswick; and as a young lady, she had a host of friends there; as Mrs. Youle, she was very popular at Atlanta, and leaves many friends in both places to mourn her death.

"A big turnout of Manitoba members of the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo gathered together on Saturday night at the National Trusts Building, where, in the words of the Order, a 'Session on the Roof' was held. The Vicegerent Snark, Mr. J. C. Graham, on January 29, issued from the Snark's office the following summons:

"Hear ye, all who give obeisance to the Great Black Cat! Manitoba felines are mewing from the house tops to notify their American cousins and brethren that at 8 o'clock P.M. on Saturday, February 16, 1901, the 'Fragrant gardens' will be opened at Winnipeg, in the National Trusts Company's block, corner of Notre Dame and Main streets, and all good Hoo-Hoo are commanded to attend.

"Dry kilns have been erected for tender pussies, so that Kabibonekka may for the time be forgotten.

"Electricity will illuminate the 'gardens' and assist in elevating the purblind kittens.

"Horseless vehicles of wondrous mechanism will help the neophyte to ride in safety to the desired goal.

"Onions from far-famed Andalusia will sweeten the air with their fragrance.

"Rings, the product of 'Manilla,' are being erected that pilgrims may practice that agility necessary to recognition by the Vicegerent Snark.

"Ye who believe in 'Health, Happiness, and Long Life,' hear and attend me.

"To disobey a summons of this sort meant a heavy penalty in the shape of a fine, and at the appointed hour the chiefs of the Order had assembled. They were: Snark, J. C. Graham; Senior Hoo-Hoo, A. T. E. Phillips, Winnipeg; Junior Hoo-Hoo, A. J. Hughes, Souris; Bojum, E. E. Greenshaw, Shoal Lake; Scrivenoter, G. B. Houser, Portage in Prairie; Jabberwock, D. B. Sprague, Winnipeg; Custocatian, Thad. R. Case; Arcanoper, H. Byrne; Gurdon, G. O. Aulsebrook, Winnipeg. When the Snark had taken the chair and found that his black cats were all present and with their fur nicely plumed, he gave the command for the candidates for membership in the Order to come forth, and the following were duly initiated into the wonders of the mysterious Order: Thomas A. Cuddy; J. E. Parrott; James Ovas, British Columbia Timber and Trading Company; Harold Sprague, Winnipeg; Fred. Rutherford, Winnipeg; and William Nicol, Boisassain. The kittens did not complain that any of the initiation ceremonies were not gone through in their case, and men went so far as to say that, after all, a dog's life was preferable to a cat's life.

"After the initiation, a sumptuous banquet was opened,

at which the Vicegerent Snark of Canada presided, and about twenty others assisted in doing justice to the spread and in helping to enliven the evening. Those who were unable to sing were called on for a dance; and if not able to so perform, they told a story or made a speech. Indeed, it is the only sort of missionary work that we take much stock in. We have never grown enthusiastic over the undertaking to ram down the throat of a barefooted and breech-clouted heathen, who already had more religion than anything else, the ethical code of an age-long accumulation of progress and enlightenment. We never thought his moral digestion could do anything with it when we got through ramming. Of course the time-tried and fire-tested gallantry of our Southern birth has always compelled us to "come across" with a modicum of the send whenever a lot of good women have approached us in behalf of the languishing "work" at Boribool Gha, but we have always done it with a vague, subconscious calling to mind of the adage about the facility with which a certain class of men get separated from their money. But with these other missionaries it is different. We think we can see potential results looming up. If we can ever get the twenty or thirty million people in our Pacific islands to wearing cottonade breeches and some sort of shoes, it will be a circumstance, as Tom Watson, of Georgia, would say, to give us encouragement and strength.
