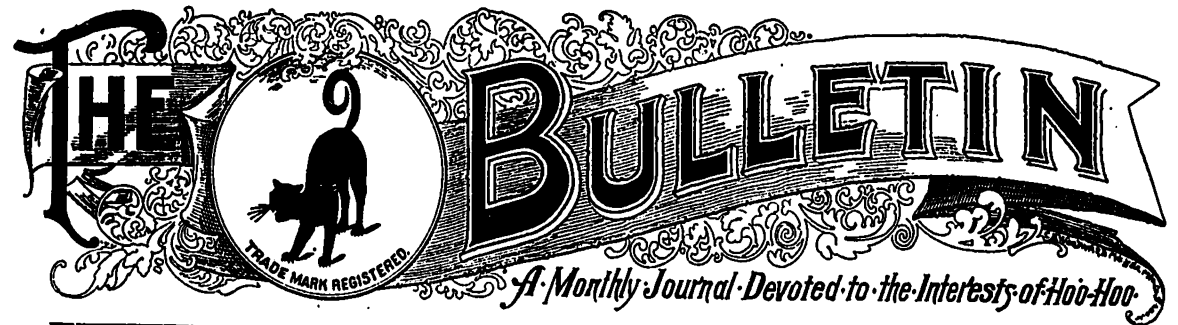

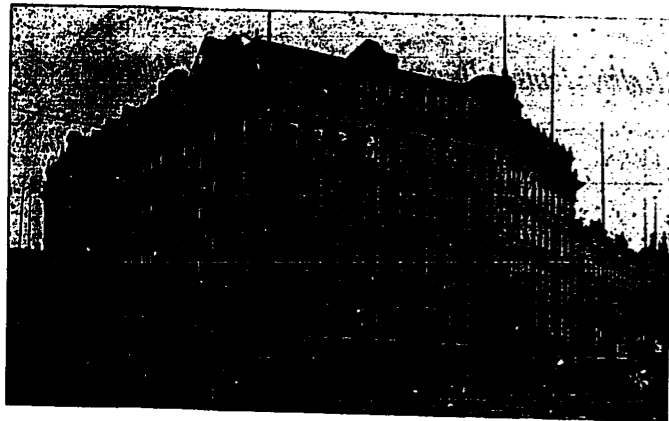
The proposed programme is as follows:

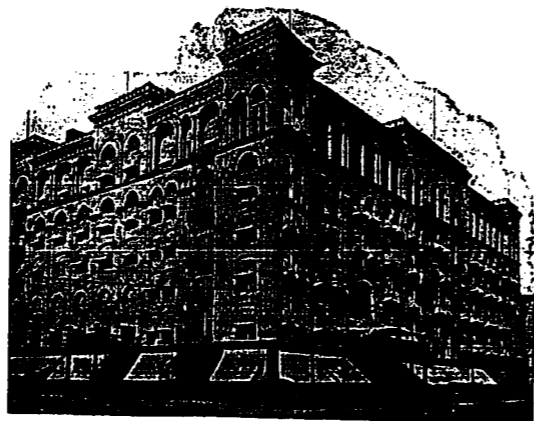

RUSSELL HOUSE, DETROIT, MICH.

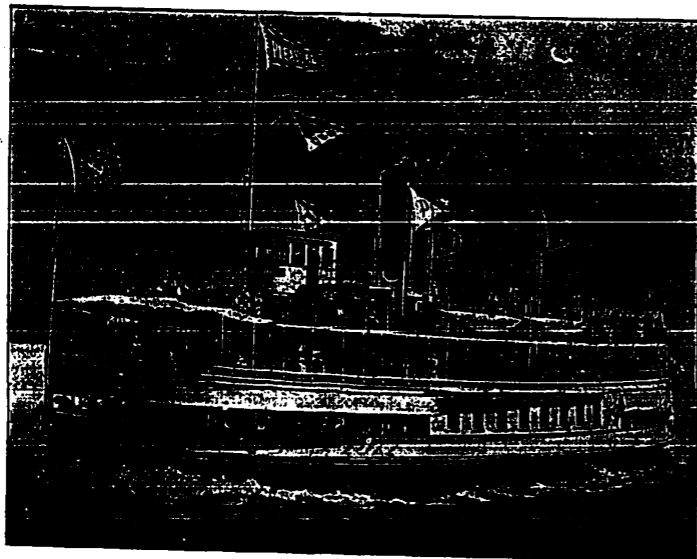
FRIDAY, SEPT. 10.

For the Good of the Order.

"There is nothing in which men so approach the gods as when they try to give health to other men."—*Cicero*.

And is not the object of Hoo-Hoo to give Health, Happiness, and Long Life? This writer has halted between two opinions for two months. The announcement under the above head two months ago that an attempt would be made to unravel some tangled skeins of thought as to the purpose and trend of Hoo-Hoo was received with such Desert-of-Sahara silence that a further assaying of unasked-for advice seemed superfluous. That is why such a gap has occurred in the delivery of these articles. Come to think of it, though, there was nothing much in the first paper except an announcement that others would follow.

Some things have occurred recently to compel utterance from all those Hoo-Hoo who believe in Hoo-Hoo the unconventional, Hoo-Hoo the unique, Hoo-Hoo the unlike.

The even column of pessimistic bitterness which appeared in the June "Bulletin" on page 5, under the caption of "The Future—What Shall It Be?" might possibly be left to die alone right there on the white paper, where it was honestly placed, it is true, but which it sullied nevertheless. But, then, the discussion is on; and Mr. Williams has been kind enough to leave a prescription on the counter, without any directions for taking the medicine or any scheme for raising the money to pay for it. So something must be done with it, and at once; for Mr. Williams represents a by no means small minority—a minority which should be convinced that it is wrong. We have heard of dangerous minorities. This is not dangerous; it is simply a minority. It is not a simple minority. It speaks with conviction and with understanding, but its purposes are ordinary and commonplace. It is difficult to tell what this minority most wants, whether it be disruption and death, or a real, tangible, money-jingling purpose.

This is what Mr. Williams said in one place in his column of indifferent despair: "For when Hoo-Hoo dies, if it is permitted to die without the achievement of something more than now inheres in its annals and traditions, there will be none to write its epitaph, much less rear a monument to its memory." When speaking to the question of "Now what are you going to do about it?" Mr. Williams says: "Perhaps there is nothing more ominous than that so few seem to care. I have raised the question many times; but, with the exception of the Vicegerent referred to—who, by the way, is really responsible for this screed—I have found few, if anybody, otherwise than apparently indifferent to the whole subject."

To condense these statements of Mr. Williams, he maintains—he, the small minority—that if Hoo-Hoo dies as it is it will be buried in the potter's field, without even a shingle for a tomb board, much less a monument or a scraggy epitaph. Furthermore, he thinks it is ominous, because "so few seem to care." This dying business is so gloomy and inconvenient and unreasonable it does seem that the few who are good enough to find "paths of glory" should not insist, with the poet, that they "lead but to the grave."

There is a new book called "The Triumph of Death," which might show us that it would be good to do a little dying just in order that we might live. There seems to be some indication that the membership may wane a little bit. Probably it might be the best plan to assist somewhat in the waning. The apple tree never becomes strong and virile and apple-bearing until it is properly pruned.

It was expected some would become dissatisfied and resign and let their dues lapse and show lack of interest, and

in other ways be like other men under other but parallel circumstances. It is the earnest hope of this writer that all who are displeased—permanently, hopelessly out of sorts—will say so, and say it out loud. But that there is anything "ominous" in the general silence which prevails in the matter of the life or death of Hoo-Hoo is untrue. The membership is largely satisfied, not that satisfaction of indifference, which might be "ominous," but silent with the satisfaction of confidence. That assertion cannot be easily proven; neither can the charge of indifference. It is somewhat like discussing the circulation of a newspaper; it is all speculation after you get through. But on the principle that it is always better to think good than evil; be cheerful rather than cast down; look up, not down; laugh than cry, it is better to think that dissatisfaction does not exist in large measure. Dissatisfied men scowl and talk; satisfied men smile, but speak no words. You can hear all the dissatisfaction, but you cannot see all the smiles. It is not a ballot easily counted.

It is charged in the article referred to that "some of our Snarks have sought by wholesome precepts to inculcate a wider and more beneficent code of helpfulness; but, as a matter of fact, the law of the Order enjoins no such active rule of policy, and makes provision for the practical prosecution of no defined methods to that end." There are defined means—clearly defined means, at that. The object of the Order is not all written out in the constitution, it is true; neither should it be; but it is in the ritual from the beginning to the end. In the instructions to the candidates following the unwritten work it is especially and particularly set down that the one chief charity which can be done by one Hoo-Hoo for another is to put him in the way to earn a living. As once before said by this writer, and which cannot now be better said by him, it is all based on a perfect handbook, and the handbook rests on the biographies filed and kept in the archives of Hoo-Hoo. The book of acquaintance, which the handbook is, must be full and complete. It is our lodge room; it is the tie that binds and permits the perpetuation of those courtesies which can be communicated in no other way. Then, with a perfectly kept set of biographies of each member up to date upon which to build the handbook, we may enter fully into that broad charity which will keep ability in touch with opportunity; and permit us to say that in all Hoo-Hoo Land there is not a deserving man who has not had an opportunity to earn a living. The new ritual teaches that the noblest, best thing we can do for a fellow-man is to turn him about and point him in the direction of using the talents he may have. If on every Hoo-Hoo Day each kitten could conscientiously testify to the fact that he had been able through his personal efforts to assist at least three deserving people, Hoo-Hoo or not, to an opportunity to earn a living, then we will by that action approach that time when the hills and the clouds, the seas and the mountains echo back, Health, Happiness, Long Life, Peace and Good Will to all mankind.

The full and explicit handbook makes communication possible now between over 5,000 people who know like mysteries, have walked in the same direction about the gardens, and have a something in common which can be obtained in no other way. The use of the handbook was to have been part of the discussions which were to have been written here in these papers. The simple possession of the handbook should be enough to suggest these things, but has not been, and it will not be until some means has been devised for creating a monitor of Hoo-Hoo which the initiate will read. Either that or local lodges must be established.

But many of those who have been good enough to publicly discuss the question of improvement in Hoo-Hoo

work have to date set up the violently suppositious case that nothing has as yet been done that Hoo-Hoo may live. Inasmuch as all that has been done for Hoo-Hoo in its simple ritual and mildly decorative ceremonies has been done with a full and clear idea of perpetuation, it seems to the writer to be rather a late date to make the bold assertions which the June "Bulletin" contains.

Speaking directly to the question of adding an insurance feature or any other benefit scheme to Hoo-Hoo, this writer is not sure but Hoo-Hoo had better sink rather than attempt to be saved by any such life-preserver.

Let us have one order in our whole land which is modern and at the same time does not go jingling a bell in the streets and crying: "Benefits, benefits!" Let us have one Order which is not built up on the hope of gain of clinking dollars. Let those exquisites who deride our assertion that the central, golden theme thread of Hoo-Hoo is the matter of giving employment to our brethren remember that to do these things is oftentimes to light a lamp of hope in the home when the oil is low and the wick itself burns, to put a loaf where there was but a crust, to put a flush on a pale cheek, to take away despair and place confidence in its place, and gives to men that moral and physical health in compliance of which action Cicero says: "There is nothing in which men so approach the gods."

Memphis, Tenn., July 5.—We have read the articles from our worthy brothers, Williams and Cunningham; and while we fully appreciate their motives, we are still satisfied that Hoo-Hoo or no other order or institution ever prospered or regained its footing by its members writing and publishing articles that there was general dissatisfaction in the ranks. It is true that some few are disappointed from the fact that they have not received any personal benefit, but such persons can only blame themselves; or it may be that their sole idea is to receive some pecuniary aid. So far as this section is concerned, the only dissatisfaction of which we have heard is from persons who should never have been admitted into this or any other order; for they are too selfish to enjoy anything wherein they do not reap the exclusive benefits.

It is true, with us, as with all other orders, we have some black sheep who are ever looking for an opportunity to cry, "Wolf!" but where we find one of these we find a hundred who are Hoo-Hoo in the fullest sense, and are ever ready to join in the chorus: "I'm so glad that I'm a Hoo-Hoo!"

Now let us all sing the chorus, and we will soon find that those who have strayed from the fold will soon be in the front rows singing loudest of all. Then we will listen to any brother's suggestion for the good of the Order, but we hope that such ideas will not be prefaced by cries of dissension in the ranks.

We trust that Brothers Williams and Cunningham will not think that we wish to cast any reflections on their remarks, for we fully realize how energetic and earnest they are in the cause.

Obituary.

Mr. George E. Bysfield (No. 1135 of our Order), of Rocheport, Mo., was fatally injured in a railroad accident at St. Louis, Mo., on June 23. He died the next day at the Protestant Hospital, to which he had been taken. Mr. Bysfield had been for some time quite largely engaged in raising stock, and had shipped a car load of stock to St. Louis. For some reason he was personally looking after switching the car about the yard of the M., K. & T. Road. He was riding on top of one of the cars that was being sidetracked, when it collided with another car on the switch. Mr. Bysfield was thrown from the car to the track, falling between two of the cars. His body was not mangled, but death resulted from the shock and internal injuries.

George Edmond Bysfield was born at Rocheport, Mo., Aug. 13, 1858. He was first a carpenter, then engaged in the lumber business, and, as stated above, had been recently interested in stock raising and shipping. Mr. Bysfield became a member of Hoo-Hoo at Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 23, 1894. His remains were taken to Rocheport for interment. He was married, and leaves a family.

Mr. W. H. Huntington's concatenation at Shreveport, La., on June 23, was a most enjoyable success. From the formal report which appears on another page it will be seen that twelve men were initiated. Eighteen men had filled out blanks, and were expected to be on hand. The excessively hot weather, however, caused six of them to hold off being initiated till the next meeting. Several of them were men quite advanced in years. Of the twelve men initiated seven are lumbermen. Nine of the twelve live at Shreveport, and the other three are from Antrim, La., and Knox Point, La. Mr. T. Q. Martin, who ably assisted in the work of this concatenation, writes us that on the morning following the meeting the whole town was talking about it, and that he immediately proceeded to enroll thirteen candidates for the next meeting, which will be held before the Annual Meeting. Mr. Huntington, writing from Pollock, La., says that he will also hold a meeting at Alexandria before the Annual Meeting. It is likely this concatenation at Alexandria will precede the next Shreveport meeting. The Shreveport "Journal" gave the meeting a great "send off," illustrating its account with the emblem of the black cat and "scare" headlines. Despite the excessively hot weather, all the men present at the meeting pronounced it a most enjoyable and successful affair. Nineteen members of the Order were present, as follows: 1049, 3710, 2248, 1693, 2745, 1417, 4149, 1262, 1440, 2672, 519, 383, 539, 382, 215, 93, 4436, 326, 1046. Two of the men initiated—Mr. Pleasants and Mr. Henderson—are two of the wealthiest and most prominent citizens of Shreveport. Both are men well up in years, but both enjoyed the initiation very much, and are two of as enthusiastic kittens as can be found throughout the waving greenness of the gardens. The candidates were paraded up one side and down the other of the main street, accompanied by the officers in their robes of states, all headed by the Shreveport Brass Band, playing the Dead March in Saul. No recent census of Shreveport has been taken, but we understand if a man had counted the people who lined up on the sidewalk to witness the weird pageant he would have had a more accurate count than Superintendent Porter secured for the government.

Mr. Huntington desires to express his gratitude for the assistance rendered him in the work of getting up and conducting this concatenation to Mr. T. Q. Martin and Mr. L. C. Allen, of Shreveport, as well as to Mr. E. F. Kane, of Texarkana. To these three gentlemen much of the credit of this successful meeting is due. Mr. Huntington already has eight candidates for his Alexandria meeting, and expects to enroll no less than a round dozen there.

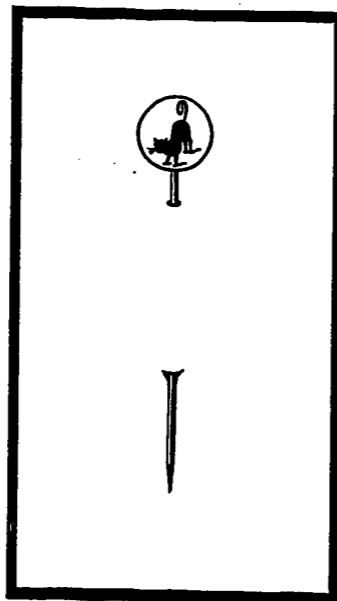
