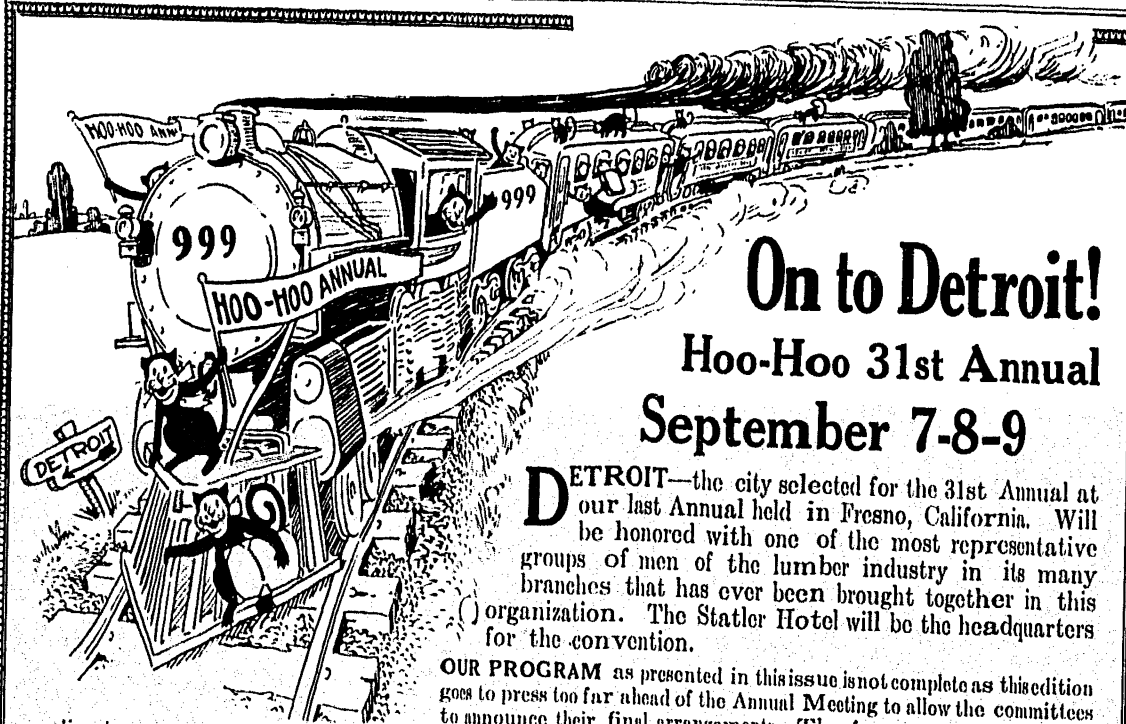

ARIZONA

ARIZONIANS RALLY TO THE CALL OF HOO-HOO.

Hoo-Hoo played a most important part in the annual meeting of the Lumbermen's Club of Arizona, at Douglas, Arizona, on Saturday, June 10, not only in holding a successful concatenation, thereby increasing its membership in that state more than 100 per cent, which was due to the important part which the representatives of the Order took in making this one of the most successful concatenations and meetings of the club in its history.

Parson Simpkin, Supreme Chaplain of the Order, was the headliner of the day, and delivered one of his eloquent addresses, which was an inspiration to the lumbermen of Arizona.

C. D. LeMaster, Supreme Arcanoper, who is Secretary-Manager of the San Joaquin Mill Owners Association of Fresno, California, and is an expert in his line of work, delivered a most interesting address upon the policies that have to do with the successful management of planing mills.

The State of Arizona only had sixteen Hoo-Hoo. The relationship of Hoo-Hoo to the lumber industry was brought most forcibly to the attention of those in attendance by Parson Simpkin and Mr. LeMaster, and as a result eighteen applications were received for membership in the Order and applications for reinstatement were received from four old members.

The concatenation was held in the evening in the convention room at the Cadsden Hotel and was one of the most successful concatenations ever staged in the state of Arizona. The degrees were conferred in the most impressive manner and Junior Hoo-Hoo, Floyd Dernier, made a record that he can well feel proud of.

Following the concatenation an interesting business session was held and great interest was displayed in the new policies of the Order and plans were discussed for carrying on the activities throughout the state.

J. C. Light Elected State Counselor. One of the important events of the evening was the election of J. C. Light, of the Norman Light Lumber Co., Miami, Arizona, as State Counselor for Arizona. Mr. Light is one of the leading "lights" of lumberdom for the state and is a most active and loyal member of the Order.

Vicegerents Appointed for Arizona. Following the election of Mr. Light the following Vicegerents were ap-

pointed: Sydnor S. Cornick, of the McGouge Lbr & Door Co., Riordan, appointed for the Mountain district.

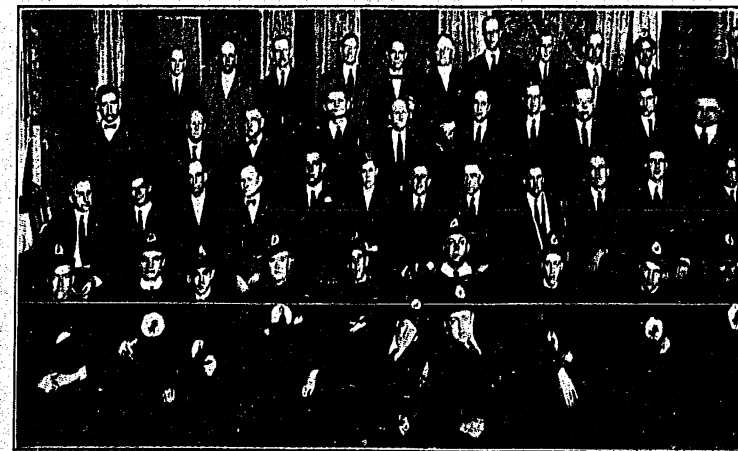

VICEGERENT BROWN OF AKRON BREAKS RECORD FOR OHIO.

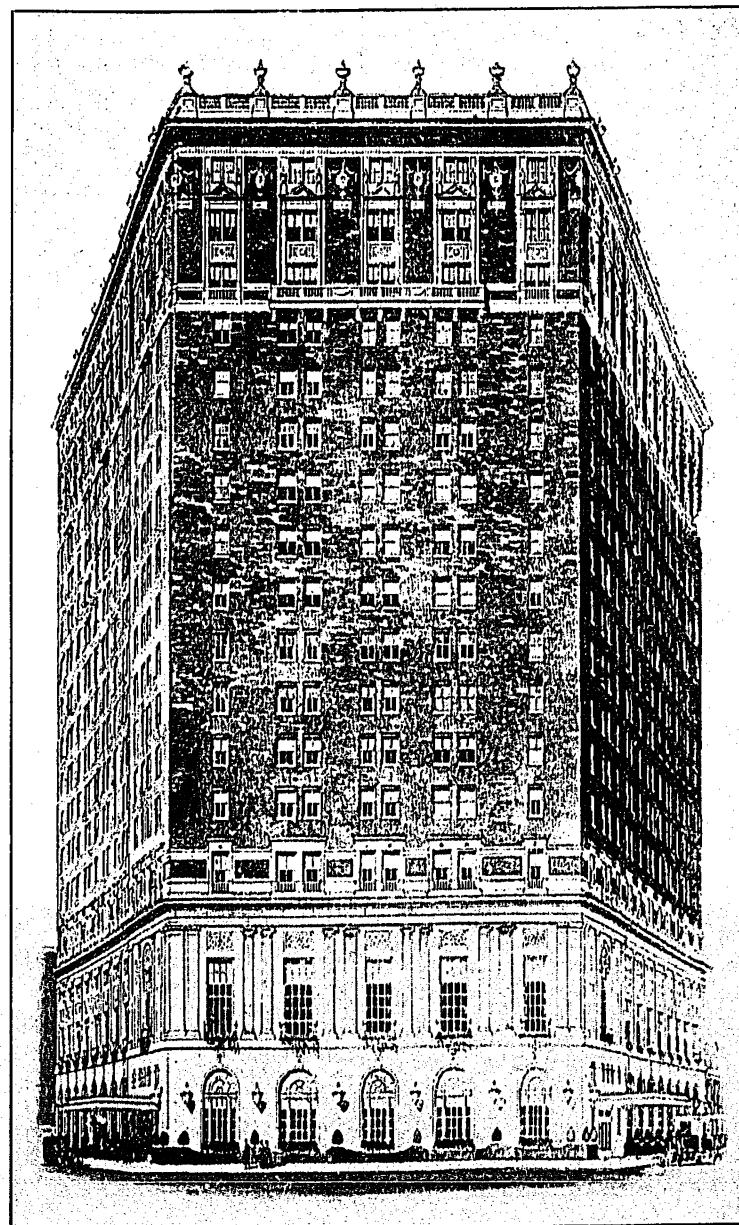

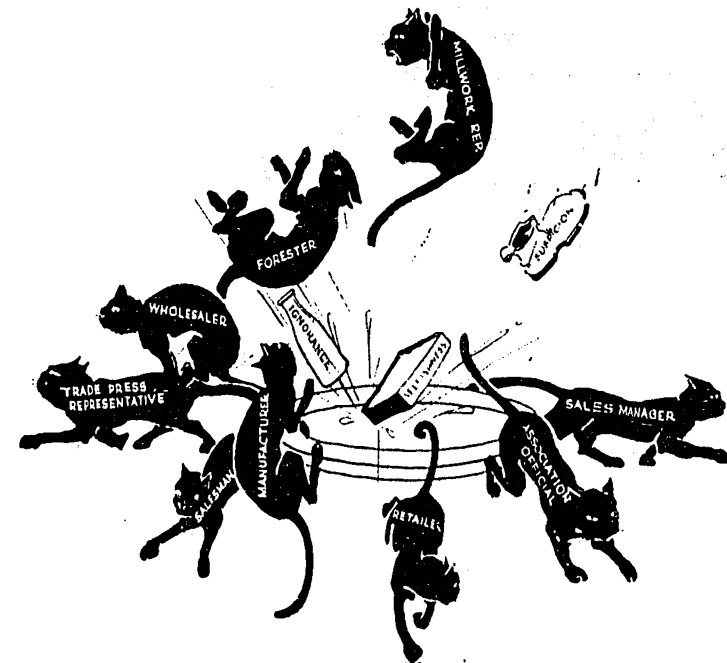
On to Michigan.

A quiet Saturday traveling north, and a quiet Sunday resting in Detroit, paved the way for a night journey to Bay City, and the last two days of toil on this trip.

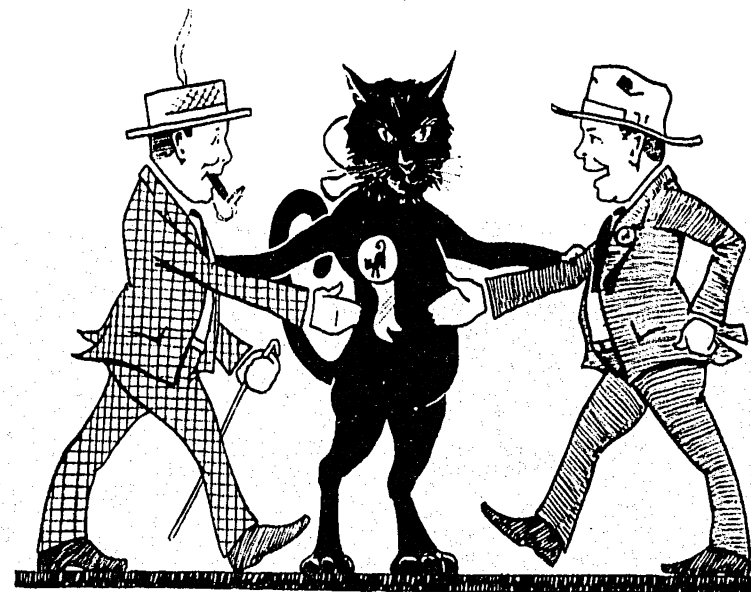

Ionia.

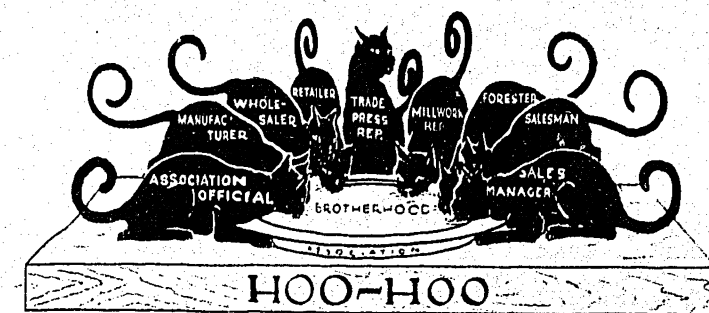
On arriving, they were met by Archie Wright and following lunch enjoyed a restful drive about the city and were taken to the Country Club where a district meeting was to be held.
