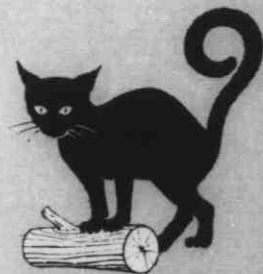

... from

### the Snark's desk

I am pleased to announce that the Hoo-Hoo International office has been recently moved to a new location in the Boston area.

The old office space, having served its purpose, has been somewhat of a hell-hole, at best. Our Executive Secretary, Cliff Cunningham, has worked under extreme hardships and intolerable conditions, during the past three and one-half years. At the new location Cliff will have new offices. One office has wall-to-wall carpeting, and both offices are heated and have air-conditioning. There is proper lighting, and of course, some wood paneling. Even the windows have drapes! Janitorial service is also furnished, and at the old office about all the janitor service we got was to empty the ashtrays.

The expense of moving will be approximately \$300, however, Hoo-Hoo will be saving about \$1100 per year in rent opposed to the old annual rental price. Other savings will be that Cliff and his secretary will have free parking instead of paying a weekly parking fee as they have had to do in recent months.

This move will aid us in making our office more efficient in operation in the future and by up-dating our dataprocessing service, which has not been too satisfactory in the past, we will soon become more efficient in presenting club rosters, paid and unpaid rosters, and members-at-large rosters.

Other advantages are also in the future.

The move was made with the approval of the Chairman, President and the vice president who visited the Boston office in January, 1973, and with the final verbal approval of the Executive Committee, also in January.

Gentlemen, may I also remind you that we have a movie which Hoo-Hoo calls "The Forest Productive" and is still available from the Hoo-Hoo International office on a loan basis free of charge except for the return of the film. The film is also available for sale for \$135 delivered. It is a 29-minute color/sound film and presents the problems of the lumber industry which is especially interesting to the general public.

## Suggested Guidelines And Job Descriptions For Club Officers

(Repeated After Many Requests)

**PRESIDENT**—The president shall preside at all meetings of the directors and members, and shall have general charge of/and control over the affairs of the club subject only to the board of directors.

He shall be concerned about the over all operations of the club as stated below:

- 1.) Keep in close communication with the International office for the betterment of the club.
- 2.) He shall designate all committees, fix their duties, and amend and alter their responsibilities.
- 3.) He shall designate and appoint chairmen to the major club committees.
- 4.) He will make himself available for counsel for all committees, chairmen, board members, officers, advisors, and to the general club membership.
- 5.) It will be the first obligation of the president to involve in working committees as many members as possible, in order to make the members a vital and important part of the club.

**FIRST VICE PRESIDENT** - Shall act as president in the president's absence, and shall perform other duties as may be assigned to him by the president. He will also be responsible for the following:

- 1.) Responsible for all club programs and social functions.
- 2.) Responsible for obtaining funds for door prizes and other programs outside of the Hoo-Hoo Club budget.
- 3.) Responsible for obtaining locations for programs.
- 4.) Responsible for all entertainment at club meetings such as speakers, bands for dances, etc.
- 5.) Responsible for all seating arrangements at the club programs such as head tables, etc.
- 6.) Responsible for food arrangements at all meetings.
- 7.) Responsible for communicating all programs to the membership such as location, type of program, time and date, etc.
- 8.) Responsible for all chairmanships assigned to him by the president.
- 9.) Responsible for coordination of golf events, and other special events that fall under club programming.
- 10.) Responsible for all other duties assigned to him by the president.

**SECOND VICE PRESIDENT** - Shall act as president in the absence of both the president and first vice president. (As sergeant at arms he shall attend all functions and maintain order.) He will also be responsible for the following obligations:

- 1.) Welfare of the club membership.

2.) Responsible for the phone committee and other important communications to the membership.

3.) Responsible for maintaining a complete and up-to-date membership roster.

4.) Maintain a complete and up-to-date identification label with correctly spelled names and Hoo-Hoo numbers for use at all meetings.

5.) Responsible for setting up all club concats and the selection of degree teams.

6.) Responsible for setting up orientation meetings for new members (kittens) coming into the club in order to make them aware of the fine organization they have joined and to help them feel at home in the club.

7.) Responsible for getting new members to attend our membership meetings.

8.) Responsible for all other duties assigned by the club president.

**SECRETARY-TREASURER** - Although some clubs have both a secretary and a treasurer, these duties are lumped into one office. Each club may decide which officer has what duties. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records of the club, account for all monies received and disbursed, and report to the board concerning the financial affairs. He shall be responsible for:

- 1.) Taking minutes for all board and special meetings, and making sure all officers and board members receive a typed copy of those minutes by the first of the following month after each meeting. He will also place a copy of these minutes in a centrally located place where the membership can read such.
- 2.) Read all minutes of meetings when requested.
- 3.) Responsible for giving financial report at board meetings or at membership meetings where deemed necessary.
- 4.) Responsible for working up an annual operating budget for the coming Hoo-Hoo year.
- 5.) Responsible for making sure that the club membership has an awareness of the club's financial condition at all times.
- 6.) Responsible for notifying the International office of the new club officers elected for the new Hoo-Hoo year prior to convention dates (in September) of each year.
- 7.) Responsible for the collection of both local and International dues and forwarding the International dues to the International office shortly after receipt.
- 8.) Responsible for sending club news with black and white pictures to the International office for publication in LOG & TALLY.



## THE ERNIE L. WALES STORY

### A Living Past Snark.....

**Ed. note: This is the eighth in a series of articles to appear quarterly in LOG & TALLY honoring our living past Snarks.**

Ernie L. Wales L 45412, Rameses #50, was initiated into Hoo-Hoo twice, first into Spokane Club #16 in 1935, and again into International Hoo-Hoo in early 1937, shortly after Int. Hoo-Hoo was re-organized. Sent by Club #16, Ernie and his lovely wife, Ellen attended the first convention after the re-organization in Chicago in September 1940. They have attended a dozen or so later International Conventions.

Ernie has served his Club #16 as Director, Vice-President, President, Vicegerent Snark, and now is Secretary-Treasurer. This seems rather permanent, as he keeps getting re-elected to that post year after year.

In 1954, Rameses Art Geiger appointed Ernie State Deputy Snark of Idaho, and he and others organized the North Idaho Hoo-Hoo Club in Coeur d' Alene. In September 1954, Ernie, Ellen and their sons, Kris and John drove to Houston, Texas for the Convention, and he was elected to the Supreme 9, and served 3 one year terms under Snarks John Dolcater, Dave Davis, and Cliff Schorling. During this time, he was instrumental, with the aid of Pat Sheehan and others, in founding the Northwest Montana Hoo-Hoo Club in Kalispell. He also aided Rameses Geiger in founding the Great Falls, Mont. Club.

At the Convention in Atlanta, Georgia in 1957 Ernie was elected Snark of the Universe, along with Supreme 9 members (1) Grover Perdue of West Hartford, Conn.; (2) Allen Seiffert of Davenport, Iowa; (3) James Miller of Seattle, Wash.; (4) Robert Mason of Memphis, Tenn.; (5) R.W. "Dick" Scott of Vancouver, B.C.; (6) Donald Bufkin of Alhambra, Calif.; (7) Hubert Heying of Kansas City, Mo.; (8) Charles Lampland of St. Paul, Minn. (9) Gene Madden of The Plains, Va. Rounding out this Board were Chairman Cliff Schorling; Vice-Pres. Harry Partridge; Secty (now Seer of the House of Ancients) Ben Springer; and Treasurer Edwin F. Fischer.

During his term as Snark, Ernie, and many times Ellen, and sometimes Kris and John, made official visitations to various Clubs in each of the 9 jurisdictions, and traveled 35010 miles by car, train, plane and ship to the four corners of the U.S. and to a few Clubs in Canada.

Active in Boy Scouts, Ernie has served on the Inland Empire Council Executive Board since 1958, and has served in many capacities, including that of Jamboree Chairman, Vice-Pres., President for two terms, and (presently) as Order of the Arrow Lodge Advisor. He has been awarded the Silver Beaver, and is also a Vigil Member of Order of the Arrow.

In 1958 (when Snark), Ernie led Scout Troop 4 to Vancouver, B.C., to camp a week at Camp Byng with Canadian Troop 43 under



leadership of Hoo-Hoo member Van Perry. In 1970, with Ellen's cousin Jack Eskeberg and other leaders, he accompanied 35 Explorer Scouts on a trip to Denmark and Norway. Ernie and Jack visited many of Ellen and Jack's relatives in Denmark, as well as Hoo-Hoo member, Royal Forester, Vagn Halskov Hansen #77466.

The Wales family has long been active in Hoo-Hoo. Ernie's late father, E.F. Wales was #33324; Ellen's late Uncle, Ingvard Eskeberg was #48683. Kris #74542 and John #75966 both worked in lumber mills, and both graduated from the University of Idaho and received their commissions in the U.S. Army Reserve. Kris served a year each at Ft. Bliss, Texas and in Korea. John served at Ft. Harrison, Ind., and at Ft. Bliss, Texas and in Korea John served at Ft. Harrison, Ind., and at Ft. Sheridan, Ill. At this time, he, Ellen and Ernie made an "official" call on Seer of the House of Ancients Ben Springer and then Hoo-Hoo headquarters in Milwaukee, Wisc. John, a C.P.A., is now a staff accountant with Price Waterhouse Co. in San Francisco, Calif., and retains his Hoo-Hoo membership. Kris is a former President and former Vicegerent Snark of Club #16, and is a Capt. in the U.S. Army Reserve. He is presently Manager of Waleswood, Inc. at Darby, Mont. He and his attractive wife, Jerilyn, have attended several Hoo-Hoo Conventions,

Len Putnam is now our Snark of the Universe. While serving as vice president, he had the responsibility of developing an educational program to be used by Hoo-Hoo. The new Hoo-Hoo film "The Forest Productive" is the cornerstone of that program. "If I've told you once...."

It's getting to be an old story, this business of lumbermen raping the forests, polluting the air with their sawdust burners, and the water with the chemical wastes from their pulp and paper plants. It can be read in the papers and heard on the radio and seen on T.V. and little old ladies and wet-nosed kids fresh from their sit-ins point their fingers at us and tell us to stop.

What are they talking about? Where do they get this information? We know about these ecology groups who go back in history to find a situation to exploit. They would be the first to complain if the price of paper for the printing of their magazines when sky-high because their demands for costly pollution equipment were complied with. Where do they expect to live if there is no lumber cut for housing? Don't they know we have a housing shortage? It's a big industry and where do they suppose all those people employed in it are going to work if all those timber cutting licenses are revoked? Anyhow, we're doing things different now. Haven't they seem those commercials on T.V.?

And how about forest fires, don't they know that forest management is a necessity to control this hazard and that more timber is burned this way than is cut? Look at the pollution from one of those. Oh boy, if only they would stop and think.

"Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me". Don't you believe it. Our industry can be and is being hurt this way.

Realize that we are being accused by people with genuine

motives. They want the cleanest possible world to enjoy and are not prepared to have it selfishly exploited.

Wake up! These citizens want nothing less than what you want. Do you honestly suppose these "all sweeping" arguments about jobs, and housing, and forest fires are satisfactory answers? Do you really think that were you in their shoes you would accept them? The truth of the matter is that these accusations by the public are really questions and you--the individuals in this industry--cannot answer them specifically and genuinely.

Large scale public education by specific firms is suspect. They have a corporate profit motive aura around their presentation which may colour it in the eyes of the public. But you are an individual in whom a neighbour can recognize similar desires to his own. You can discuss his misgivings with him and enlist his help in getting to the truth of a question.

Because you are a member of the industry, he rightly expects you to know the answers or to at least have a good understanding of the problem. He is not interested in your recording of reactionary replies as programmed by "Big Brother" anymore than you were interested in his hypercritical accusations.

Working in and with the individuals in your community to gain a proper knowledge of present day forest management will yield understanding and cooperation in achieving a balance of priorities. An industry that adopts an attitude of defence by the issuing of proclamations of virtue and statements of denial will soon find itself a fort under constant siege and the target of greater and greater resentment.

You must find out what is going on and share that knowledge. You should discuss the pros and cons of articles with interested neighbours and friends. Get involved and work on problems of ecology and conservation with them.

Hoo-Hoo is a non profit organization whose members are from the ranks of the forest in-

dustry. We owe it to ourselves, let alone anyone else, to find out what goes on and how our industry works today.

Noted wood carver, Mr. Gillies Bourgault, has been commissioned to carve a plaque that will be awarded annually to the project judged as the "Best of the Show" in our Industrial Arts Competitions.

Showing a carpenter at his bench, it will be exhibited in the gallery or showcase of the school attended by the winning student. It is a fitting way for us to honor the memory of Syd J. Illsley who worked so hard on behalf of our club and in the pioneering of the Industrial Arts Scholarship program. The carving was expected to be completed in March - prior to the 1972-1973 competition.

## Northwest Montana

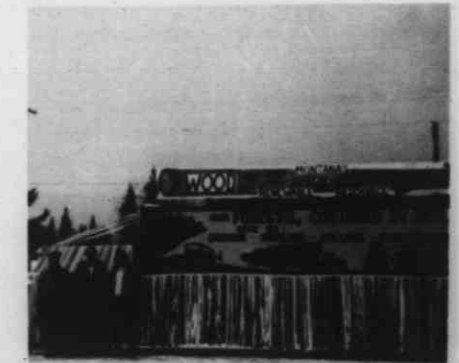
### Club #187

Club #155**

WHEREAS, The members of the North Idaho Hoo-Hoo Club in a meeting on February 15, 1973, at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, discussed with deep concern the alarming downward trend of timber being offered for sale on the National Forests of North Idaho as compared with the allowable annual timber cuts announced by these National Forest Timber Management Plans under sustained yield management; and

WHEREAS, The lack of making available for sale the announced allowable timber cuts and the reduction in sales volume of 40% or more during the past three years is having an adverse effect on the forest products economy of North Idaho and contributed to the shutdown of several small mills; and

WHEREAS, over 500 million board feet of merchantable timber is dying each year of overmaturity, insects and disease on the five National Forests of North Idaho including heavy concentrated losses of valuable white pine in roaded areas and in unroaded areas designated as non-wilderness; and

WHEREAS, most of this dying timber is not being harvested resulting in economic losses of millions of dollars annually to the people, U.S. Treasury and in dollar returns to county governments; and

WHEREAS, considerable amounts of appropriated timber sale funds and people are diverted to multiple-use and environmental studies leaving a shortage of funds at the ground level to prepare sales; and

WHEREAS, we recognize the need for balanced multiple-use environmental studies and the growing impact of environmental pressures on the use of land for timber production;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Idaho Hoo-Hoo Club, goes on record, on February 20, 1973, requesting that immediate action be taken to increase the sale of National Forest Timber in North Idaho to the full allowable cut as announced by National Forest Timber Management Plans under sustained yield management; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a more aggressive program be undertaken on all North Idaho forests to harvest the catastrophic losses of dying timber; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that additional funds and personnel be provided to perform the complicated and time consuming jobs associated with environmental studies before timber can be sold.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to all members of the Idaho Congressional Delegation, the Secretary of Agriculture and the Chief of the U.S. Forest Service.

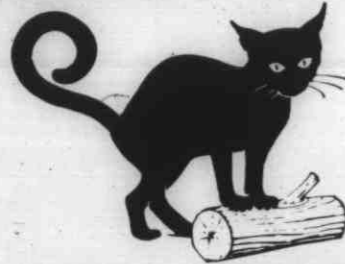

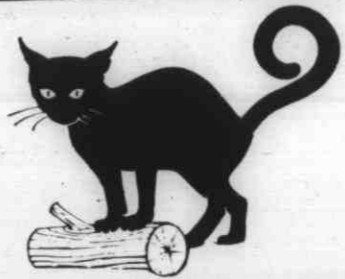

**Predict 1973 housing starts about 2 million**

Portland, Oregon, — A slight drop in 1973 housing starts from '72's record high has been predicted by an executive of the western lumber industry.

Speaking at the closing sessions of the Western Wood Products Association spring meeting in San Francisco, WWPA executive vice president H.A. Roberts said he looked for '73 housing starts to level off at 2 million, down 4 hundred thousand from 1972. However, he said, lumbermen could expect the reduced lumber use to be offset by increases in demand for lumber for remodeling, repair and industrial uses.

Forecasting that '73 would be "the second best year on record," Roberts further predicted that 1973's total lumber consumption would be 38.3 billion board feet, down 2.3 billion from the '72 level. He noted that the Association's 1972 prediction from the '72 level. He noted that the Association's 1972 prediction for total consumption was only 5 million board feet off actual figures for the year.

The forecast set coastal mill production for '73 at 300 million board feet less than a year ago and inland mill production to be off 400 million board feet for the same period.

WWPA is a trade association providing lumber grading, forestry, safety, transportation, statistical, marketing and technical services to western mills producing 40% of the nation's softwood lumber.

**Forest Expert Predicts Timber Supply Shortage**

EAST LANSING—More timber is being grown in the United States than is being cut, but Americans will still face a timber supply shortage during the next few decades, according to the chairman of the Department of Forestry at Michigan State University.

Speaking before the Michigan Natural Resources Council's annual conference in East Lansing recently, Dr. Lee M. James said that the present surplus of growth over removals in small softwoods and in hardwood species does not reflect the situation concerning sawtimber, which comes primarily from the large softwoods of the Western states.

"Prices tell a great deal about timber supply," said the MSU forester. "The wholesale price index for all commodities rose 20 percent from 1952 to 1969. After deflating stumpage price rises to account for the all-commodity price rise, we find that western softwood sawtimber doubled or tripled in real price, and that eastern hardwood sawtimber increased at least 40 percent in real price. Such large sawtimber price increments reflect an increasing scarcity—a shortage of supply in relation to existing demand."

James noted that even in the small timber markets, where Forest Service survey data suggest substantial timber growth surpluses, the surpluses are more apparent than real. In the South, for instance, pulpwood prices for both hardwoods and softwoods, increased more than all-commodity prices from 1952 to 1969. Only in the North did pulpwood prices remain essentially unchanged in relation to all-commodity prices.

"Projections of population and economic indicators promise vastly increased demands for

raw materials," said the forest economist. "For any given material, such as timber, the question is not whether supply and demand will balance. Price is the regulator and price changes will bring supply and demand into balance. The real question concerns the price necessary to achieve such a balance and what this means in terms of standard of living."

Citing figures from a recently completed Forest Service timber review, James pointed out the basic assumption that human population in the United States will increase about 40 percent, from 207 million in 1970 to 281 million in the year 2000. Gross National Product (GNP) is projected to rise to \$2.86 trillion by 2000; more than three times the GNP for 1970. Disposable income is also expected to triple, reaching \$1.95 trillion in 2000. It is estimated that per capita disposable income will be double the 1970 figure, reaching \$6,930.

"Using these figures, there is no way to balance future timber supply and demand under current levels of management if real price remains unchanged," warned James. "At 1970 prices, softwood sawtimber demand in the year 2000 will be 74 billion board feet, but available supplies with current management will fall short of projected demands by an estimated 20 billion board feet. By 1980, the deficit will already have reached 12 billion board feet.

"If, however, substantial increases in relative prices over 1970 are assumed—30 percent for lumber and plywood, 15 percent for miscellaneous products, and 10 percent for paper and paperboard—then available softwood sawtimber supplies are projected to 55 billion board feet in 2000

and demand is projected to 57 billion board feet, a deficit of only 2 billion board feet. This is the same as saying that a relative price rise of more than 30 percent in lumber and plywood will be necessary to scale down consumption to the level of the supply that will be available. The price increases necessary to do this could have a serious impact on housing, living standards, and the urban environment."

The outlook for hardwood sawtimber is somewhat brighter, but again, substantial increases in relative prices over 1970 levels will be necessary to balance demand with available supplies. Much of the growth and "available supply" of hardwood is in small tree sizes and species for which markets are extremely limited. Most of the hardwood timber cut, on the other hand, comes from larger sized trees and from preferred species. For such preferred material, harvest on a national basis has been close to, or above annual growth in recent years.

"For the pulp and paper industry, the outlook is more favorable since this industry can use small trees and low-quality material, including residues," James advised. "Nevertheless, this industry will also be affected by price increases and tighter supplies for lumber and plywood. Substantial amounts of sawtimber are cut for pulpwood. Price increases can be expected to spread to all sizes of material."

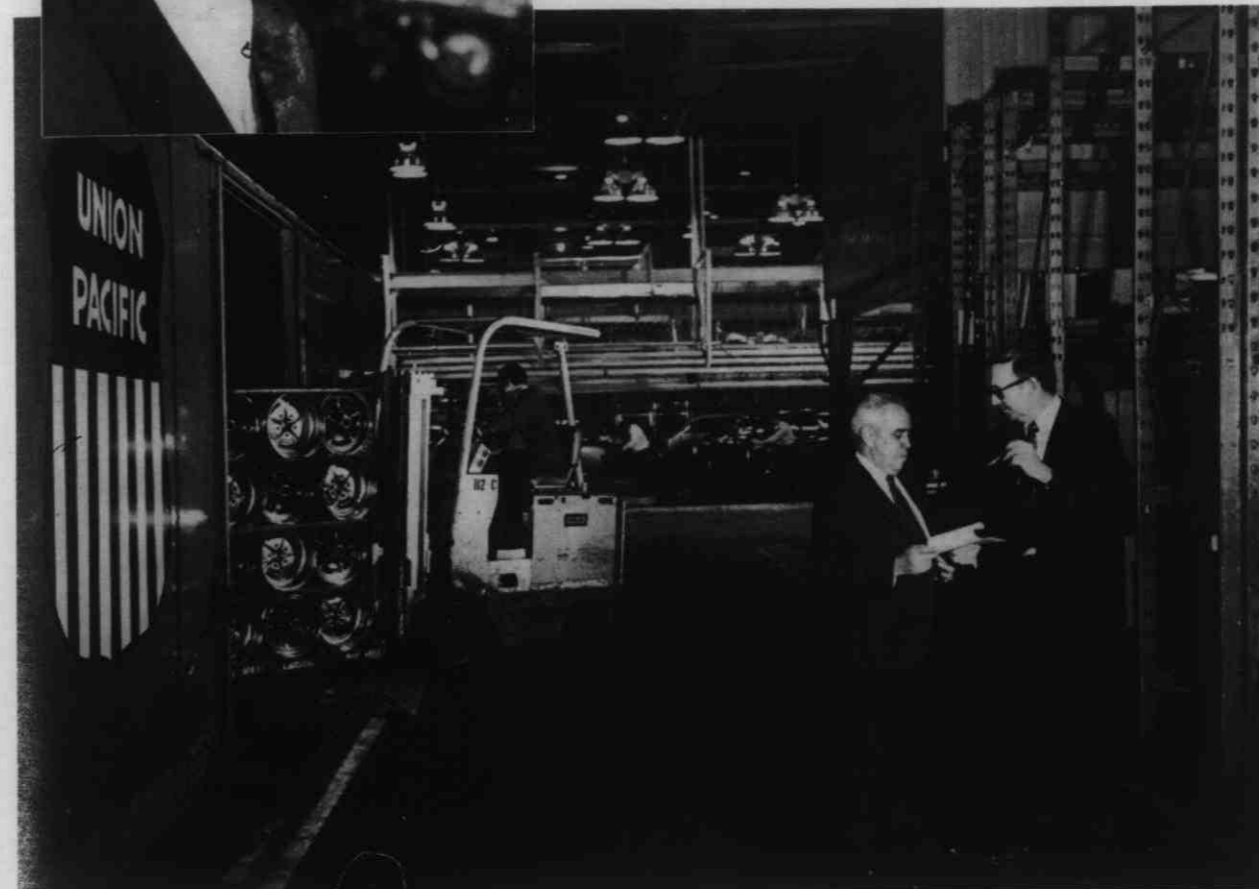
