THE HISTORY OF HOO-HOO

From humble beginnings to an International Organization

In the beginning, there were six men who were stranded by a delayed train. They were in the Hotel Hall at Gurdon, Arkansas. It was January 21, 1892. It was nine minutes past 3:00 p.m.

Earlier on that warm and sunny winter's day in Gurdon, a lumber trade journalist by the name of Bolling Arthur Johnson, had walked and talked with George Smith, who was then Secretary of the Southern Pine Association. Later, the conversation was continued in the company of other stranded rail travelers at the Hotel Hall. Johnson discussed an exciting idea that had been developing in his fertile mind over several months. In his attentive audience were William Eddy Barnes, another lumber trade journalist, George Washington Schwartz, a railroader and William Starr Mitchell, a daily newspaperman. During the spirited discussion they were joined by Rudolph A. Strauss, a Gurdon lumberman.

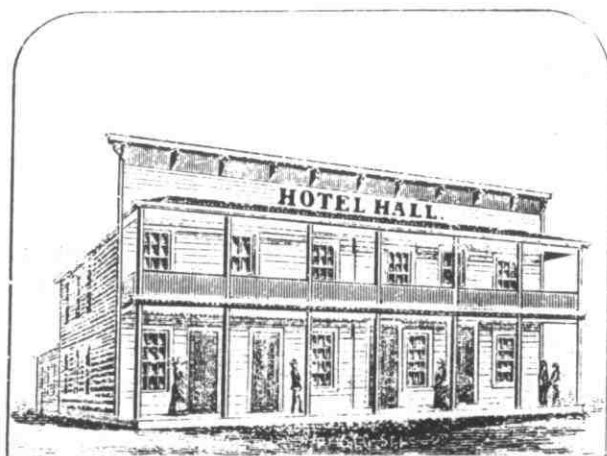
Visualize for a moment what we have here. Six men — two trade journalists, a daily newspaperman, a railroadman, an association secretary, AND ONE LUMBERMAN, all brought together by chance and circumstance, and all excitedly listening as Johnson explained his grand idea for the first nationwide lumberman's association. He wanted high ideals to the extent that it should promote the practice of a code of ethics nationwide. He also felt that the fun of fellowship should be one of the benefits of membership as fitted his jolly, mirthful nature.

Then and there this enthusiastic group of six men set about the task of forming the organization. It was nine minutes past three in Gurdon — The term "Hoo-Hoo" has been uttered for the first time only one month before this historic chance meeting of men. It had been coined by the same B. A. Johnson to describe an alarming tuft of hair (of approximately nine strands) that grew on the top of the otherwise bald head of lumberman Charles H. McCarer later to become Hoo-Hoo member number one and first snark.

Johnson, a learned man, delved into Egyptian lore for titles, customs and ritualistic suggestions. The sacred Egyptian black cat, with its tail curled into the figure nine, was chosen as the emblem for the Order. One of the reasons this symbol was selected was that many people believe a black cat to be unlucky and this Order, among other things, was to fight superstition and conventionalism. The theme of "9" from the mythical lives of a cat was carried through the organization in the number of jurisdictions, membership of executive committees, etc.

In 1921, 29 years after it had first been suggested by Johnson, Hoo-Hoo adopted a Code of Ethics. It was written by D. D. LeMaster 29727, our 30th Snark and who later held the position of Seer of the House of Ancients for many years. That Code, not

surprisingly, consists of nine sentences. (See Section 3).

Since its birth, Hoo-Hoo has grown steadily and become a major international body. Its only setback was during the depression years when the Order fell upon hard times. The six men who rescued and reorganized the Order have been awarded the title of "Hoo-Hoo Immortals." To date over 94,000 men have enrolled as members since that special day in Gurdon, 1892.

The spirit of Hoo-Hoo is expressed in its nine-point "GOLDEN RULE" which encourages members to be: fraternal, helpful, grateful, friendly, tolerant, progressive, industrious, loyal and ethical. Hoo-Hoo members also hold dear the "CODE OF ETHICS," which are:

- (1) To fill with credit the sphere in which we are placed without interfering with the rights of others.
- (2) To promote human advancement and higher standards of civic, social and economic relations by developing in business the spirit of the Golden Rule, which we accept as the basic principal of peace and prosperity for the world.
- (3) To establish the spoken word on the basis of the written bond.
- (4) To cultivate true friendship and therefore confidence between persons engaged in the lumber industry.
- (5) To conduct ourselves and our business so that we may render service to society.
- (6) To consider our vocation worthy and to be worthy of our vocation as the Nations home builders.
- (7) To assist liberally and sympathetically all that seek to elevate humanity, by charity of action and thought and by justice to all men.
- (8) To keep in view the world bonds of human interest and trade, seeking to promote friendly understanding among all nations and races.
- (9) To recognize the abiding power of co-operation and organization and so to act as individuals that the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo shall ever be regarded with honor as a source of community benefit and good will.

Hoo-Hoo believes that fraternal contact with live, energetic and progressive lumbermen in all branches of the business can provide us with valuable ideas and inspiration.

PROPOSAL TO CHANGE HHI BY-LAWS

During the 95th Annual Convention in Seattle in 1987, the delegates approved a proposal to change the age of eligibility in HHI from 18 years old to 21 years old to conform with the legal drinking age in many areas. This action proved to be undesirable due to the varied laws in certain nations, states, provinces and counties. Therefore, the committee on Legislation and Good of the Order makes the following proposal to accomplish the desired goal:

To change the by-laws of Hoo-Hoo International, Article II, Section 1 to read as follows: "ELIGIBILITY: The members of this Order shall be limited to male persons of the full age of eighteen (18) years with local clubs having the option to raise the age of eligibility up to twenty-one (21) years. These members shall be of good moral character, who are identified with one or more of the following business classifications:"

Hoo-Hoo International is honored this year to have been selected as the topic of a study project by the Global Studies Class of Gurdon High School.

The project has been underwritten by a grant from the National Geographic Society, and will attempt to bring about an exchange of information between students in Gurdon and Students in countries where Hoo-Hoo exists. To date, Hoo-Hoo members in Canada, Australia and New Zealand have been contacted in an effort to establish the initial groundwork which will lead to correspondence between the students in Gurdon and those in the other Hoo-Hoo countries.

Although the students have divided into separate groups to concentrate in individual projects, the main project is to formulate a video brochure of cultural information comparing everyday life in Gurdon with other areas - i.e. daily activities, school life, style of clothing, local economic information, etc. The students paid a visit to the HHI office and museum in February to get more

information on Hoo-Hoo and its international contacts.

The school has cooperated with this program in a variety of ways. Superintendent Bob Thompson called a student assembly at the high school on Thursday, March 10 at 1:29 p.m. to allow the students to hear an address by Snark Dick Campbell and to present a skit on the founding of Hoo-Hoo in 1892. In addition, the class planned a noon reception for the Hoo-Hoo members for Friday, March 11.

Faculty advisor Carolyn Kuhn wishes to thank Jan Hermans of Vancouver, British Columbia, Rod Abel of Queensland, Australia and Collin Perris of New Zealand for their assistance in helping set up the network of students for this exchange.

Hoo-Hoo International is proud to assist these students in this most worthy project, and we extend our thanks to National Geographic Society for approving their request to base their study on our fraternity.

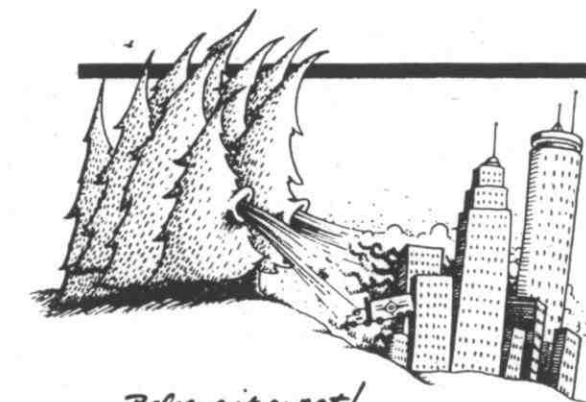

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WOOD PROMOTION IS IMPORTANT TO HOO-HOO AND THE WOOD PRODUCTS INDUSTRY

Clubs are encouraged to compete for the Wood Promotion trophy

The Hoo-Hoo International Wood Promotion trophy is awarded each year to the club which is judged as having best promoted the use of wood, whether locally, nationally or internationally. It is a coveted award that has recently enjoyed a resurgence of interest among Hoo-Hoo clubs who compete for the award at each annual international convention. Perhaps your club could be the next winner of the Wood Promotion award.

The purpose of a local Hoo-Hoo wood promotion project is to provide a local "grass roots" approach to wood promotion. The local program should supplement and tie in with the wood promotion activities of regional and national lumber associations and manufacturers. This "grass roots" local approach is actually more important than the national programs, because person to person contact and personal influence is a more effective method of selling our side of the wood resource story. Wood promotion projects should be designed to get the broadest local exposure possible to the greatest number of people and should be dramatic enough to have lasting value. Every person in a Hoo Hoo club's center of influence (city, country and state) should be aware of the role the forest products industry plays in forest maintenance, use and renewal.

SELECTION OF A WOOD PROMOTION COMMITTEE

The club president is responsible for wood promotion. He should appoint a wood promotion committee with a fireball type self-motivated committee chairman to handle the wood promotion project. The club president or another club officer appointed by

the president should maintain close contact with the wood promotion committee to be certain they are getting the job done. Committee members with sales experience, merchandising expertise, and public relations experience are the best types of members for the wood committee since a successful wood promotion project is actually a gigantic sales, merchandising, and public relations effort.

SPEAKERS, BUREAU ON WOOD PROMOTION

Every Hoo-Hoo Club should on a continuing basis, have knowledge lumbermen available for speaking engagements on wood promotion. Excellent programs on wood promotion are available from the various lumber associations like the American Plywood Association, Southern Forest Products Association, WWPA, California Redwood Association, etc. and from most lumber manufacturers like Georgia Pacific, Weyerhaeuser, etc. These organizations are most happy to supply local lumbermen with these programs for local use. The local chamber of commerce is a good place to advertise your wood promotion program as they usually offer a speakers bureau brochure to their members and are most happy to have "Wood Promotion" included.

An active committee can initiate wood promotion programs for social and business groups like Rotary, Kiwanis, Optimist, Lions, Cosmopolitan Clubs, etc. These wood promotion programs are very popular with these groups.

Public and private schools are quite receptive to wood promotion programs. The students are eager to hear our story and who could select a better audience to hear this important message than school children.

LOCAL EXPOSURE

Local public television is a natural for a local wood promotion program. Thirty minute program time for "Forestry" presentation on public television can be purchased at extremely reasonable rates. Imagine the exposure available through the TV media. Proper publicity of your TV wood program through free ads can insure a good viewing audience when your show is broadcast.

Radio, newspapers and magazines are also good vehicles for wood promotion activities, and Home Shows and Trade Shows have in the past proven to be quite effective.

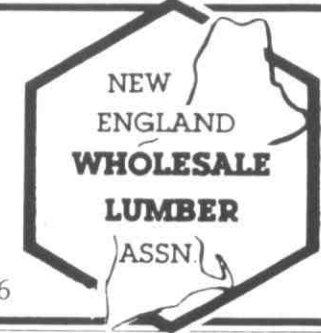

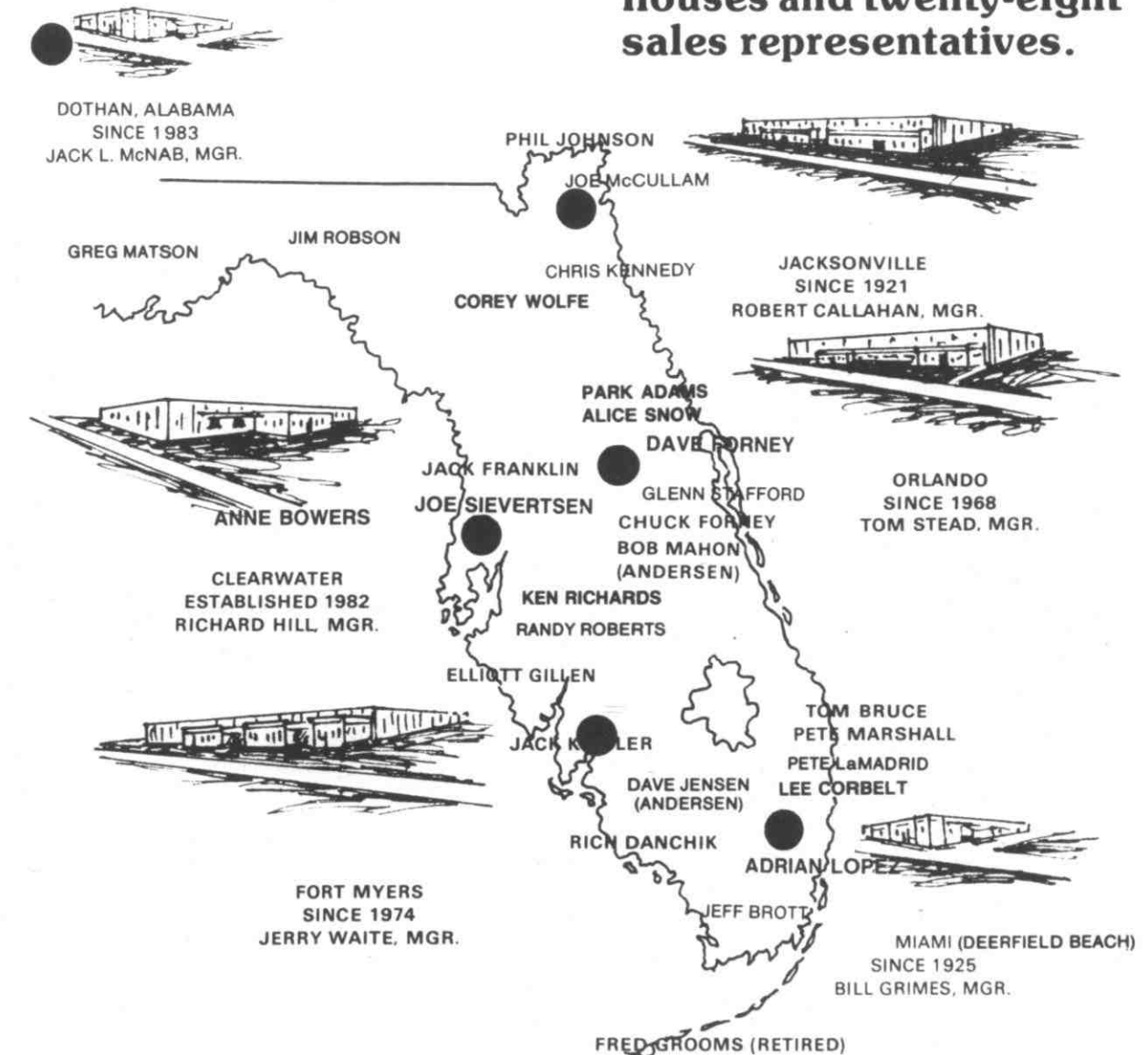

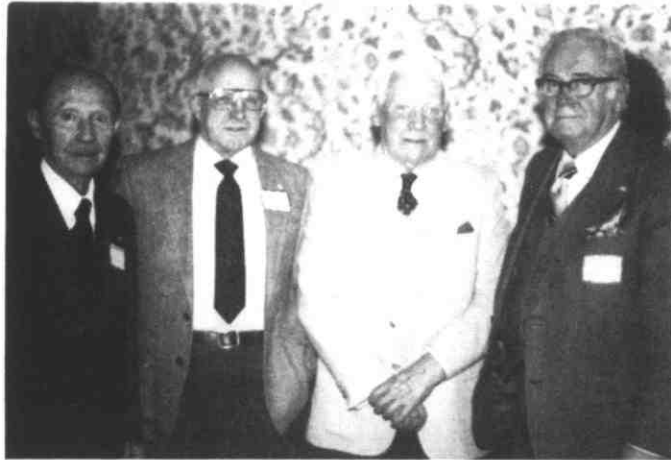
The Concat was held in what was originally the old stage house and horse barn, but recently modernized into a very attractive meeting room with many of the old trappings left in place.

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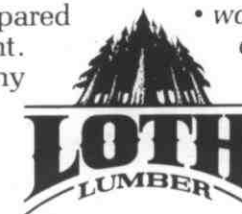

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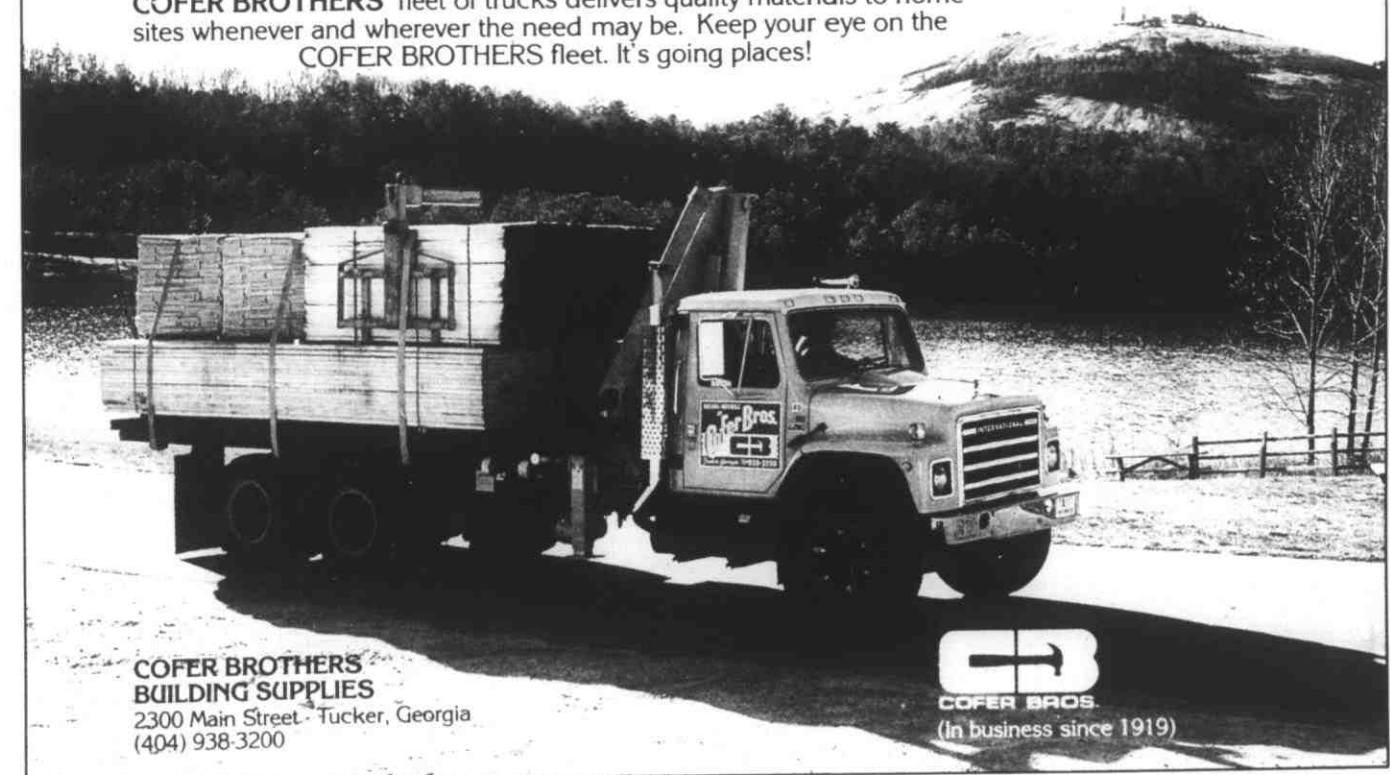
