


#### DAVID JONES L-82806

It was good to get back on the Supreme Nine.

The hot issue was the voting on the change to delete the word "male" and to change the percentage from 75% to 66-2/3%. Both lost, and the vote on deleting the word "male" lost by a higher number than it did at the last convention.

The big problem I found was that with the delegate locked to vote as directed by their members, when a fire broke out, there was no way we could change our vote. Look what took place: not one of the persons running for sec-

ond vice president attended the convention. I felt that unless they were sick or some serious family problem happened, they must be at the convention to run for office. I and others could not change our vote. If someone wanted to nominate from the floor, the only ones who could vote for that person were the non-committed delegates. So, if anyone was nominated, it was impossible to be elected. I really think the voting method now in force needs to be changed, or at least the S9 delegate should be given the thoughts on what their members think. but he should not be locked in, as when he gets to the convention the ground can change, and that is what took place this time. I hope next time our members will give the delegate the authority to vote as he sees it on the ground. (Would you send your congressmen/senator to Washington this way with a locked in vote and no escape route?)

We have a membership problem. The new Snark, Brent Crosby, at our Board Meeting on Thursday, stated that during his year in office MEMBERSHIP WILL BE THE TOP OF THE AGENDA. He wants all clubs to boost their numbers by more than 10%. When I served on the Nine back in 1964, we had 12,000 members. Now we have 5795 in the U.S. and Canada. Without an increase in membership, the cash flow at the International will become very dangerous. In fact, it was brought up that we need to ask each club to send in \$1000 between now and December 31, 1991. I hope you all will join in and support this issue.

I did bring up the subject that there is no MARKETING MANAGER. What business can survive without a marketing plan and someone to push it? I am hoping that during my two years in office, we will all work together and develop strong working committees in each club to bring in new people plus those that dropped out.

Let's make them fight to join our great FRATERNAL ORDER OF LUM-BERMEN, CALLED HOO-HOO.

## 1990 CONVENTION REPORT

The presentation of flags and national anthems for the United States, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand and the state of Hawaii began the 98th Annul Hoo-Hoo International Convention at 8:29 a.m. on Monday, September 10, 1990, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Oakland, California. Following an invocation by Father John LoSchiao, S.J., President, University of San Francisco, the group was led in a Hoo-Hoo yell by Rameses Dick Wilson.

Day Chairman Scott Fossum welcomed the delegates to Oakland on behalf of the host Oakland Club #39, then introduced Snark of the Universe Lyle Hoeck who was greeted with a standing ovation. Following the introduction of the Snark, Mr. Fossum introduced Dan Bonningoton, General Chairman, who also extended a welcome to the delegates.

The convention was officially called to order at 8:39 a.m. by Snark Lyle Hoeck who then called on Secretary/ Treasurer Bernie Barber, Jr., to conduct an offical tally of the clubs represented at the convention. The tally concluded that the following clubs were represented: Atlanta #1, Los Angeles #2. San Diego #3, Harry Folsom #13, Spokane #16, Houston #23, Detroit #28, San Joaquin Valley #31, Seattle #34, Oakland #39, Portland #47, Vancouver #48, Roger Williams #51, Toronto #53, Central New Mexico #69, Tacoma-Olympia #89, Washington, D. C. #99, Iowa #102, Granite State #107, Sacramento #109, Coast Counties #114, Sioux Valley #118, Omaha #124, Ken Hallgren #139, Honolulu #142, Black Bart #181. Victoria #183, Hawkeye #193, Sydney #215, Winema #216, Melbourne #217. Brisbane #260, Maui #270, and Sunshine State #271.

Following the club tally, Snark Hoeck introduced the Rameses present: Rameses 50 Ernie Wales; Rameses 52 Dick Scott; Rameses 72 Jimmy Jones;

Snark Hoeck called on Internation First Vice President Brent Crosby to read a list of Hoo-Hoo brothers who had passed away during the year. The delegates then observed a moment of silence in memory of these Hoo-Hoo brothers.

Snark Lyle Hoeck reported that after receiving the resignation of Billy Tarpley in October of 1989, he formed a committee to take up the matter in Gurdon on October 28th. He said that this committee's decision had been unanimous to hire Beth Thomas as manager with Vicki Hughes as her assistant and Joyce Taylor editor for the Log & Tally. He said he felt the committee had done the right thing as all of them went on to do a great job.

Snark Hoeck reported that the Executive Committee held a meeting on May 5, 1990, during the J-IX mini-convention in reference to accepting the resignation of Laurn Champ as Chairman of the Centennial Committee. Jimmy Jones was elected to fill this chairmanship.

International First Vice President Brent Crosby reported that nominations had been received and recorded on behalf of the following: Brent Crosby,



Snark of the Universe; Jeff Loth, International First Vice President; Dave Blasen, Lee Stacey and Worral McCarthy, International Second Vice President; Bernie Barber, Jr., International Secretary/Treasurer; Manny Litvin, Supreme Nine of J-II; Fred Scheffler, Supreme Nine of J-III; Kevin French, Supreme Nine of J-IV; Dave Jones, Supreme Nine of J-VI; and Robert Creel, Supreme Nine of J-VIII.

International Secretary/Treasurer Bernie Barber, Jr., reported members equity is \$95,635; total revenue \$147,200; total expenses \$146,248 with income in excess of expenses of \$952. He said income received from dues had been less than budgeted and expenses had also been less than budgeted. A complete auditor's report is printed on page 20 of this Log & Tally.

Chairman Phil Cocks read the office manager's reports. Following the reading of the manager's reports by Phil Cocks, the Supreme Nines from J-IV, J-V, and J-VI gave their reports.

There was a discussion regarding the procedure as to whether the first amendment to vote on would be the reduction from 75% to 2/3 rule to amend the by-laws. The board decided to vote on deletion of the word "male" first and then vote on the percentage change.

At luncheon there was an excellent address by Mr. Kevin Eckery, Vice President of the Timber Association of California. He discussed the tremendous importance of three measures on the California ballot, one of which was sponsored by the Timber Association and other industry leaders.

Following lunch the Snark announced subjects for round table discus-

sions. There were nine items assigned with an officer or a Supreme Nine member to chair each round table discussion.

ROUND TABLE DISCUSSIONS

Item #1 - Is Current Dues Structure Satisfactory? Bernie Barber reported that the members met and discussed the dues issue and also local dues that each club sets themselves. The final decision was that the present dues structure is satisfactory.


Item #4 - Is the Current Jurisdiction Geographical Structure Adequate? This committee was handicapped by not having a map of the jurisdictions. It was suggested that this question be more fully developed at the mid-term board meeting.

Item #5 - What Can We Do To Promote More Interest In The Hoo-Hoo Club? The committee came up with the following: Resell the basics of the value of being a Hoo-Hoo member; have businesses support their employees participating in Hoo-Hoo clubs; and Hoo-Hoo needs to be sold to businesses and industry.

Item #6 - Methods of Increasing Membership and Retention. Mr. Crosby deferred to Scribe Bill Sullivan who reported the following suggestions: hold a concat at lumbermens' conventions once a year; have meetings in other towns; solicit from lumber related businesses; and membership retention. Mr. Sullivan reported the committee also discussed reinstatements and had the following suggestions: go after retirees and dropouts; check the non-active roster from International; and have a club reunion.

Item #7 - If the Word "Male" is Deleted, How Should We Handle Concats? This committee stated that each club is unique in background and history and the uniqueness of each club in each particular area should be kept, but tone down the concat a little so it is done in a more tasteful way.

Item #8 - Should Hoo-Hoo Have a Full Time Ambassador in Addition to the Snark? Mr. Scheffler reported the overall consensus of this discussion was that if the Deputy Supreme Nines are doing their jobs and contacting the clubs then it should be enough. There is a need to have the Snark keep his eyes on

the reports, making sure everything is going well with that particular jurisdiction. It was suggested that the budget for the Supreme Nines be increased to include mailings, phone calls, etc.

A report on the roundtable discussion "Is The System of Voting Adequate or Fair?" is published in this issue of the Log & Tally on page 18.

Snark Hoeck then introduced the candidates for office. Each candidate present made a brief presentation. The meeting was adjourned for individual jurisdictional caucuses. During the evening there was a delightful cruise of San Francisco Bay with dinner and dancing.

Tuesday was set aside for golf at the Alameda Golf Course and a wine tour of the Napa Valley via bus with a luncheon served at the V Sattui winery. An excellent tour was arranged by Black Bart Hoo-Hoo Club Chairperson. Dave Jones did an outstanding job. The tours of both V Sattui and Inglenook wineries were very intersting and, of course, there was ample time for the delegates to purchase wine from the two wineries.

The Wednesday, September 12, 1990, business session began with the presentations for the Wood Promotion and the Jack Cheshire Media Award. The judging for both awards was performed by the Rameses who selected Brisbane Hoo-Hoo Club #218 as the Wood Promotion winner and Seattle Hoo-Hoo Club #34 as the Jack Cheshire Media Award winner

LEGISLATION AND GOOD OF THE ORDER. Mr. Wilson reported that his committee was asked by the board to address the problem of voting. He said his committee recommends that the new Snark appoint a committee to address the following flaws in the voting procedure:

1. We recommend that no deadline should be imposed on the voting procedure, that the 10 days presently was causing concern.

We recommend that on absentee voting the votes should be sealed up to the time of the counting.

3. To have the board address the problem of the nominations from the floor. Under the present system the nominees from the floor have little or no chance of being elected.

4. The Snark and the Board has the authority to replace any Supreme Nine member. The board is asked to refine the entire voting procedure.

5. We recommend that the new Snark should appoint all standing committees by late October of the next Hoo-Hoo year.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE.

Jack Jacobson gave a report which is published on page 20 of this Log & Tally.

BUDGET COMMITTEE. Mr. Barber reported that the Budget Committee consisted of Jimmy Jones, Jack Jacobson, Brent Crosby, and Jeff Loth. He said Jeff Loth had been called away and Al Meier had taken his place on the committee. He said the committe reviewed all the proposed and projected income and projected expenses for the

coming year. He said they were proposing a balanced budget so there is no deficit projected in the budget.

MEMBERSHIP AND RETENTION. Mr. Crosby reported that the membership committee suggested that we work toward a membership increase of 10% in the 1990-1991 year. He said there were problems in the industry with closing of lumber yards and manufacturing, etc. He said the committee agreed that retention is as important, if not more important, than gaining new members. He said to work for new quality members and take care of your kittens for at least the first year and to retain your existing membership by interesting programs, etc.

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REDWOOD GROVE COMMITTEE. Mr. Jones reported that the new Highway 101 bypass was still not completed, but he understood that once it was complete, access would be given to the grove.

FOREST PRODUCTS EDUCA-TION. Mr. Dave Jones reported that the purpose of this committee was to encourage clubs to get more involved in the forest products industry's environmental affairs. He said the committee was made up of each Supreme Nine member, with Fred Scheffler and himself as co-chairmen. He encouraged all clubs and Supreme Nines, as well as International officers, to encourage activities that would promote the forest industry and educational activities for the clubs, members and guests.

PROJECT LEARNING TREE. Mr. Scheffler stated that Project Learning Tree is an award-winning environmental educational program designed for teachers and other educators working with students and uses the forest as a window into nature's world, helping young people gain awareness and knowledge of the world around them, as well as their place within it. He said that what Project Learning Tree was asking for was people from the industry to come in and explain industry related items and help set up workshops. Chris Goff said that a lot of the negative part of our industry is coming from teachers and going to our kids, and Project Learning Tree helped change that. Chris encouraged everyone's support.

ADVERTISING. Mr. Loth reported that he took on a challenge and told the Snark and others that the next issue of the Log & Tally would double the 12 ads it presently had. He said he appointed his committe which consisted of the Surpreme Nine.

PUBLICITY. Mr. Olliver reported that he was working on the video tape about Hoo-Hoo. He said he was going to get someone to do the narration, and he also requested help in getting this going.

OPERATIONS MANUAL. Mr. Barber said there were obviously some changes needed in the manual pertaining to what happens at this convention. He said the by-law changes, if either were approved, would have to be included. He said he also thought the voting procedure would have to be changed, but this would have to be delayed until the procedure had been determined by the Board of Directors at the mid-year meeting. He said a decision should be made whether to mail out Log & Tally, November 1990, Page 17

## SUBJECT - IS THE SYSTEM OF VOTING ADEQUATE OR FAIR?

Panel Members: Neil Olliver S-9, JIV, Chairman; Pat Storey; Rameses Dick Wilson; Rameses Dick Campbell; Lee Roberts, and Rameses Dan Brown.

All agreed that the voting system at Oakland was fair and the best opportunity for each member and club within Hoo-Hoo to at least have a say in the running of Hoo-Hoo. We just felt the new system with proxy votes needed refining.

With absentee voting now applicable, the deadline of 10 days prior to the commencement of the International Convention should be dropped, and a

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deadline of lunchtime on the publicized voting day be used.

Voting papers should clearly state to the clubs that their delegate must vote per the club's wishes or at the delegate's discretion.

We felt that under the current system of notifying HHI exactly how a club wished to vote left a lot to be desired, and it did give an opportunity for one or two senior members to lobby delegates who had discretionary powers from their club. We felt that no one should have this power, nor should they be placed in a situation where anyone could accuse

them of doing anything wrong. To overcome this slight problem, we felt that each club vote should be in a sealed envelope, brought along by the S-9 or delegate.

This group was only a discussion committee. We would like the Resolutions Committee to discuss this subject further and make a recommendation to the current Board refining the voting procedures.

#### SUBJECT--MEMBERSHIP: WAYS TO INCREASE, RETENTION OF MEMBERS, AND REINSTATEMENT OF MEMBERS

The subject of the discussion for our group was membership, including a) ways to increase, b) retention of members, and c) reinstatement of members.

The group was chaired by now Snark of the Universe, Brent Crosby. Participants included: Steve Springer, Sioux Valley #118, Fred Frudd, Victoria, B.C. Club #183, Bob Creel, Hawkeye Club #193, George Reneaud, Harry Folsom Club #13, Carle Hall, Iowa Club #102, and Bill Sullivan. Coast Counties #114.

Suggestions for increasing membership in Hoo-Hoo included:

- a) have a booth at a lumber convention, building supply fair, etc.
- b) hold meetings in the adjoining towns near the local clubs headquarters, so as to accommodate other areas.
- c) use the untapped source of cabinet shops, many of which use substantial amounts of lumber supplies. Also, related industries, such as insurance companies, machinery suppliers,

trucking companies, park rangers and foresters, all of which should have some connection with the timber industry.

Some ideas for membership retenion included:

a) good, interesting programs must be offered by the local clubs.

b) have a member assigned the task of seeing to it that new members return to all club meetings.

c) involvement of everyone in the club is essential, either by official duties, board of directors, or committee participation. Some members are just waiting to be asked!

Reinstatement of members is of prime importance:

- a) what about those retired from the industry? That doesn't mean they have to retire from the fellowship of Hoo-Hoo.
- b) what about those drop-outs? Find out why they quit. Did they lose interest or just have a conflict of time?

- c) check out the non-active roster with the international office. Then follow-up by contacting those that have been determined to be non-active.
- d) how about a club reunion? Invite past presidents and officers and honor them by some form of recognition. Also have an "Old Timers Night" and get those older guys to a meeting maybe by offering them a ride.

In conclusion, some great ideas were discussed, but ultimately it is our job as members to carry out these suggestions. Don't think that you will let the other guy do it. Take responsibility and do it yourself. you will undoubtedly feel richer, the club will benefit, and Hoo-Hoo ideals will be propagated throughout the universe!

## IMPROVEMENTS BENEFIT HOO-HOO MUSEUM

During the past year the Hoo-Hoo Museum has been improved. This work included painting the front door, front windows, a large portion of the ceiling in the building, and some of the exterior windows; replacing broken window panes; bracing around the central unit; installing a lock on the back door; and other minor repair jobs. Recently, three ceiling fans were installed, adding to the appearance and comfort of the building. Charles Cabe is a member of the Old State House Museum Associate Board, and his effort in getting this recognition for HHI is greatly appreciated.

On September 25, 1990, the Hoo-Hoo Museum served as a site for a seminar for small museum curators. Various sites around the state of Arkansas were selected to sponsor seminars, and HHI was honored that the Hoo-Hoo Museum was asked to participate as a preferred site.

The museum remains in sound financial condition with \$410.36 in checking; \$10,177.88 in savings; and a \$12,000.00 certificate of deposit for total assets of \$22,588.24.

The museum continues to seek interesting artifacts regarding Hoo-Hoo or the lumber industry. Contributions are always welcome. **HOO-HOO HISTORY**



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
Our first regular fall meeting was held September 4th. This is the first Tuesday after Labor Day weekend, and it is hard to get the membership out after a three-day weekend.





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

LEGEND - At 94, Margaret Champ celebrates a lifetime of raising level of politics

When the grandame of Kansas politics takes a bow at her birthday celebration today, Kansas on both sides of the political fence will be cheering. Margaret Champ, 94, founder of the West Side Democrats and adviser and helpmate to Democratic candidates across the state, has done more to influence politics for good than perhaps any other living Kansan. Along the way, she has raised seven children, and given her time and money to countless political and community projects.

U.S. District Judge Frank Theis once called her the "field general of the Democratic Party," when he was national Democratic committeeman for Kansas and she was Sedgwick County Democratic chairman. The description was ant.

Every year for the past 25 years, Mrs. Champ's German sausage supper at Schulte has kicked off the election season for Sedgwick County Democrats. The proceeds go to the West Side Democrats, who then disperse the funds as needed across Kansas. Mrs. Champ still sells many or most of the tickets herself. It's not without reason she also is called "Mrs. Democrat" in Kansas.

Her surviving children, Grant, Laurn, and Laurie, recall she always insisted they go to church, and wouldn't let them read the Sunday paper until they had gone to early services. "The first hour belongs to the Lord," she would say.



Hoo-Hoo has lost one of its strongest supporters with the passing of Louis Cabe on August 8, 1990. To those in Hoo-Hoo who knew him personally, Louis Cabe was "Mr. Hoo-Hoo". The list of his efforts in support of Hoo-Hoo is long, but probably the most obvious and the most impressive effort was his work helping to acquire the building which today houses Hoo-Hoo International and the Hoo-Hoo Museum. JOHN HARDEN BREEDLOVE #83175 died recently following an illness. John worked for Payless and West Cash and Carry. A memorial scholarship fund has been set up at his alma mater, The Citadel College, located in Charleston, South Carolina.

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


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
