The sponsor, at the time of signing the form, must be financial. Non financial sponsor members are not eligible to be in the draw. Non financial sponsor members may pay their dues at the same time as the new member submission is made.

**How will the \$5000/US reward be issued?** When the winner is drawn the he/she will be notified and sent a \$5000/US Mastercard Money Card funded by Ron Gattone. Upon receipt of the money card, the winner will contact Ron Gattone by e-mail (*ron@crescenttimber.com.au*) advising Ron that he/she has received the money card. #### Reporting makes us a stronger team

By now each club secretary should have received, through their S9, three club reporting forms, namely: Club Information Form, Club Reporting Form, and Membership & Activity Report Form. These forms have been designed and implemented to make the job for club officers easier and to begin a united process in the collection of information in a formalized way, and to extract statistics from that information for promotional and marketing purposes. If your club has not received these forms, please contact your S9. Also by now, each club should have completed and forwarded: the Club Information Form (completed once a year); Club Reporting form (completed after every club meeting) and Membership & Activity Report (completed four times a year on January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 30) in the case of North America and Canada; and in J-IV on March 30, June 30, September 30, and December 30.

#### The man behind the mission:

The company employes about 15 people, up from the seven that were there when he took over, and went from monthly revenues of around \$90,000 to over \$200,000 within six months. He's now ready to bring the same dedication to Hoo-Hoo.

"It's a challenging time for Hoo-Hoo and I'm hoping that during my term I can make some long term and fundamental changes that will benefit the organization," Ron said.

Asked if Hoo-Hoo is still relevent in today's market, he replied, "It is very relevant in the industry today. It is vital in terms of the fraternal atmosphere it provides, and the good will it can produce in the community."

LOG & TALLY has been inviting members to answer nine questions about what Hoo-Hoo means in their lives both professionally and personally. We've gotten great responses! What we are finding is people join Hoo-Hoo for a variety of reasons, and as a group, there is no one answer. We hope this series will bring you insight on how others enjoy the benefits of membership and maybe inspire you to ask: Why am I a Hoo-Hoo?

## Why Am I a Hoo-Hoo?

#### Nine questions about what Hoo-Hoo means to me—

- **1. When and why did you join Hoo-Hoo?** When I joined Hoo-Hoo in 1960, I was new in the lumber business and I quickly learned, if you weren't a member of Hoo-Hoo, you would never be considered a true lumberman. Hoo-Hoo was great for me over 50 years ago and it is just as great for me today.
- **2. What do you do for a living?** I'm retired from the retail lumber business and am enjoying the fruits from the lumber industry. I honestly owe a lot of my success to Hoo-Hoo and the friends and connections I made through this organization.
- **3. Which club do you belong to and what do you like about them?** I belong to Tacoma-Olympia Club 89 in Tacoma, Washington. I like our club because we have a lot of middle age and younger members who are full of energy and excited about making things happen. We have several wife and husband members, and in some cases, both have gone through our Officers chairs. It is also great for attendance.
- **4. Who or what in Hoo-Hoo has been an inspiration?** I think as a young man growing in the industry, I was most impressed by the people who were chosen to be our next leaders. At one time, we had close to 200 active members, and believe me, you had to be pretty sharp and well liked to get on our board. I think as a younger member, it was always my inspiration to become a board member of the Tacoma Olympia Hoo-Hoo Club.
- **5. What are your goals in Hoo-Hoo?** Guess at 85 years of age, I am a bit limited on what I can do, but our Club is starting on a project to build decks on homes of wounded veterans. I hope to do everything in my power to help them accomplish that. I also plan to help promote Hoo-Hoo locally in both Jurisdiction III and internationally every chance I get.

**Get to know Al Meier:** As a patriarch in our Hoo-Hoo family with over 50 years of membership, Al and his wife, Georgia, have attended 45 international conventions and have made amazing friends all over the world as a result of his travels. Born in South Dakota just before the Great Depression, this farm raised boy moved with family to Tacoma, Washington. On his 17th birthday he joined the Navy during WWII and fought in most of the major battles in the Pacific. He was in Tokyo Bay at the signing of the Japanese surrender.

After the war, Al was a professional firefighter back in Washington working off days stacking lumber. Circumstances gave him an opportunity to partner in that yard and eventually he become sole owner. Al grew that one yard into seven home centers and a distribution yard before he sold the company and retired well. He has been very active in his home Tacoma Olympia Club 89, and as a Rameses and member of the Hoo-Hoo House of Ancients.

#### THE NINE QUESTIONS

- **6.** How has Hoo-Hoo benefited you personally and professionally? I really believe going to Hoo-Hoo meetings and meeting our competitors, suppliers, and mill operators, as well as all their sales staff, did the most to help me become a successful professional lumberman. Knowing all these people and having them share their success story and to see what could be accomplished helped me personally throughout my life.
- **7. What experience have you most enjoyed in Hoo-Hoo?** Going through the chairs of our local club, and then again at International to become the Snark of the Universe has to be one of the most enjoyable times in anyone's lifetime. Then to be able to meet, eat, and drink with people in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, as well as our great U.S.A. Can you imagine all the joy and knowledge you can pick up from that many people in our industry? What joy and what memories!
- **8. What surprised you most about Hoo-Hoo?** I guess what surprised me most when I first joined Hoo-Hoo was how friendly and supportive all our competitors were, and how our suppliers and mill people supported us and encouraged us. I can't think of any other organization or place this could of happen, other than Hoo-Hoo. I was also surprised by the huge area Hoo-Hoo covered. Just by going to an International convention you can easily make friends from all over the world that will last the rest of your life.
- **9. What is the most important thing you would tell someone about Hoo-Hoo?** Become a member in your area. Attend meetings regularly. Get involved in what is going on in your club. Do your best to get on the Board of Directors. Attend an International Convention, it won't be your last. Don't be afraid to shake a stranger's hand. Invite your friends and coworkers to become members. Seriously read and take to heart the Hoo-Hoo Code of Ethics, and follow the Golden Rule.

On TV the other day I saw a beautiful young lady with her handsome husband who had lost both arms and legs to a roadside bomb. They were in Washington D.C. before a Congressional committee begging them to give enough money to wounded veterans so they could live a decent life. I can tell you watching that made me want to get out and show my love and support for those people who have given so much and have so little.

#### **About The Deck For A Soldier Program**

NADRA states that it launched its Deck For a Soldier<sup>™</sup> program in 2007 when an inquiry came across the NADRA website. Sergeant Thomas placed an inquiry to NADRA member, Sawdust, Ltd. of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, through *www*. *NADRA.org*, in anticipation of scheduling a deck build when she returned home. Here, the idea of building a "Deck for a Soldier™" was born. This is a community effort that expresses our appreciation for the service and dedication of the men and women of our armed forces.

The program is a charitable outreach that works with a variety of people to supply, free of charge, an exterior structure to enhance the lives of a military family. Projects are completed with donated design, materials and manpower. The response and support NADRA has received for this project is unbelievably wonderful. NADRA members and friends are not only giving something back to tour soldiers, but they are getting their members and potential new members involved in their association.



## **Your Best Club Activity Could Be a Winner**


We invite you to enter your club in the HHI Club Project Award contest. These are the rules:

The club may submit only one project adopted by the club. The entrant Club will make its presentation to the judges at the Convention. The project must be submitted by the club delegate or his representative, who must be conversant with the project from start to finish. He or she may be interviewed by the judges. The evidence may consist of newspaper clippings, photos, video and/r other audio visual means. Necessary equipment needed for the presentation will be provided; however, the club must let the international office know of their need one (1) month prior to the Convention.

The presenting club is to notify Hoo-Hoo International one (1) month prior to the Convention of their plan to have an entry.

Each participating club must submit a written outline of the project to contain the following: 1. A description of the project; 2. The goal of the subject; 3. The method of operation; and, 4. The relative proportion of financial and/or manpower support by club. Do not send club contest materials to the International Office. The Club delegate or the Club representative is responsible for bringing the material to the Convention.

Decision of the judges will be final. An award will be awarded for First Place; certificates will be given to Second and Third Place winners. ## Finding the Hoo-Hoo Icon in Unlikely Places

— ву Doug Howick L80748 I have long been fascinated with Hoo-Hoo products and articles, particularly those which carry our logo. In more recent years, these have mostly been restricted to badges, pins, neckties and special items such as mugs, glasses, and of course, the famous Hoo-Hoo "Cat Shirts" produced by the Honol-Hoo-Hoo Club, aka Honolulu 142.

However, my historical searches have revealed that for many years, enterprising Hoo-Hoo members and others have been proud to use the logo and/or their Club name on all sorts of unlikely items. Here are five of them.



#### **Bank Checks:**

These days, who would think of having the Hoo-Hoo logo on their company checks? Certainly, back in the early 1900s, the A. B. Brock Lumber Company in Beaumont, Texas, did just that. In addition to the March 24, 1903, check for \$350 shown, I also have a copy of one for \$2 written on 27 July, 1900, and another for \$26 written on February 26, 1901.

The icon of Hoo-Hoo, our Great Black Cat, was often used by members in the early days on their business forms, as in this case on checks, by A.B. Brock Lumber in Beaumont, Texas. This cancelled check is from 1903.

#### **Cribbage Board:**

Ninety years after that check was written, Paulina Hoo-Hoo Club 220 based in Redmond, Oregon, had a special wooden cribbage board created for the Golf Tournament for Central Oregon Lumbermen held at the Pineville Golf and Country Club in Pineville, Oregon.

I was lucky enough to spot this one on eBay last year, but when I made a bid for it, I was informed that the company that had it up for sale would only deal with purchasers in the USA—and I'm in Australia! As you might expect, I didn't let a little thing like

that worry me and I had it mailed to Rameses 81 Phil Cocks, who then posted it straight on to me.

It happens that now that I'm "semi-retired", Sigrid and I play crib for an hour (three games) almost every day. We previously used a "racetrack" type board that I bought in the company of fellow Hoo-Hoo Fred Frudd on the ferry between Vancouver and Vancouver Island in 1981. However, that has now been consigned to the back of the cupboard and the Paulina Hoo-Hoo board is the one we use every day.

I've been a little disappointed—and surprised—that the Hoo-Hoo Cat logo on this board is orange, and not black, but at the time of writing this tale,



Cribbage anyone? You could play a few games in this board created for the Paulina Club.

#### HOO-HOO HISTORY

I've found an almost identical, but undated one (with a black cat) on eBay. I wonder who will end up with that one! I hear Rameses 96 Dave Jones had been watching it and lost out in the last second!

#### **Tobacco:**

How many members smoke a pipe? I'm fairly sure that the few who do, never smoked Hoo-Hoo tobacco! I have learned that Angel LaMadrid Cuesta founded Cuesta Rey cigars in 1884. He was born in Asturias, Spain, in 1858, but eventually made his way to Havana, in 1873. After attending school for a few years, Cuesta began apprenticing as a cigar maker. Cuesta rolled cigars in Florida, as well as New York for a few years until he opened his own factory, which would become Cuesta Rey cigars. He joined forces with Peregrino Rey to form Cuesta Rey cigars, located in West Tampa. Cuesta was the director of the Tampa Children's Home, as well as the Florida Fair, but what his link to Hoo-Hoo was I have not (yet) been able to find out.

Hoo-Hoo Tobacco? Apparently it was available thanks to Cuesta Rey in Tampa, Florida.

#### **Book Matches:**

As so many of us have given up smoking cigarettes these days, it is now uncommon for book matches to be used as a promotional tool. However, it would seem that many years ago, a Hoo-Hoo Club in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, produced these. As I have been unable to find any reference to an Oshkosh Hoo-Hoo Club, and given the owl logo on the match book, I wonder whether it was from a Club within the Order of Owls. This was a Masonically related group that organized itself in 1890, in St. Louis, Missouri. Its objectives were to promote recreation and sociability among the members and it sometimes used the word "Hoo-Hoo" as some sort of password.

#### Personal Items:

Not many modern men use a brush and mug in their daily shaving routine, but until the invention of shaving cream in a can, it was common place. This shaving mug was personalized with a specific Hoo-Hoo number, 15881. According to Beth Thomas's research of our records, that number belonged to Mr. Bruce Flickinger from Benton, Arkansas. He worked for Owassa Manufacturing

Many years later, the same mug he used everyday was sent to auction. This was the description in the auction catalog:

Company and was concatted in Hot Springs on December 16, 1905.

"Porcelain with polychrome painted Egyptian cat, whose tail is curled into the number 9, this being an all important number in the Order of the Hoo-Hoos, whose beliefs are grounded in the fighting of superstition and conventionalism. The Hoo-Hoos were founded in 1892 in Arkansas, and were a selective and small order, although nationally based. All of their functions, initiation fees and meeting dates were based around the number 9. This mug comes with a document on the order, and is marked Limoges, France. Condition: Minor gilt wear, otherwise excellent condition."

It sold in a Shaving Mugs & Barbershop Collectibles auction in 2007, for \$1495.00.

The name's the same, but I think the group is slightly different for this club in Wisconsin.

#### July 30 — August 3, 2012 ⋅ R.A. MacMullan Conference Center ⋅ Roscommon, Michigan





There could only have been one "first" and Kevin Kelly was it—the first Australian elected Snark of the Universe in September 1982. At his ceremony, there were 420 delegates from 11 US states, Canada, six Australian states, New Zealand, and Singapore.

Kevin Kelly was a grand gentleman and one of Hoo-Hoo's finest ambassadors, After a long illness and failing health, he died in Melbourne on December 30, 2011, at the age of 80.

Kevin was described by one friend as a gentleman with a wicked sense of humor and a passion for Collingwood Football Club and timber—in that order.

He was a third generation Australian and the son of a farming family with Irish roots. In the early 1950's, he married his wife, Margaret, and together they raised six children. Their first years together were spent share farming. Kevin said he entered the timber game "by accident" after worked for 17 years with Duncan-Innes at its Trentham mill. He moved to manage the company's Melbourne office in the early 1960s.

Kevin opened his own timber import business, K.F. Kelly & Sons, at Springvale, in 1972. At first a one man operation, the company eventually employed up to six people.

Kevin's warmth and generous nature made him a gracious host, often to the exasperation of his wife with unexpected guests. But, this same nature formed dear lifelong friendships both home and abroad as a result of his Hoo-Hoo travels.

He was an avid reader and had a passion for learning. He enjoyed art and would bring home various pieces, particularly Australian art, that caught his eye.

"It really didn't matter to
Dad who you were or what your
background was. He was sure you
could become a friend if you just sat
and had a yarn. Race, religious belief,
culture or gender were no barriers
to his instant welcome." said his
son Peter during his father's funeral
service which was attended, out of

Larry Wetter was born March 10, 1933, in Rinard, Iowa, and he died February 8, 2011, in Carefree, Arizona.


Larry was a charter member of the Winema 216 Club, joining in 1963, He was one of only two charter members remaining in the club.
