



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A Walk In Woods

Roughly half of Langford Park in St. Paul has been designated as an official Minnesota School Forest, thanks to rich partnerships between the City of Saint Paul, St. Anthony Park Elementary School (Saint Paul Public Schools,) and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR.) Teachers and community partners worked to create an outdoor learning lab for the adjacent elementary school students to explore.

Educator Karen Christenson of St. Anthony Park School serves as the site coordinator and Laura Duffey of the (Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is one of the state coordinators for the MN School Forest Program. Twin Cities Club 12 was able to assist with the launch of this new school forest with a donation that supported six hours of onsite training for teachers, administrators, and volunteers on Minnesota forests and forest products.

The Hoo-Hoo donation also purchased a stash of equipment to aid teachers and students utilizing their new forest classroom, labeled the "outdoor learning laboratory."

In its first year, all 524 students at the school were exposed to the school forest and learned about trees, climate, wildlife, forest products, and more in curricula designed for everything from science to art, to math and even technology integration.





As students were exposed to the school forest, they learned about trees, wildlife, forest products, and more. This has helped dispel the myths that, some elementary students believe, cutting down a tree is "bad."

Training offered to the schools on integrating teaching in the school forest involves Project Learning Tree (PLT) lessons used in the field (forest products, trees, forestry, water, wildlife, etc.) Learn more at www.plt.org. Each forest is required to get a stewardship plan written for management of the acreage. All profits from harvesting go back to the school in support of the forest. Urban sites are typically 1-15 acres, outstate sites mostly range from 40-80 acres. The largest site has more than 300 acres!

The laboratory is used year-round (yes, even in Minnesota winter!) and has quickly become extra valuable for the staff and students in understanding the importance of individual trees as well as the forest products manufactured when trees are harvested. This has also helped dispel the myths that some elementary students held that cutting down a tree is "bad." When put to the test of which items in their classroom would not be possible without forest products, it was quickly evident the abundant resources a managed forest provides—from wildlife habitat but also the desks, chairs, doors, etc., in their own classroom.

So the next time you are enjoying a hike in your favorite woods, think of some young students who now have a new school forest they are proudly calling their own right in St. Paul! And thanks to the efforts of Karen and Laura in their respective organizations along with support from Twin Cities Club 12, the students are getting outside and enjoying a walk through their (urban) woods!



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


