



and purchased two companies, Far North Timber Sales and Cairns Truss & Timber forming Far North Timber & Truss, becoming Managing Director (President). Starting with a team of 12, he built a new timber, hardware and truss manufacturing plant in 2000. Perseverance saw that grow into two branches with 70 team members. Ray was offered an opportunity to sell the company, which he did with mixed emotion in 2005.

His Hoo-Hoo career started in 1995 when he and 16 others were concatenated, reactivating FNQ Club 261(Cairns) which had been in recess due to the closure of many mills by the federal government. Elected club president, Ray declined having just started his own business. Besides, he yet didn't really have a clue what Hoo-Hoo was all about, so he opted for VP instead. He became president the following year and with the enthusiasm of a small but committed group FNQ 261 flourished and does today having raised substantial funds for charities for a club of their size.

Hoo-Hoo has become a major part of his life. In 11 whirlwind head spinning years, he has served two terms as Club President, two as Vice Gerent of J-IV, 2nd and 1st VP of J-IV and President (Supreme Nine) for J-IV in 2002–03, HHI VP for 2005-06 and, of course, is now your loyal Snark.



Tours to view the rum distillery process are available. In recent years Spring Hill House, the original homestead from Spring Hill Plantation, was relocated in the grounds. Lovingly restored, the building houses a museum, souvenir shop and a bar where visitors can partake of the famous Bundaberg Rum, Bundaberg Rum Royal Liqueur, Bundaberg Rum and Coke and a traditional Bundaberg drink, Dark and Stormy - Bundaberg Rum and Bundaberg Ginger Beer.

Established in 1983, this Queensland State Tourism Award winning tourist attraction keeps alive the ancient skill of cooperage - barrel-making. At the cooperage various crafts persons also demonstrate daily their skills. These include but are not limited to, jewelry, pottery, furniture making, leatherwork, whipmaking, blacksmithing, spinning and weaving, water colour painting, china painting, ceramics, silk painting etc.

Gympie WoodWorks & Museum—Wednesday, September 5th

The Forestry and Timber Museum operates as a joint venture with the Queensland Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries. WoodWorks is a museum of social history and provides an insight into the timber industry of yesteryear through displays and demonstrations. Features include a large selection of pioneering handtools, 1925 Republic truck, bullock wagons, blacksmith shop, timber-getters hut, 619 year old Kauri Pine tree section and a steam driven bush sawmill.

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The History of Our HHI By-Laws

In previous articles, we have discussed the history of the by-laws and Article 1 which addresses the Name and Purpose.

In this article, we will take a look at Article 2, which concerns Membership, Eligibility thereof, Application for Membership, Induction, etc.

Membership

In order to join Hoo-Hoo, applicants are limited to persons of full age of 18 years, with the caveat that clubs may raise the eligibility to 21 years. These applicants, male or female, shall be of good moral character, and in some way, associated with the building materials industry.

Final acceptance is made by HHI, providing the applicant meets all applicable qualifications as laid out in the by-laws. After acceptance by HHI a lapel badge and a number will be assigned to the successful applicant.

Usually a club will perform an induction ceremony, called a *Concatenation*, (a real word meaning to bind together), during which the Code of Ethics are explained to the inductee. This ceremony varies in the degree of informality between clubs, some of whom have some very creative ceremonies in order to impress upon the candidate the precepts of the Order.

Life Membership in the Order is limited to those members, who, in the opinion of the HHI Board of Directors, have displayed exceptional service to the Order. Previously, a single payment secured this honor, however in recent years, recipients have been asked to contribute a yearly levy to alleviate the financial burden of HHI. Local dues remain payable by Life Members, unless their local clubs wish to make an exception.

Honorary memberships have been made in the past, however this is a rare occurrence. Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt, was awarded the most hallowed number of #999 during a concatenation at the Texas & Louisiana Lumberman's Association Convention, April 11-13, 1905, in Ft Worth, Texas.

Cost of membership at the time was .99 cents, however was increased to \$1.65, the additional .66 for subscriptions to the BULLETIN, the forerunner of the Log & Tally. We are not sure if Teddy anted up, or whether he was admitted without cost.

Warren G Harding, Hoo-Hoo #14945 was concatenated on June 30th, 1905, while serving as Attorney General for the state of Ohio. When he became President he said that the office would

not "diminish my interest in or lessen my pride in this fraternal association".

Associate memberships are at the discretion of the local club. Membership has been in decline over recent years as Hoo-Hoo competes with so many distractions and choices of spending ones personal time, however the heart of Hoo-Hoo still beats strongly, and while previously we perceived strength in numbers, we know today that a solid core of individuals determined to perpetuate Fraternalism and Service to our great Industry exists within us, and while our numbers have lessened, we have added members from countries to our International Order, with countries such as Malaysia and South Africa, adding strength to our cause.

Our current membership is about 3,200 – compared to 1902, in which year, Hoo-Hoo saw the 9,999th member join.

Next issue we will look at Article 3 of the by-laws – Annual dues and Membership Fees.

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
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
