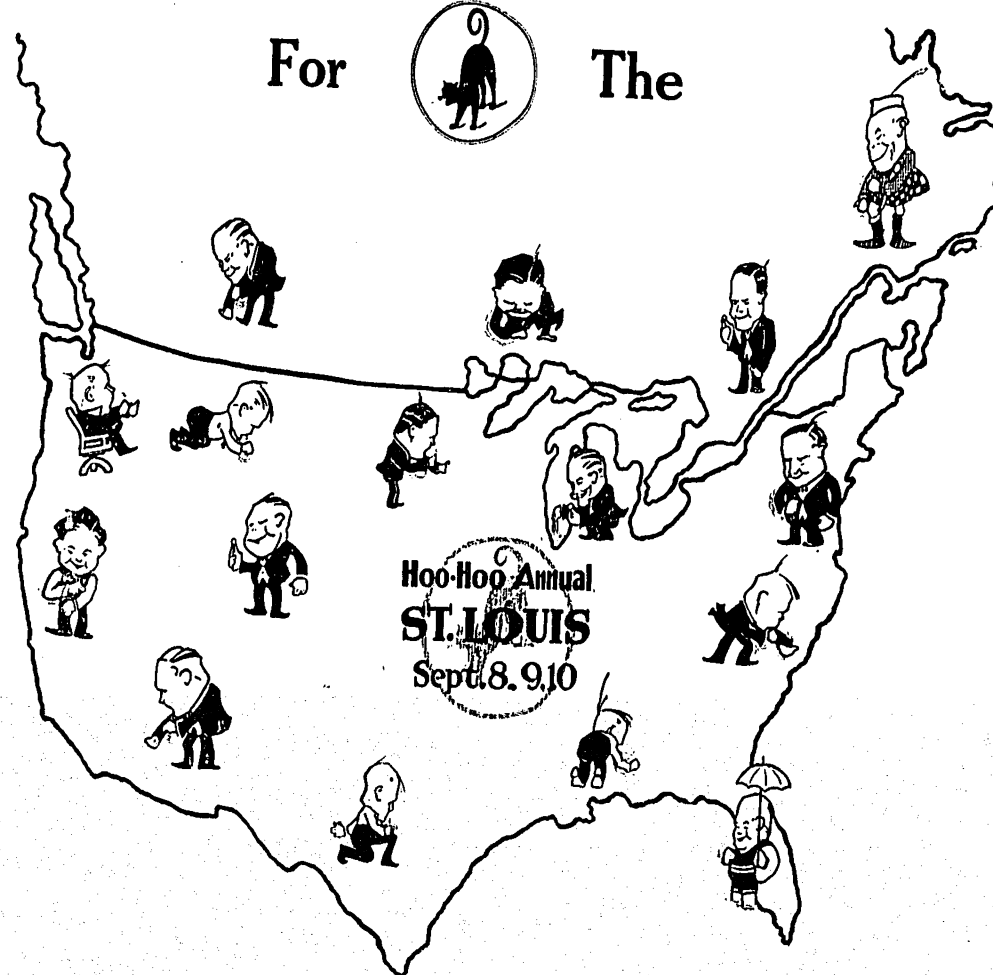

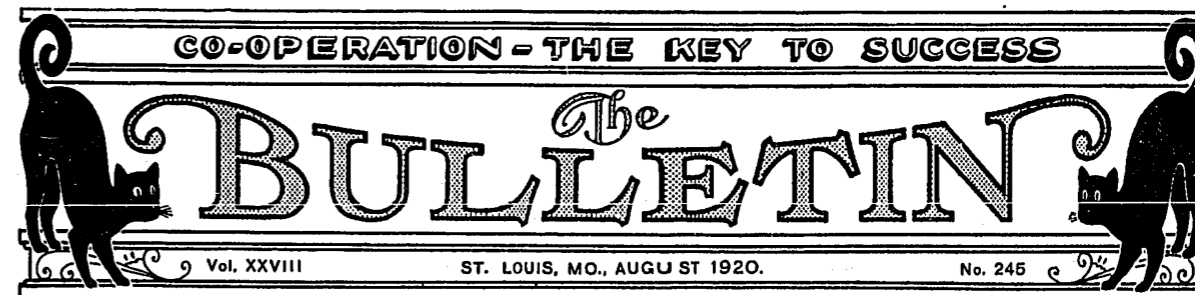

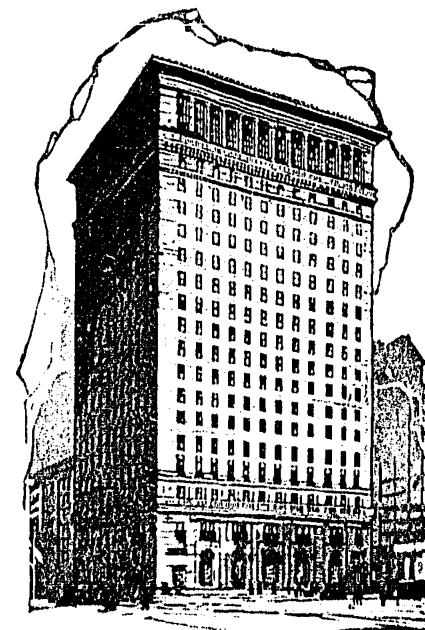

## NEW ANNUAL DUES

The Annual Dues of \$3.65 that have been in effect for several years are not sufficient to permit the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo to conduct its affairs and to properly maintain its prestige. The present dues are decidedly insufficient to enable the organization to develop and put into effect features that have been planned to increase its usefulness.

The Supreme Nine and members of the House of Ancients, to whom the matter was entrusted by the 1919 Annual, announce through Snark of the Universe R. A. Hiscox their decision to advance the dues, effective for the ensuing year, to FIVE DOLLARS per annum. The advance does not apply to members past the age of 65, their dues remaining at \$2.40 per annum.

After September 9, 1920, candidates for reinstatement will be required to pay one year's dues (\$5.00) in addition to the \$5.00 reinstatement fee. Further restrictions to reinstatement are prospective.

The advance in dues is small. It is simply necessary for Hoo-Hoo to retain the \$1.35 change that has heretofore been returned from your five dollar bill. This is necessary for much the same reason that the merchant now passes out four pounds of sugar for your dollar instead of twenty, as in bygone days. Dollars are worth less than they were. But Hoo-Hoo and all it stands for is worth more. Plans that are fully worked out and ripe for consideration at the 1920 Annual will make it worth far more to YOU and to the Lumber Industry than ever before.

We believe that the membership of this great order will find no cause for objection to the decision of its officials. Most of the other organizations have long ago taken the step that has been deferred by HOO-HOO until this time.

## NEW PLANS FOR HOO-HOO

Space is available for only the briefest outline of new plans for Hoo-Hoo in 1921, which are to be considered at the coming Annual. These contemplate:—

- 1st Placing greater restrictions upon the qualifications for membership.
- 2nd Placing greater restrictions upon members in arrears for reinstatement.
- 3d Dividing each state into small districts.
- 4th To develop and promote in each district Hoo-Hoo Clubs.
- 5th To compile and furnish ideas and plans for activities of Clubs to bring the members and lumbermen together more often, other than Concatenations.
- 6th Establishment of Hoo-Hoo Hotel Headquarters in each of the principal cities.
- 7th To provide a Bureau of Information in each Hoo-Hoo hotel for the benefit of members in good standing.
- 8th To revise Rituals to conform to present conditions.
- 9th To revise Junior Book and add cross examinations for the different branches of the Industry, such as will have a moral and will promote education.
- 10th To provide new and additional equipment for initiation.

These are suggestions of just a few of the many definite, thoroughly planned and entirely practical activities that will put Hoo-Hoo on a new basis in 1921. It will be lifted entirely out of the "joiners" type of organizations. Membership in it will rightfully be deemed a PRIVILEGE.

These activities will increase the value of YOUR membership in HOO-HOO. We are asking, and shall ask, the support and co-operation of the Lumber Industry and allied interests on a basis of the MERITS and PRINCIPLES of the Order—placing the organization upon the highest plane to promote FRIENDSHIP, CONFIDENCE and EDUCATION.

## "Grasping the High Ideals in Hoo-Hoo"

(Address made by M. M. Elledge, Supreme Scribe, at Concatenations, Corinth, Miss., July 3rd; Atlanta, Ga., July 6th; Tuscaloosa, Ala., July 7th.)

About twenty-nine years ago our friend and brother, HOLLING ARTHUR JOHNSON, now Sec of the House of Ancients, conceived the idea that lumbermen everywhere should become better acquainted, have more brotherly love and comradeship, and thereby be happier, healthier, and more prosperous.

With this fine conception of life his great and strong mind began to wander back into the land of mystery and symbolism, and by his wonderful genius he conceived, worked out and resurrected the spirit of the "GREAT BLACK CAT," Hoo-Hoo; called him back from his home in the clouds, summoned all his train of courtiers, priests and ancients arrayed in their robes of black and white; caused them to form in three times three and thus arrayed stand guard over the Onton Bed while he and his comrades, on that memorable occasion in the city of Denver, launched into existence this great order of ours, the CONCATENATED ORDER OF HOO-HOO.

The higher ideals for which this order stood were ac-

cepted by almost every lumberman in the United States. The order immediately bounded into popularity and within a brief period had a membership from the Great Lakes to the Gulf, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. This great order has demonstrated that an organization out of the ordinary may be created by business men to help a little in bringing old men back to youth and holding young men back from old age by knitting their social interest together with laughter, story and song; to promote health, happiness and long life. ## "Hoo-Hoo As I Have Known It"

Across a couple of decades, almost, the devotees of the Black Cat have been of personal interest, thrown into warm touch with the Lumber trade in Salt Lake City, counting some of its leaders my friends, I was honored in the early formation of the Lumbermen's Club by election as an Honorary Member.

Tom Tucker, in the nursery rhyme, "Sang for His Supper," and for so these many years the writer, not being able to sing, has talked for many a luncheon and found delight in meeting the men of the trade. Carried as a guest to the great Annual Meeting of the Lumbermen at the Coast by the Utah Delegation on several occasions, it was my privilege to speak at and enjoy the sessions.

The experiences at these conventions was highly prized because of the knowledge it gave of the lumber industry, but more for the touch of the big, clean men who manufacture and market the products of the forests.

It is not imagination that sees something of the sweetness and bigness of the logging camp carried into the sordid realm of business. Among all the classes of men in business in the great West one is very sure to meet the cleanest, warmest-hearted and most wholesome one has found is that of the men of the mill and the yard who carry on the vast lumber industry of this section.

In particular the writer owes a great debt for the rare privilege of association with the lumbermen of Salt Lake and Utah. Their friendship and their goodness to him make one of the bright spots in his life.

When, as their guest at Tacoma, many years ago, they sought to secure his initiation into Hoo-Hoo, and one of them even went so far as to offer to give him a lumber yard so he would qualify. They succeeded in finding a way to initiate him some years ago, and rolled logs until they were able to have him made the International Chaplain for Hoo-Hoo. The honor was deeply appreciated, and the recent Concatenation at Salt Lake, where we met Mr. Isherwood, the new Secretary-Treasurer, is occasion for this creed.

Frankly, every Hoo-Hoo needs to get a new grip on the black tail of the fellee.

There are two or three reasons why it should have, just now, the earnest and joyous support of every man in the lumber world. It is a center for social life that is the very finest kind of a force to gather the trade together. If America needs anything just now, it needs clean, sober men at every point in business life.

Radical and Bolshevik attacks on the organized business and personal property rights of America call for a sharp class association in every department of business life. No one will make contest for the lumber interest if it does not for itself.

It behooves every man in the trade to cultivate the trade bonds, and Hoo-Hoo, with its half-jest half-serious life, is a fine gathering place.

Quite beyond the old Motto and goal of Hoo-Hoo—"Health, Happiness and Long Life"—there is this call to every American to meet the need of the day.

The Concatenations of the next two or three years should have, apart from the fun and the knitting of social ties, two serious things. First and foremost, there should be the inculcation of a fine patriotism that shall make every lumberman alive to the cultivation of a living but a conservative Americanism among the employees and the staff, just as across the border the Canadian must develop a like patriotism and conservatism in his land. It only takes a few fools to set the forest afire. In the fullest economic justice we should insist on the survival of the old ideals of fairness and opportunity.

Then, too, The Bulletin should bring each time it comes a page of up-to-date information on the technical and practical side of the business, for it is a time when scientific keenness must minimize waste of method. With it all, let's get close in that sympathy and affection which have been Hoo-Hoo's biggest gift to all of its devotees in all the years of its life.

If the Editor lets this get by I may send a word again from the standpoint of the Chaplain's quiet retreat.

Hoo-Hoo is worth all that is put into it and will pay big dividends if the cut is handled right. Get into the swim with the fellows.

In the dark days of 1918 Brother Buell rendered great service as a member of the Committee on Good of the Order at the Annual Meeting in San Francisco at the House of Hoo-Hoo, when the Order was reorganized and placed on a firm foundation.

We shall miss Guy Buell, and at our gatherings "we shall long for the touch of a vanished hand—for the sound of a voice that is still." But his memory will be cherished by a host of friends among the fraternity of Lumbermen.

We extend to his bereaved family our sincere sympathy in this hour of their great loss, and by order of the Vicegerent Snark, the Scribe, is directed to send to them and to the Lumber press a copy of this eulogy.

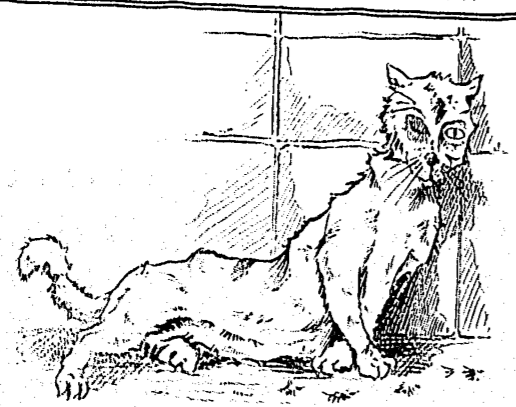

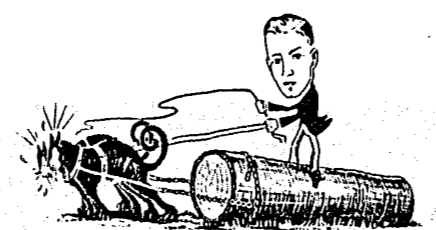

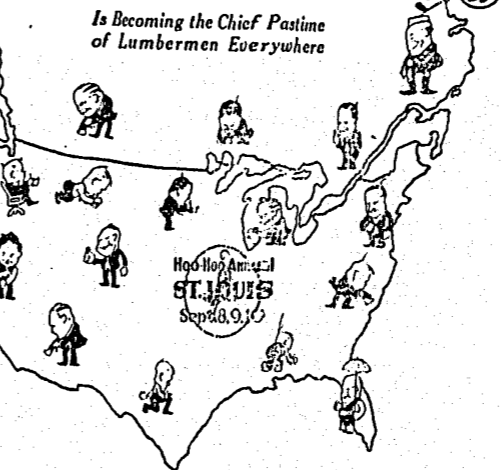
