





In the commercial district the height of buildings must be determined. In the apartment district it would be proper to limit the height of buildings to six stories, and in the residential districts to two and a half stories.

The purpose of the commission is to present a plan which will be acceptable to the majority of people and to impress upon the citizens of the city the necessity of giving up individual rights for the common good, and to produce orderliness in city growth.
