The man who accumulates dollars in the lumber business has sense to begin with.

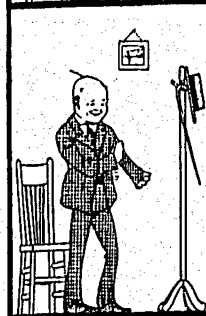

spoke next. He said that he thought the members were out on this trip to glorify the National American Association, but every speaker so far had spent most of his time boosting his home city. He would not take the time to speak of that marvelous city of eastern Texas—Beaumont. J. W. Morrison, of the J. W. Morrison Lumber Company, one of the pioneers in the logging business, gave a very interesting talk on the vernacular of the lumberjack. He finished his talk with a story about a woodsman who was injured and brought to the hospital, and on being asked by the head nurse how the accident happened, he said: "Oh, I was sky-hooking for old Simpson up the line, and I had a ground pig that was no good. He sent up a school, ma'am, and she gunned, and I told him to throw a sag into her but instead he gave her a St. Croix and could not hold her. I gломmed for her and missed, and fell across a log and cracked two of my slats."

The singing was led by Rodney Hodge and M. L. Jordan sang a baritone solo, "Gipsy John." The principal address of the day was delivered by C. A. Godward, engineer of the Minneapolis City Planning Commission. Mr. Godward stated that he believed the plan the commission had been working on was of great interest and importance to Minneapolis people. Its purpose is to establish regulations for the use of property, the class of building, the character of business building, building lines and other items contributing to the convenience, health and beauty of the city. He also stated the plan of zoning recognizes five districts or zones. One is residence and duplexes, one is apartment buildings, one as a commercial district, one for light industries and the last as a heavy industrial district. In the commercial district the height of buildings must be determined. In the apartment district it would be proper to limit the height of buildings to six stories, and in the residential districts to two and a half stories.

by a dinner. This will be a real get-together-get-acquainted event for the visiting members and their families, with plenty of pep and punch such as you will greatly enjoy.

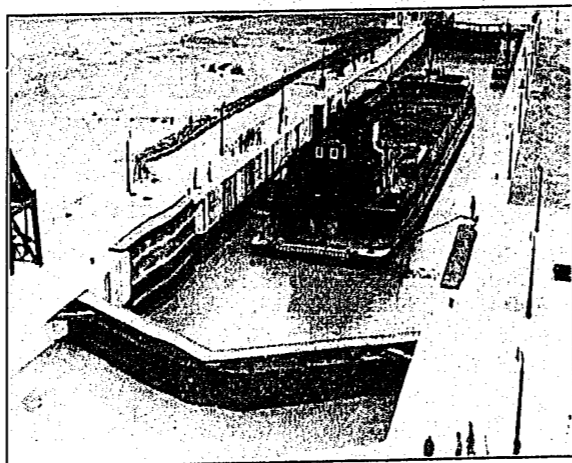

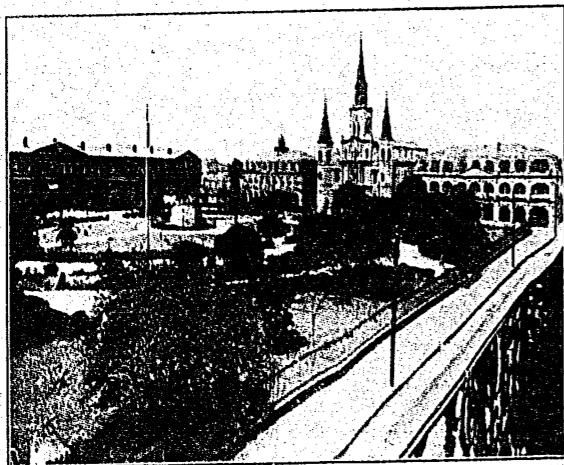

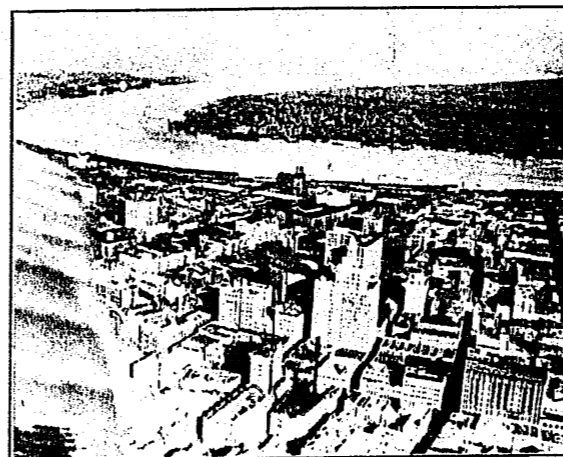

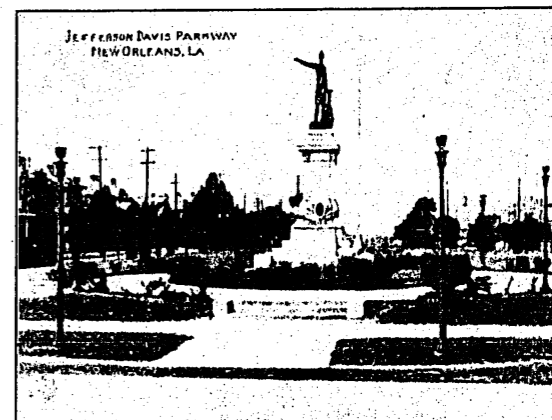
