

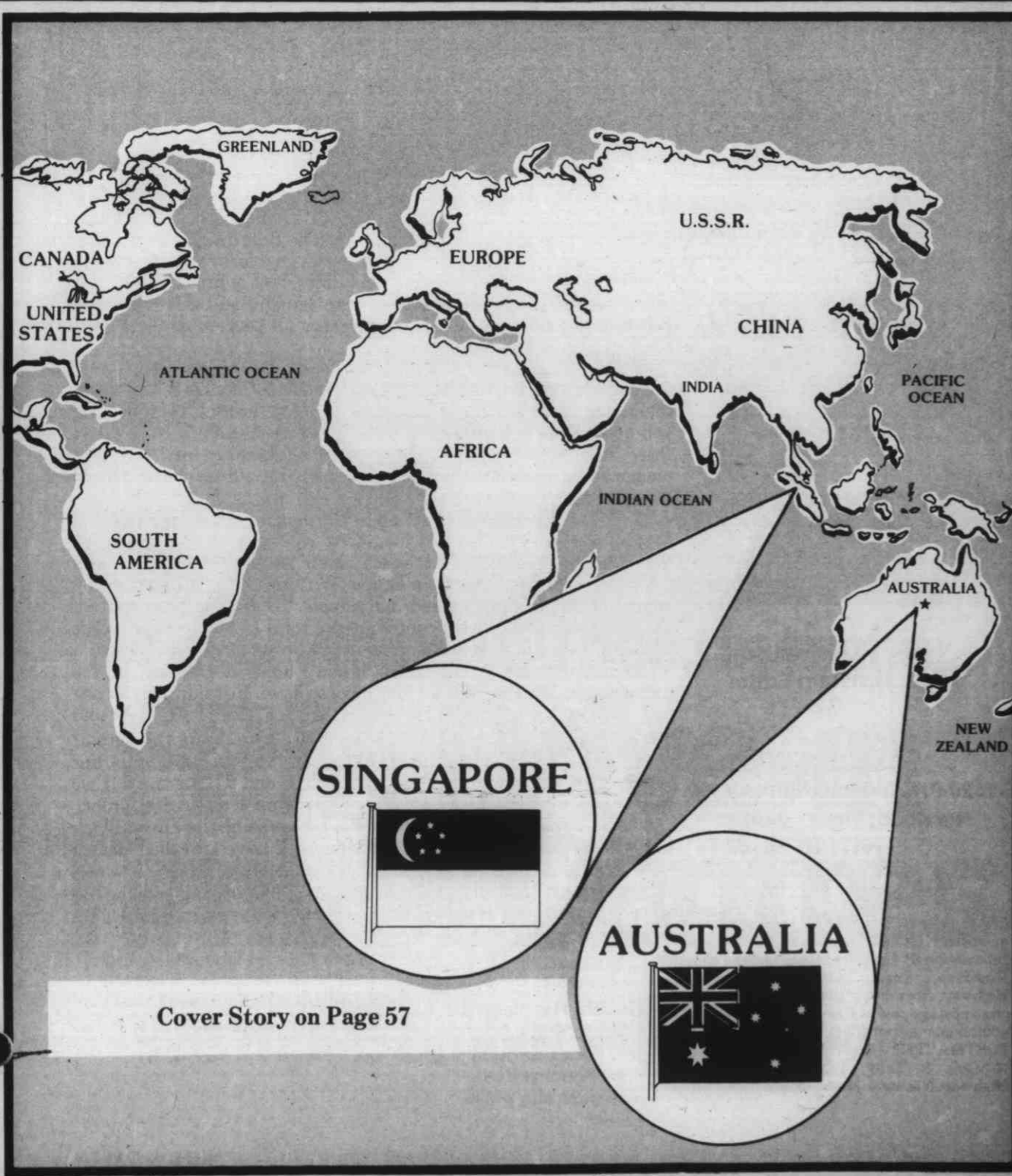

Twenty-seven Puget Sound area members and associates recently completed a plywood grading school which was held at the University of Washington at Seattle.

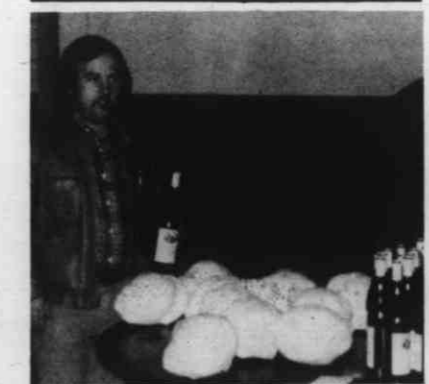

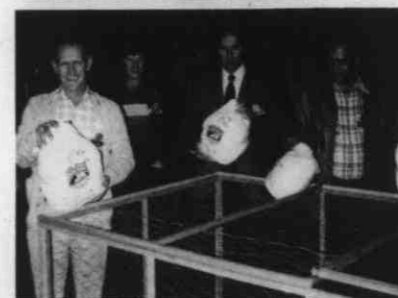

HOO-HOO PUBLIC RELATIONS

The great wealth of courtesy advertising available to Hoo-Hoo uncovered last year shows we have a need for good P.R. work within our order. This need for effective P.R. was touched on lightly at our recent International Board meeting, with the result that questions arise that need to be answered. Who in Hoo-Hoo should do our P.R. work? Should this be part of our International Executive Secretary's duties? Should an International officer be responsible for P.R. work? What P.R. work should be done on a local club level? Who in the local

club should do the P.R. work? How can P.R. work help our clubs and our order?

We should first define P.R. work. Good P.R. is the effective use of media to establish, in the eyes of the public and our members, a favorable image of what Hoo-Hoo International is and does. Some clubs appoint a publicity chairman to handle P.R. Others rely on the club secretary to take pictures, write articles and send out announcements. If a club is truly blessed to have a member capable of doing all of these things, it can utilize the P.R. available to it. It appears that some clubs are not P.R. minded and as a result, do not utilize all of the free advertising available to it. When contacting many of the national and international trade publications, we find that these people beg our clubs for information concerning Hoo-Hoo activities. This communication problem comes about as a result of our clubs not knowing what trade journals seek Hoo-Hoo news. For example, many trade journals list a calendar of events several months in advance and will publish Hoo-Hoo club meeting notices if they are advised of them. To solve this problem, the Board has asked Cliff to prepare a list of trade publications serving the forest products industry. Once we have this list available, each Supreme IX will then advise his clubs of

International Order of Hoo-Hoo Wood Promotion Trophy

The annual award of the Wood Promotion Trophy will be made at the Hoo-Hoo convention each year. The award is made to the Hoo-Hoo Club which, in the opinion of the judges, has made the greatest accomplishment in wood promotion activities during the previous Hoo-Hoo year. The trophy remains in the possession of the winning club during the Hoo-Hoo year. The club to whom the award is made will be responsible for delivering the trophy at the next convention.

The Snark of the Universe will appoint a special committee as judges for the award. All clubs are invited to participate.

Rules Governing Club Trophy Award

1.) The club may submit evidence covering all wood promotion projects adopted by the club, including National Forest Products Week.

2.) The entrant club will make its presentation to the judges and the convention. Tangible evidence of the project(s) must be submitted by the club delegate, who must be conversant with the project from start to finish as he may be interviewed by the judges. This evidence may consist of newspaper clippings, photos, scrap books, samples, or display material. A slide projector will be available.

3.) Each participating club must submit a written outline of the wood promotion project(s) to contain the following: (a) a description of the project(s); (b) State the goal of the project(s); (c) Tell of the method of operation; (d) Specify the relative proportion of financial and/or manpower support from cooperating organizations; and (e) Statement of the results.

4.) DO NOT SEND CLUB CONTEST MATERIALS TO THE INTERNATIONAL HOO-HOO OFFICE. The Club delegate is responsible for all contest materials, and for providing the LOG & TALLY magazine with a complete story for publication. The delegate may ship the materials, addressed to himself, in care of the convention hotel,



marked "hold for arrival on September __, 19__."

5.) Decision of the judges will be final. A club is eligible to be awarded the trophy in two or more consecutive years. In the absence of an acceptable club presentation, at the discretion of the judges the trophy may be retained in the International Headquarters for one year. In addition to the trophy, certificates will be presented to the clubs placing first, second and third. No judge shall be appointed who is a member of a club making a competitive presentation.

6.) Hoo-Hoo Clubs wishing to make a presentation for the trophy

are requested to advise the International Office by letter prior to August 20th of each year.

7.) Each of the following facets of the wood promotion project shall be rated by each judge, independently of the others, on a scale of 1 thru 10 for letters G and D and 1 thru 5 for letters A, B, E, & F, 10 being the best.

- A - Accomplishment based on size of club.
- B - Involvement of members.
- C - Immediate effect on the community.
- D - Lasting effect on the community.
- E - Written presentation.
- F - Oral presentation.

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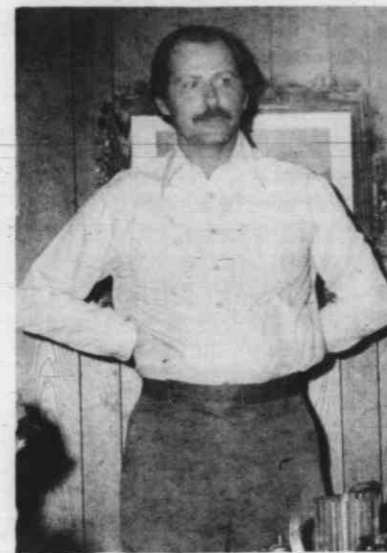
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BOOK REVIEW

WAYS OF THE WOODS, A Guide to the Skills and Spirit of the Woodland Experience, by William M. Harlow.

American Forestry Association, 1319 18th Street N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036 (1979) 144 pp Illustrated. Hardback, \$8.50

William M. Harlow (he calls himself "Moosewood") is a character and a scientist, a man who co-authored the forester's indispensable, **Textbook on Dendrology**. So when he wanted to prove his point that the "newfangled" lug soles being worn by backpackers into the woods cause trial degradation and soil erosion, he devised an experiment to prove exactly how much soil is lost. His conclusion: "On easily eroded soil...one hiker travelling one mile will have disturbed about 120 pounds of earth."

Harlow writes this in his newest book **Ways of the Woods**. Unlike the slew of camping books already on the market, this camping book blends in a good dose of real conservation along with a forest scientist's eye for detail.

Readers who blanch at the mention of the word "forestry" will find Harlow refreshing. Like any good forester, he believes in using the forest to man's benefit. But forestry to Harlow means more than simple timber management. Forestry, he says, is the "management of the whole environment." This can include wilderness management and scientific study.

This philosophy is closely aligned with the beliefs of The American Forestry Association, publishers of the book. The "multiple-use" concept underlying the Association's purpose and efforts is seen in Harlow's combination of forestry with camping. The two, he argues persuasively, aren't always incompatible:

These woodlands have been logged at least once, and a luxuriant growth of young trees is springing up. There is plenty of dead firewood and green poles or small logs whose removal only relieves crowding and improves the forest. But know what you are about, and if permission or a fire permit is required, get one.

Dr. Harlow weaves woodlore and history into a wealth of practical information, including illustrated step-by-step guides to such activities as axemanship, shelter-building, and fire layout. The author's 50 years of experience in the forests of this country are the foundation upon which he builds one fascinating chapter after another, each providing insights into some facet of living with and enjoying the forest.

Many other aspects of campcraft and forest walking are also discussed including proper clothing, map and compass use, poisonous and edible plants, forest pests, finding safe drinking water, and what to do if you get lost. These subjects and more have been blended into a superb book that will provide intriguing and handy "how-to-do-it" guide.

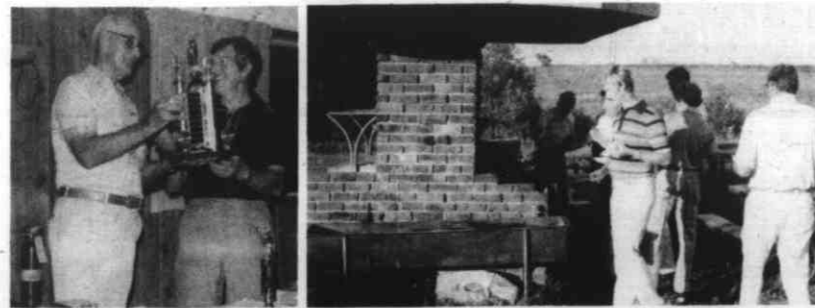
A total of 30 wholesalers donated money for the prizes and the trophies and once again made this event very successful and certainly appreciated by all the lumbermen and guests who attended.

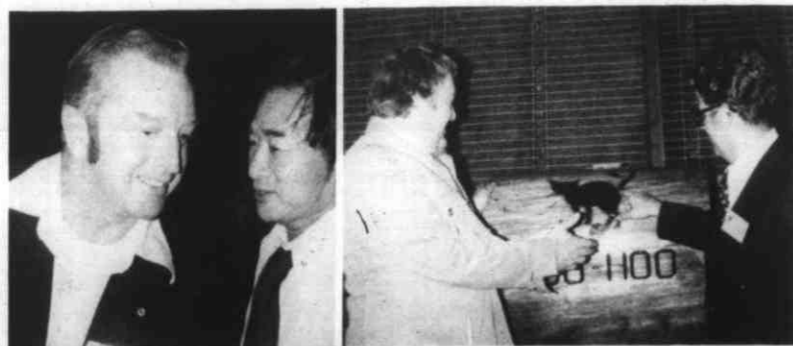
