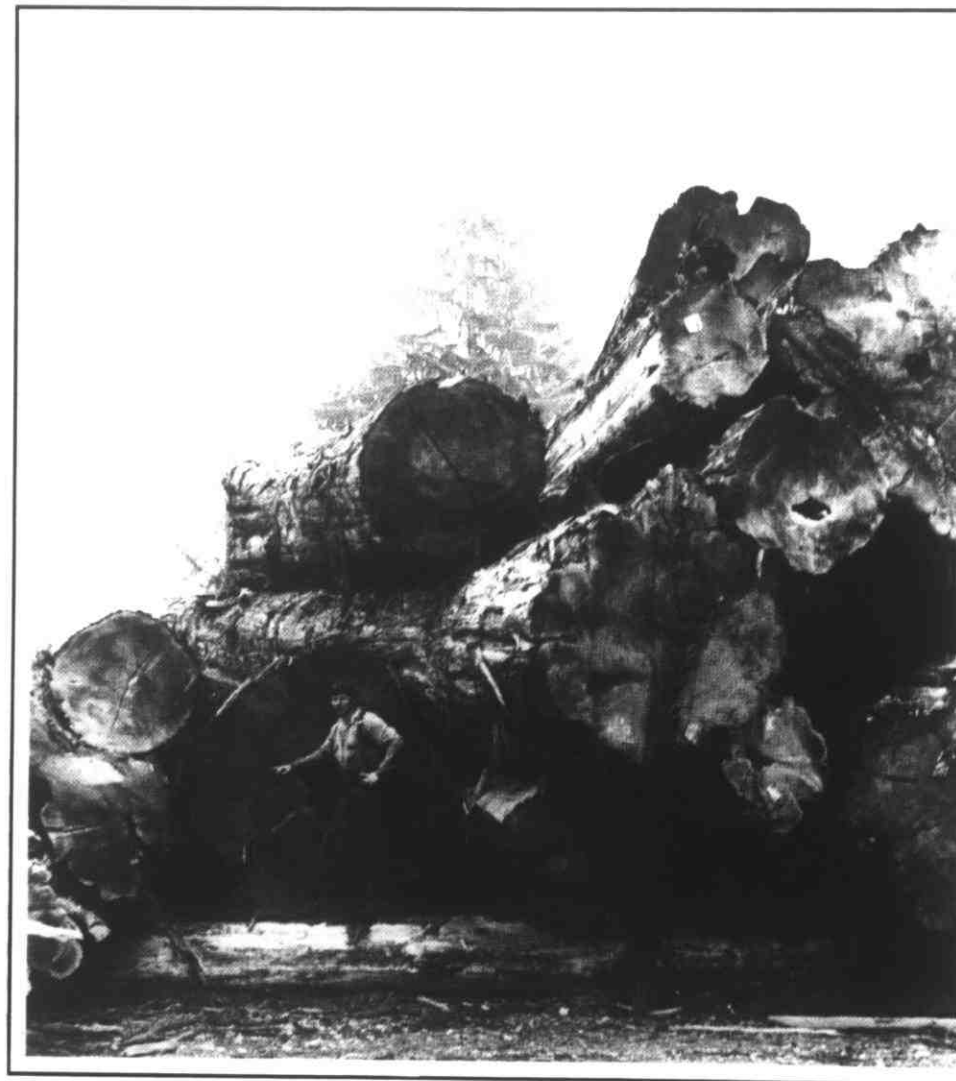




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LOG & TALLY

5. Don't be afraid to collect dues at door. This also does wonders for bookkeeping.
6. Have a good program after social hour and dinner. Does not have to be industry connected. Video, speaker, etc. Not too long.

2ND VICE PRESIDENT

How many of us have been actively working on the "Three R's" since the Oakland Convention? I'm not talking about the three R's learned in school, but rather the three R's so important to Hoo-Hoo-Recruitment, Retention, and Reinstatement. We all know of them, but perhaps we haven't pursued their implementation with much effort. As is the case with salesmanship, we may know the

basics but more often than not, we could always benefit from a refresher course. Each year we try, but somehow we just can't seem to obtain our goals for increased membership.

I mention recruitment first, because we must have new members for growth. Statistics show that members of an organization leave for the following reasons: Death - 1%; Competitive reasons - 9%; Dissatisfaction - 14%; and 68% due to indifference on the part of some members not caring. According to Gurdon, Hoo-Hoo concated 483 new members for the 89-90 year (excluding J-IV). During the first quarter of this year, our new members number 98. Projected to year-end, this gives us 392 new members--nearly 100 shy of last year. Frankly speaking, "That just won't cut it."

We need an ACTIVE recruitment campaign!!!

Such a campaign cannot be carried by the executive board, the Supreme Nines, the Snark or even the individual club presidents. Each member of Hoo-Hoo must actively work towards building stronger clubs through increased membership. So, how do we accomplish this?

I would suggest that each club appoint an "active" membership committee. The committee must have a plan which outlines intermediate goals and objectives. Perhaps a survey of the current membership would be a good starting point. Find out who they are (retailers, wholesalers, transportation, manufacturers, etc.). Chances are, most clubs lean heavily on one or two segments of the industry and are missing the opportunity to increase membership through associations with other segments. After making the survey and discovering potential sources of new membership, make a detailed "hit list" for new members.

With the prospect list in hand, arrange a meeting which would have general appeal. Locate a dynamic speaker (e.g., a sports figure

or local prominent businessperson) to address the group. Contact each prospective member by personal invitation; include a brief summary of who we are and what the evening will entail. Follow up on this invitation with a phone call.

On the meeting night, each prospective member should have assigned to him a current member who can introduce him to the

other members during the social portion of the meeting. This time could also be used to elaborate on Hoo-Hoo and the advantages of membership. Try to "close the deal" by obtaining his signature on a membership application and planning an early concat. If you are able to sign two or three during the meeting, make an announcement—it helps to break the ice.

Certainly, this will take time. But if each member in the club is willing to pledge an hour per week to Hoo-Hoo, we could have a successful organization.

The items of interest were Norton Ladkin Memorial, Fund Raising for J-IV Convention at Leura 1991, the appointment of a paid, part-time registrar and treasurer. Membership in our district had increased by 2.9% (a great achievement in our current tough industry times).

The award for the most travelled member was awarded to Bill French from the Vancouver Club, thanks to the "Melbourne-Vancouver Exchange Program".

A new Hoo-Hoo award has been founded in honor of Norton Ladkin, the foundation president of Jurisdiction IV, who passed away suddenly on December 3, 1989. To be presented annually, the award will be given in recognition of services to Hoo-Hoo and the timber industry. During the J-IV convention held at Mt. Gambier last month, the J-IV Committee offered to help organize this very important award in offer-

ing their full support by having their "Top Cats" join the local Adelaide committee. Chairman of the Award Committee, Des Gill, presented a brief report to the committee and to the General Meeting, advising the total monies received were \$9711. Indication of a further \$3000 have been made by Mt. Gambier, Melbourne, and North East Victoria clubs. Neil Carr of the North East Victoria Club presented a check to the committee, and a further \$21.50 was collected at Des Gill's table during the convention, making a total of \$12,732.50 plus interest.

A list of donors as of September 30, 1990, included: Adelaide Hoo-Hoo Club - \$2,000; Radiata Pine Association of Australia - \$5000; Timber Merchants Association of South Australia - \$500; Adelaide Timber Congress Committee - \$1111; Bowater Tissue Ltd. - \$1000; and Woy Woy Hoo-Hoo Club - \$100.

A large number of "appeal" letters have been distributed to J-IV clubs, and the industry, and Des Gill estimates that an amount of \$15,000 could be achieved in the near future.

Application forms and other data are currently being finalized and should be available to all clubs early in the new year. This will enable clubs to register applicants, have local competitions, and submit their results to the organizing committee no later than July 1991. The next J-IV Convention in September 1991, at Leura in New South Wales, will more than likely see the first award presentation.

The Award Committee will consist of Kevin French (J-IV president), Neil Oliver, Wally Pratt, and a further Adelaide club member to replace Peter Childs, who is to retire due to heavy work commitments. Further monies were raised by a number of events run at the Mt. Gambier Convention, and figures shall be released as they become available. A target of \$50,000 has been set.

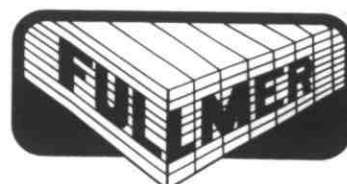

Recycling conserves natural resources and reduces the demand for both foreign and domestic raw materials. Recycling conserves landfill space by reducing the amount of municipal solid waste. Recycling conserves energy used in the securing, transporting, and manufacturing of some products made from primary raw materials. Recycling generates revenue by selling many recyclables previously buried or burned. Recycling demonstrates community commitment toward reducing solid waste and preserving the quality of the environment.

What does one recycle?

Most major beer and soft drink cans and some food cans are made of recyclable aluminum. All other aluminum products (e.g. siding, foil, and furniture) are recyclable.

All kinds of glass containers (beverages, food, toiletries, and drugs) can be recycled. Glass should be separated by color (clear, green, and brown).

Copper, brass, zinc, tin, iron, and stainless steel can be recycled. You will find that things like house wiring, car parts, sinks, and cans are made of materials like these.

Clean, dry, fresh newspaper is acceptable for recycling. Phone books, magazines, junk mail and cardboard are not. computer paper, laser paper, and desk top paper are also recyclable.

Plastic bottles (detergent, milk, soft drinks, juice) are recyclable. Styrofoam food service items are recyclable

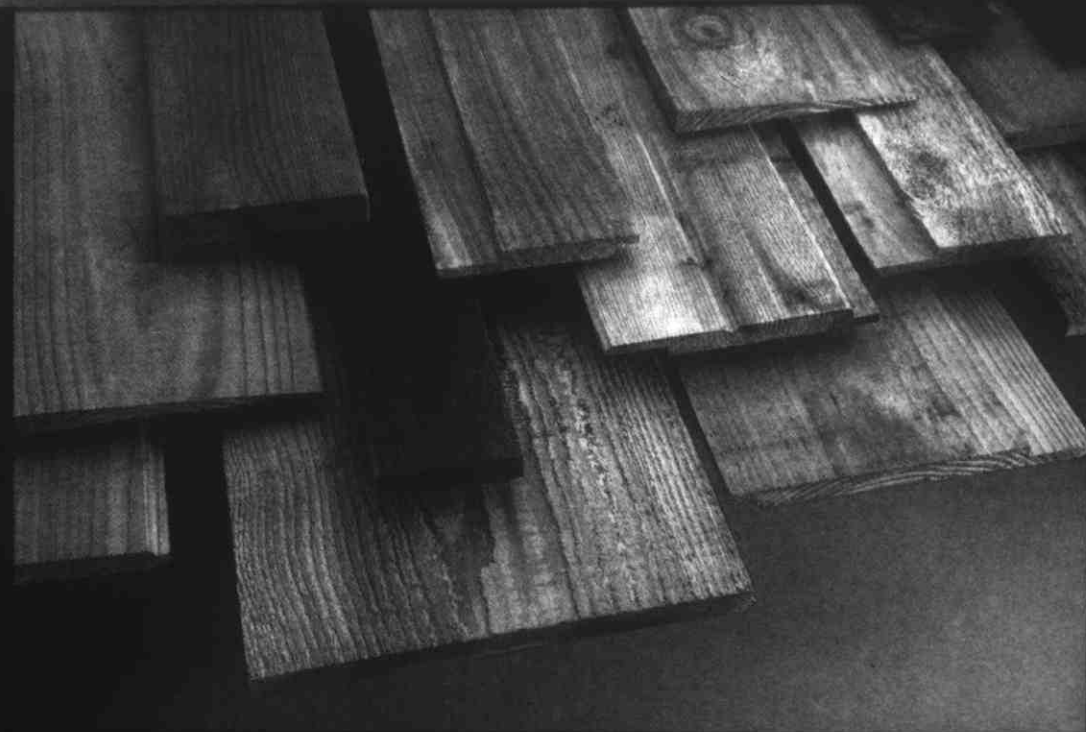
