## LET US AGAIN—

invite your attention to the results of the Thirtieth Hoo-Hoo Annual, held at Fresno, California.

This was regarded as one of the most constructive meetings in the history of the Order, due to the consideration and attention given to the elevation of the Order to a high plane. Some of the things that were accomplished should be of interest to every member and lumberman, as mentioned below:

Revision of Eligibility Rules, making the Order a "Lumberman's Order exclusively."

Ruling requiring application for reinstatement of delinquent members.

Ruling requiring Membership Committee of three to be appointed by the Vicegerent Snark to pass upon applications as to eligibility and qualifications before presenting them to concatenation to be voted on. The same ruling applies to applications for reinstatements.

Granting of honorary life membership cards to all members, in good standing, who have reached the age of sixty-five years, and exempt from further payment of dues.

Adoption of plan for Order to carry its own death benefit risks.

Revision of ritual.  
August 9 of each year designated as National Hoo-Hoo Day.

Adoption of plans for the developing of local Hoo-Hoo Clubs in all principal cities.

Adoption of the code of ethics, defining the aims and purpose of the Order—a code which means much to the membership and to the industry.

Approved plan to establish a small tract of redwood as a Hoo-Hoo Memorial Grove.

The splendid increase in membership to date, together with the large number of reinstatements of old members, indicates the approval of the new policies of the Order and assures us a very bright future.

## PROGRESS FOR 1922.

Three hundred thirty-eight new members admitted.

One hundred seventeen reinstatements since September 9, 1921.

Hoo-Hoo is gaining recognition and support among the lumbermen. The future of the Order assumes a bright aspect, which is indicated in the splendid increase in new members and reinstatements.

## THE LUMBER JACK-SKY PILOT WILL ADDRESS TEXAS RETAILERS.

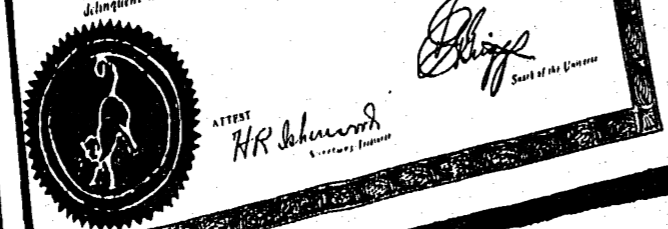

MEMBERS SIXTY-FIVE YEARS  
OF AGE AND OVER.

We again wish to bring to the attention of members in this class, the resolutions presented and adopted at the last annual meeting, at Fresno, California, September 9, 1921, of which the following is an excerpt:

"Resolved, That from this date, any member of Hoo-Hoo reaching the age of sixty-five years in good standing for 1922, and who has been a Hoo-Hoo in good standing for five prior years, shall be granted a card of honorary life membership by the Secretary-Treasurer. This card entitles him to all rights and privileges of Hoo-Hoo, excepting the death benefit.

"Further, a Hoo-Hoo at the age of sixty-five or over, who is delinquent, may be reinstated under the by-laws on payment of \$10.00. He will then receive the same privileges of honorary life membership.

The new life honorary membership cards are just off the press, and are being mailed to all members in good standing for 1922 who are sixty-five years of age and over. If you are in this class, and your 1922 dues paid, and do not receive your membership card promptly, we will appreciate receipt of advice from you to that effect.

## NEW DEATH BENEFIT CERTIFICATE.

The new death benefit certificate was received from our printer the latter part of January, and we have been mailing them out to all members in good standing as rapidly as possible.

Owing to the fact that it is necessary to refer to each individual's card record in our office, it is rather a slow task, but we hope to complete the work on or before April 1.

We have met with much delay in getting up this death benefit certificate, owing to the numerous details in connection therewith and with legal phases.

## For Lumbermen Only

Eligibility By-Laws of Concatenated Order  
of Hoo-Hoo and By-Laws Giving Instructions  
to Applicant, and to Officers Holding  
Concatenations.

## Membership.

**No. 2. ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP**—The membership of this Order shall be limited to white male persons of full age of twenty-one (21) years, of good moral character, who are identified with one or more of the following business classifications: Lumbermen, Foresters, Officers of Lumber Associations, Lumber Trade Press and Newspaper men; and so definitely shall the line of classification be drawn in each division that the occupation under which persons apply for membership shall be their main or principal occupation, and it shall be the business recognized in the community in which the applicant resides as his principal vocation.

## Eligibility—Specific Definition

**No. 3. LUMBERMEN**, who are engaged in the sale or manufacture of timber and logs, or the manufacture or sale at wholesale or retail of primary forest products (such as lumber, lath, shingles, ties, posts, piling, poles, staves, heading, boxes, sash, doors and millwork) either as owners, officers, managers of departments, general superintendents sales managers or salesmen.

**No. 4. FORESTERS**—This class shall include those persons graduated from recognized schools of forestry, officials of the forestry service and members of forest commissions or boards, either state or national.

**No. 5. OFFICERS OF LUMBER ASSOCIATIONS**—Regularly organized lumber associations, state or national.

**No. 6. LUMBER TRADE PRESS AND NEWSPAPER MEN**—Publishers, proprietors, members of the editorial staff or business department of trade or general newspapers.

**No. 7. ALLIED INDUSTRIES**—Such members of Allied Industries who have heretofore been eligible to active membership; applications in specific cases may be received by member of the Supreme Nine of jurisdiction in which said applicant resides. Said Supreme Officer to

present to members of the Supreme Nine for approval and upon such approval said application will be balloted upon in the usual way.

**No. 8. LIMITED ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP**—The active membership shall be limited to 9999 members in good standing.

## Mode of Electing or Rejecting Applicants at Concatenations.

**No. 9.** Each applicant for membership shall fully fill out the application blank which must be endorsed by three members of the Order in good standing. No action shall be had upon any application or petition until it shall have been reported upon or endorsed by the Vicegerent Snark and standing committee on membership of three members. Applications for membership shall be balloted on collectively. In case there are three or more black balls in the first ballot, each applicant shall thereafter be balloted upon separately, or the applicants may be balloted upon in groups of five. In case three black balls shall be cast in voting for an applicant singly, he shall be rejected. Any applicant rejected shall not be balloted on again within six months of the date of his rejection.

**No. 10.** If any Vicegerent shall knowingly or by culpable negligence admit to the initiatory ceremonies of the Order any person not legally entitled to same under the provisions of this article, he shall, upon due proof thereof to the Snark and Secretary-Treasurer, be removed from his office by the Snark, and, in the discretion of the Supreme Nine; if the violation be flagrant, be expelled from the Order; and any member of the Order who shall sign the certificate on any application herein referred to, if the facts stated in such application with reference to the present business interests of the applicant are not true, shall, upon due proof thereof submitted to the Secretary-Treasurer be expelled by the Supreme Nine. It shall be no defense that the member was deceived into signing the certificate. Any member endorsing certificate on an application for membership must know of his own personal knowledge the truth of the facts to which he certifies.

Encouraging Progress Made by  
Hoo-Hoo Memorial Grove  
Committee

The committee appointed at the thirtieth annual at Fresno, Calif., to investigate the possibility of securing a tract of redwood forest to serve as a Hoo-Hoo memorial, recently submitted their initial report which shows that unusual interest is being taken in the movement and that several favorable tracts are under consideration.

The report, submitted to Secretary-Treasurer Isherwood, is as follows:

"The committee, appointed at the last national convention of Hoo-Hoo to investigate and report on the possibility of our securing a redwood memorial grove, take pleasure in reporting progress to you, so that you may transmit the same to the House of Ancients and to the Snark of the Universe, Colonel E. G. Griggs, as follows:

"The committee has held one formal meeting in San Francisco and the San Francisco members of the committee have held several meetings with the officials of the State Forestry Department and also with the Secretary of the Save-the-Redwoods League, and considerable progress has resulted from their efforts.

"We have at the present time several redwood groves in view, consisting of tracts all the way from twenty to ninety acres. One of these tracts seems to be almost ideal for our purpose, and can be secured for a very reasonable sum, and we are hoping to secure the option on it at a price which seems to us in every way reasonable. This tract is a portion of a larger tract, which the state is negotiating for, and its borders, therefore, would not be encroached upon by the axe of the woodsman.

"The committee is expecting other proposals, and after selecting the best of the tracts offered, they will endeavor to secure an option until such time as Hoo-Hoo can act.

"The idea of the Hoo-Hoo Memorial Grove has been accepted with enthusiasm wherever the matter has been referred to, and, in fact, at the last meeting of the Southern California District held in Los Angeles on Friday evening, November 18, an unexpected development took place, which the committee hopes may start a similar action in other districts wherever Hoo-Hoo meets.

"At this meeting of the brethren in the Los Angeles district, Mr. David Woodhead presided, and there were present as visitors, C. D. Le Master of the Supreme Nine, Bolling Arthur Johnson of Chicago and George Cornwall of Portland, Oregon.

"The Snark made a report to the meeting on the convention at Fresno, and as a part of the report he mentioned the movement looking towards the establishment of the Hoo-Hoo Memorial

Grove. The action was regarded so favorably that the organization at once subscribed \$99.99 in order that it might have the honor of being the first Hoo-Hoo district to subscribe to the fund. George Cornwall, fired by the same zeal, desired to have the first individual subscription and subscribed a like amount, which was at once followed by similar subscriptions by D. Woodhead, Bolling; Arthur Johnson, A. C. Hamer, of the firm of Show and Hamer, Los Angeles; A. L. Hoover, representing Wendling-Nathan Company and the Pacific Lumber Company, and H. Browning.

"These subscriptions were announced as being payable as soon as the proper officer was appointed to receive funds.

"If every district will raise a like amount there will be no question whatever about getting the funds very quickly to pay for the property.

### EXCERPTS FROM PARSON SIMPKIN'S ADDRESS AT THE WESTERN RETAILERS' ANNUAL SALT LAKE CITY.

Parson Simpkin's address at the convention of the Western Retail Lumbermen's Association, held at Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, on February 18, was not only an oratorical gem, but was interesting and timely as well.

**OPTIMISM.**—I am bringing to you nothing but optimism. The true optimist stands before you facing the facts and pointing the way to better things. The man who talks to business men today without making them really see the facts is no friend of business. I am glad we can afford to be optimistic, as there is no other land in the world that can.

**ADJUSTMENT.**—What we need most is to get back to the old American simplicity of life. As the old restaurant sign read in war times: "Take one lump of sugar and stir like H ---," so we must organize our affairs.

**TRADE SOCIETIES.**—And as you organize yourselves, organize in your trade relationships. Of all the years you've been in business, this is the year when you can least afford to stay out of your trade societies. And the fellow who puts something into an organization is the fellow who takes the most out of it.

**PUBLICITY.**—There was never a year when the lumber business needed publicity as much as it does now.

**LUMBER TRADE PRESS.**—Never have the trade publications of the lumber industry been worth as much as they are now.

### HARMAN DEFINES HOO-HOO—ITS AIMS AND PURPOSES.

## MISSOURI

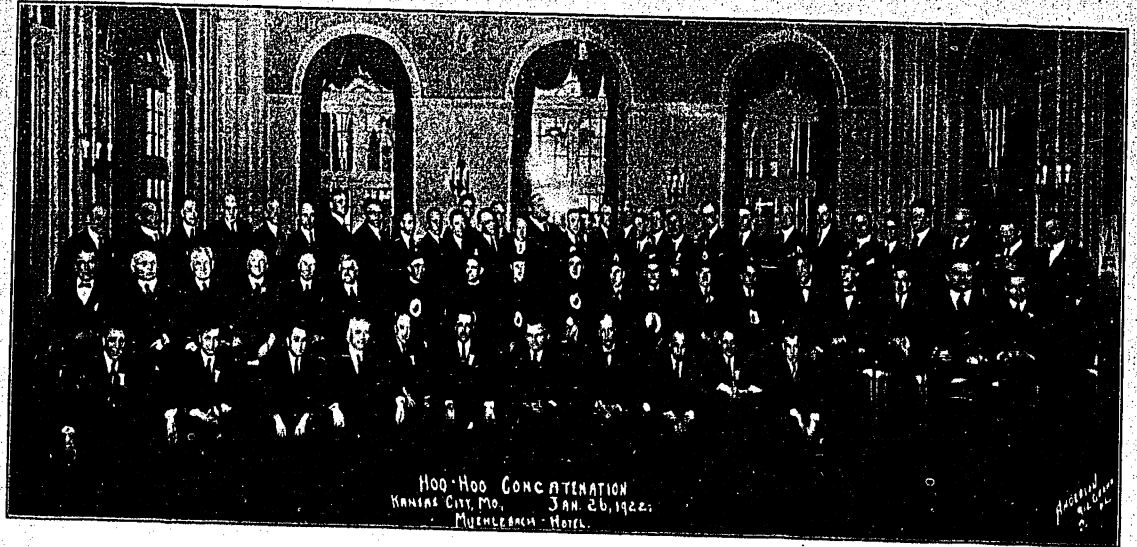
### THE K. C. HOO-HOO "CONCAT."

"For more than twenty years the 'Parson' has been pastor of Phillips, coming to Salt Lake in 1901.

"More marriage ceremonies were conducted by the 'Parson' than by any other minister in the state, his services being asked for from distances afar. Many young couples of all beliefs chose the 'Parson' as the right man to launch them on the sea of matrimony.

"Parson' Simpkin's ever smiling countenance was a familiar face at athletic contests, his special hobby being baseball, the 'Parson' being one of the most staunch supporters of the Bees.

The Rev. Mr. Simpkin was born at Lamberhead Green, Wigan, England. He started his ministerial work at the age of seventeen years, doing student preaching. Coming to the United States at the age of twenty-one, he was admitted to the Methodist ministry in 1890, serving a church in Wisconsin for four years.

"Mr. Simpkin then entered the Congregational ministry and engaged in

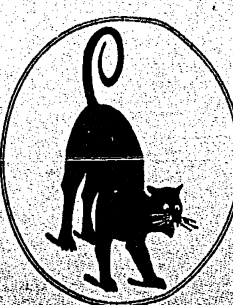

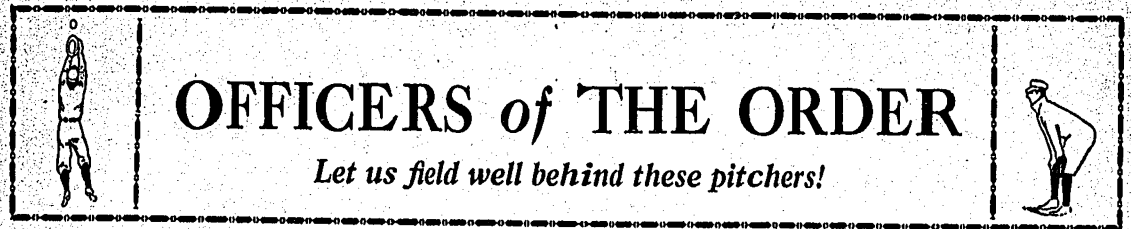
