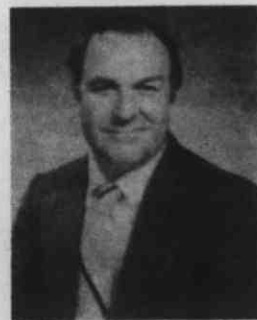
I suggest it is time, once again, to review the purpose and benefits of belonging to a Hoo-Hoo Club.

Hoo-Hoo, The Fraternal Order of Lumbermen

Convention delegates at the 1985 Northeastern Retail Lumbermen's Association's 91st Annual Convention may be confused to find at The Commercial Bulletin's Booth 8007, a large banner with a black cat standing on a log.

Of course, it will be a familiar sight to lumbermen who recognize it as the symbol of the International Order of Hoo-Hoo, the lumbermen's fraternal organization.

The Commercial Bulletin has agreed to share some of its booth space with the nonprofit lumbermen's club so that members of Hoo-Hoo from all over the Northeast will have a central meeting place, and also to promote the fraternity with people in the wood products industry who are not yet members.

To be a member of Hoo-Hoo an individual must be connected in some way to the lumber industry, as a manufacturer, wholesaler or retailer of wood products. The membership ranges from lumberjacks to truck drivers, from inside salesmen of forest products to millwork door & window (wood) distributors, to skidder operators in the woods.

Here in New England, Hoo-Hoo is well represented. There is the Granite State Hoo-Hoo Club of New Hampshire, the Nutmeg Hoo-Hoo Club in Connecticut, the Maine Hoo-Hoo Club, the Roger Williams Hoo-Hoo Club of Rhode Island, the Western Mass. Hoo-Hoo, and, of course, the largest Hoo-Hoo Chapter

in the world, the Harry L. Folsom Hoo-Hoo Club of Boston.

Hoo-Hoo International, as the name implies, is worldwide. There are clubs all over the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, in Australia, Canada, Europe and the Far East, and, as outgoing Snark of the Universe, Richard W. "Dick" Wilson of Georgia has said, "If they find a planet with trees on it, we'll establish a Hoo-Hoo club there too."

In case you are uninformed, the "Snark" is the highest office in Hoo-Hoo. Under the Snark, elected annually, the Hoo-Hoo organization is broken up into Jurisdictions (9) with a Representative of the Supreme Nine governing each territory. Jurisdiction One, Northeastern U.S., for example, is headed by Joe Kuezyński of Londonderry, who was elected to the post at the Hoo-Hoo International convention in Victoria, B.C. Joe will be on hand at Booth 8007 to greet Hoo-Hoo members during the convention.

Hoo-Hoo officers also include a Chairman of the Board, Richard Wilson of Georgia (outgoing Snark), 1st Vice President Al Meier of Tacoma, Wash., 2nd Vice President John K. "Jack" Jacobson of Vancouver; and Secretary-Treasurer, Bernard B. "Bernie" Barber of Fresno, Calif.

Birth of Hoo-Hoo

The Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo was born Jan. 21, 1892, in a parlor of the Old Hotel Hall, Gurdon, Arkansas, by five men on the road, one a lumber salesman.

One of the five, Bolling Arthur Johnson, the originator of the idea, said they delved into Egyptian lore for titles, customs and ritualistic suggestions. The Egyptians worshipped the cat, so a Black Cat with its tail curled as a figure 9 was selected as the emblem of the Order. The words "Hoo-Hoo" were coined,

some say from a tuft of hair on top of Johnson's head, and the word "Concatenated" meaning to "link together" was taken from a dictionary, and added to the name.

The mythical nine lives of the cat was used as a basis for the organization. There are Nine Jurisdictions, for example, and membership is limited to 99,999 members (not yet attained).

Hoo-Hoo is an international fraternal Order devoted exclusively to the interests of the Lumber industry. Its objectives are to encourage friendly relations, confidence and cooperation among lumbermen, and to foster all activities that benefit the Lumber Industry, and humanity. Hoo-Hoo-s also know how to have a good time.

Because of its widespread officership and chain of local clubs, and through its constructive work, Hoo-Hoo has established close contacts with the public and the press. Its Bizarre name, unique traditions, and splendid ethics have won the interest of the public, and its activities have turned this interest into admiration for the entire lumber industry.

Boston—The 20th Annual Lumber Industry Meeting of the New England Wholesale Lumber Assn. was held on Thursday, Oct. 18, 1984 at the Copley Plaza Hotel, Boston, Mass. The North American Wholesale Lumber Assn., which held its meeting at the same location the day before NEWLA's, also joined the lumbermen

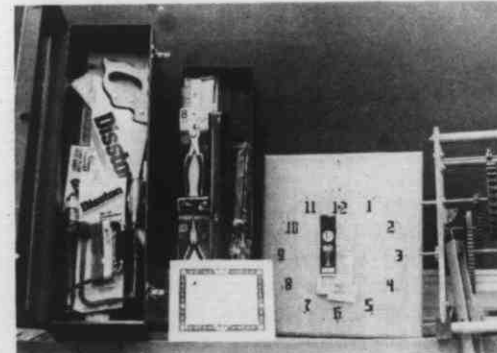

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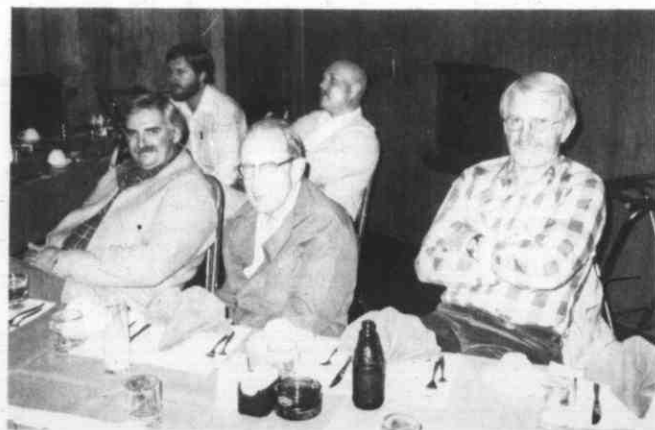

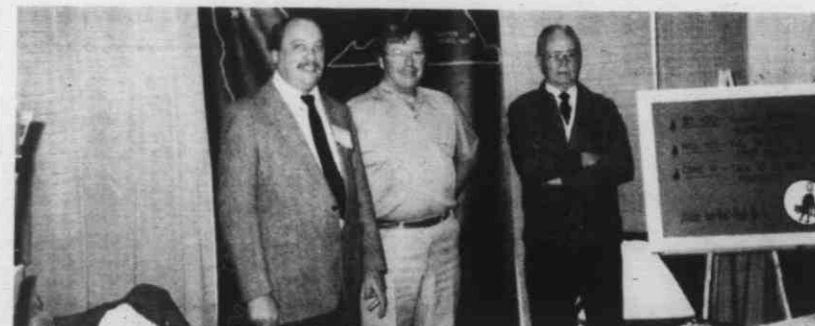
