#### Global Warming vs. Winter 1994

Environmentalists want us to believe the earth is heating up and that the ozone layer is being depleted. This theory has been disproved. Welcome to Winter 1994.

Because of the cold winter of January 1994, housing starts fell 12%, the lowest level in three years. We could have used this global warming on January 18th when it was 28 degrees below zero and 60 degrees below zero wind chill! It was warmer in Antarctica than it was here! Welcome to Winter 1994

Winter 1994 froze over Lake Superior, and perch fishing was all but nonexistent. Friday night fish fry lovers had to switch to salt water fish, such as perch and haddock.

Winter 1994 brought 49 inches of snow to my home in Genoa, Illinois. The Southern states of Kentucky, Georgia, and Tennessee were crippled by ice storms. Chest-high snows hampered gun removal from areas of Bosnia. Fifteen major storms have hit the East Coast. Records for the last 20 years show us Florida has become colder! Welcome to Winter 1994.

On May 19, 1993, Al Gore told the Washington Times "that increased accumulations of greenhouse gases, particularly CO2 cause global warming." Did you know that only 4% of greenhouse gases are created by man, and 96% are created by mother nature!

Here are some real facts that will back up there is no global warming because "trees shelter the world."

FACT: 1/3 of the U.S. is covered with forests

FACT: Our industry plants more than 8 million seedlings per day

FACT: We have more trees today than we did 70 years

FACT: We need trees to provide wood and wood byproducts to employee millions of people.

FACT: Today's mills practice an application of growth improving practices that assures a sustainable wood supply over the next decades.

## Information from the American Forest & Paper Association

(reprinted courtesy of the AF&PA)

The American Forest & Paper Association (AF&PA) is the national trade association of the forest, pulp, paper, paperboard, and wood products industry. AF&PA represents approximately 450 member companies and related trade associations (whose memberships are in the thousands) which grow, harvest and process wood and wood fiber; and produce solid wood products. As a single national trade association, AF&PA represents a vital national industry which accounts for over 7 percent of the total United States manufacturing output. Its members account for more than 90 percent of domestic paper and recycled paper manufacturing capacity. The forest products industry owns about 15 percent, 70.5 million acres, of the nation's 490 million acres of commercial forestland; and, in 1992, was responsible for planting 43 percent of the 1.6 billion seedlings planted in the U.S.

Employing some 1.4 million people, this industry ranks among the top 10 manufacturing employers in 46 states, with an annual payroll of approximately \$49 billion. The forest and paper products industry generates sales of \$200 billion annually and as a significant exporter to global markets makes an important contribution to the U.S. balance of payments.

#### CONSERVE ENERGY

From raw material extraction to finished product, the energy input is 70 times higher for a ton of lumber, and 17, 3.1 and 3 times higher for steel, brick and concrete block than for wood. (Corrim, 1976)

The rate that heat is conducted through a 2x4 steel stud is about two and a half times that conducted through a wooden stud. Sound transmission through steel is also greater. (USDA/Forest Service General Tech. Report RM-199, 1990)

Most of the wood that (Pacific Northwest) forests would have produced (if previous years' harvesting rates had been continued) will either come from somewhere else or be replaced by non-wood materials. (Salwasser, et. al., 1992)

Switching from wood to non-renewable structural materials will increase the nations's energy usage. In the Pacific Northwest alone, proposed harvesting reductions of 8.25 billion board feet below the 1983-1987 harvest would increase annual energy consumption an amount equivalent to 140.8 million barrels of oil, if the construction industry switched from wood to non-renewable structural materials such as steel, aluminum, concrete, brick and plastics. Carbon dioxide, a suspected major contributor to global warming, would be added to the Earth's atmosphere at an increased rate of 61.6 million tons annually, using the above scenario. (Koch, 1991)

As a construction material, and for an equivalent thickness, solid wood is 4 times more efficient as an insulator than cinder block, 6 times more efficient than brick, 15 times more efficient than concrete, and 1,770 more times efficient than aluminum. (Ashrae, 1989)

It is estimated that steel studs may require about 9 times more energy to produce and transport to the building site than wood studs; aluminum siding requires 4 times more energy, and brick veneer 22 times more energy compared to equivalent wood siding. (Koch, 1991)

#### IMPROVE AIR QUALITY

Woodlands consume carbon dioxide. Sequestration of carbon in trees is one way to reduce buildup of carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas in the atmosphere. (Zerbe, 1992)

Young forests act as carbon sinks and release oxygen at a far greater rate than mature forests.

Forests are important storehouses for carbon. However, they are carbon sinks only if we assume that biomass production or carbon sequestration is higher than decomposition. This only holds true in forests which are in a growing phase. Among these are the forests managed for sustained yield from which biomass or wood is harvested. (German Ministry for Food, Agriculture, & Forestry, 1990)

The environmental impact from forestry and wood processing is less detrimental than the mining and processing of comparable building materials.

For each 1 billion board feet of wood replaced with manufactured substitutes, annual energy consumption would increase by about 720 million gallons of oil and carbon dioxide emissions would increase by 7.5 million tons. (Koch, 1991)

#### ARE THE RENEWABLE RESOURCE

Wood is one of the most environmentally benign of all construction materials. It is virtually the only renewable resource that is economically suited for structural and architectural purposes. (Koch, 1991)

For the attention of all members. The bylaws are the regulations that you, as members and shareholders of Hoo-Hoo International, have put into place. It is a "living" document. The officers and directors you elect are governed by these regulations. The policies of Hoo-Hoo International are governed by these regulations.

Throughout the years there have been a number of specific revisions made reflecting changing needs of our Order. At the last annual convention the deletion of the word "male" necessitated a major rewrite. We have taken this opportunity to establish a Task Force Committee to review all our bylaws and to examine each word, each sentence, each meaning, and each intent. Language has been clarified and sections reorganized for easier reading. The draft you see here is the result of hundreds of hours of careful scrutiny involving over 30 revisions. A copy of the original bylaws can be found in your Operations Manual.





## **Wood Promotion Award** challenges clubs to promote use of wood

"Every Hoo-Hoo club should, on a continuing basis, have knowledgeable lumbermen available for speaking engagements, on wood promotion."



The Hoo-Hoo International Wood Promotion trophy is awarded each year to the club which is judged as having best promoted the use of wood, whether locally, nationally or internationally. It is a coveted award that has recently enjoyed a resurgence of interest among Hoo-Hoo clubs who compete for the award at each annual international convention. Perhaps your club could be the next winner of the Wood Promotion Award.

The purpose of a local Hoo-Hoo wood promotion project is to provide a local "grass roots" approach to wood promotion. The local program should supplement and tie in with the wood promotion activities of regional and national programs, because person-to-person contact and personal influence is a more effective method of selling our side of the wood resource story. Wood promotion projects should be designed to get the broadest local exposure possible to the greatest number of people and should be dramatic enough to have lasting value. Every person in a Hoo-Hoo club's center of influence (city, county and state) should be aware of the role the forest products industry plays in forest maintenance, use, and renewal.

SELECTION OF A WOOD PROMOTION COMMITTEE

The club president is responsible for wood promotion. He should appoint a wood promotion committee with a fireball type, self-motivated chairman to handle the wood promotion project. The club president or another club officer appointed by the president should maintain close contact with the wood promotion committee to be certain they are getting the job done. Committee members with sales experience, merchandising expertise, and public relations experience are the best types of members for the wood committee since a successful wood promotion project is actually a gigantic sales, merchandising, and public relations effort.

SPEAKERS, BUREAU OF WOOD PROMOTION Every Hoo-Hoo club should, on a continuing basis, have

knowledgeable lumbermen available for speaking engagements,

on wood promotion. Excellent programs on wood promotion are available from the various lumber associations like the American Plywood Association, Southern Forest Products Association, WWPA, California Redwood Association, etc., and from most lumber manufacturers like Georgia Pacific, Weyerhaeuser, etc. These organizations are most happy to supply local lumbermen with these programs for local use. The local chamber of commerce is a good place to advertise your wood promotion program, as they usually offer a speakers bureau brochure to their members and are most happy to have "Wood Promotion"

An active committee can initiate wood promotion programs for social and business groups like Rotary, Kiwanis, Optimist, Lions, Cosmopolitan Clubs, etc. These wood promotion programs are very popular with these groups.

Public and private schools are quite receptive to wood promotion programs. The students are eager to hear our story. and who could select a better audience to hear this important message than school children.

#### LOCAL EXPOSURE

Local public television is a natural for a local wood promotion program. Thirty minute program time for a "Forestry" presentation on public television can be purchased at extremely reasonable rates. Imagine the exposure available through the TV media. Proper publicity of your TV wood promotion through free ads can insure a good viewing audience when your show is

Radio, newspapers, and magazines are also good vehicles for wood promotion activities, and Home Shows and Trade Shows have in the past proven to be quite effective.

## **Wood Promotion Award**

### Rules governing club trophy

- The club may submit evidence covering all wood promotion projects adopted by the club, including National Forest Products Week.
- 2. The entrant club will make its presentation to the judges and the convention. Tangible evidence of the projects(s) must be submitted by the club delegate, who must be conversant with the project from start to finish as he may be interviewed by the judges. This evidence may consist of newspaper clippings, photos, scrap books, samples, or display material. A slide projector will be available.
- 3. Each participating club must submit a written outline of the wood promotion project(s) to contain the following: (a) A description of the project(s); (b) State the goal of the project(s); (c) Tell of the method of operation; (d) Specify the relative proportion of financial and/or manpower support from cooperating organizations; and (e) Statement of the results.
- 4. DO NOT SEND CLUB CONTEST MATERIALS TO THE INTERNATIONAL HOO-HOO OFFICE. The club delegate is responsible for all contest materials, and for providing the Log & Tally with a complete story for publication. The delegate may ship the materials, addressed to himself, in care of the convention hotel, marked "hold for arrival on September\_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 19\_\_\_\_."
- 5. Decision of the judges will be final. A club is eligible to be awarded the trophy in two or more consecutive years. In the absence of an acceptable club presentation, at the discretion of the judges the trophy may be retained in the International Headquarters for one year. In addition to the trophy, certificates will be presented to the clubs placing first, second, and third. No judge shall be appointed who is a member of a club making a competitive presentation.
- 6. Hoo-Hoo Clubs wishing to make a presentation for the trophy are requested to advise the International Office by letter prior to August 20th of each year.
- 7. Each of the following facets of a wood promotion project shall be rated by each judge, independently of the other, on a scale of 1 through 10 for letters C and D and 1 through 5 for letters A, B, E, and F, 10 being the best.
  - A Accomplishment based on size of the club.
  - B Involvement of members.
  - C Immediate effect on the community.
  - D Lasting effect on the community.
  - E Written presentation.
  - F Oral presentation.

## The Jack Cheshire Media Award

## Rules governing the Jack Cheshire Media Award

- 1. **Intention:** The intention of the award is to encourage and recognize media achievements of the clubs in Hoo-Hoo International. The award shall be for the best media efforts and achievements and recognizes the importance of Hoo-Hoo supporting itself and its sponsoring industry by the sensible use of this important vehicle.
- Titles: The name of the award shall be the JACK CHESHIRE MEDIA AWARD. The trophy plaque has been provided by Hoo-Hoo International and will serve as a perpetual award.
- 3. Eligibility and submissions: (a) All clubs in HHI are eligible for the award and may make a submission at the call of the HHI executive. (b) Each entrant shall provide full details of their media efforts by way of reports, clippings, photos, videos or films or any other evidence including audience. (c) Entrants shall provide its submission by the time stipulated by the international office, which is the 9th day of August preceding each annual convention. (d) The eligible media shall be newspapers, radio and television, either local or of wider circulation or coverage, and shall include the public media, forest industry media, and company or other in-house media. (e) Media coverage can include that of club activities to the public and to the industry, industry activities to the public or any other media coverage which promotes the activity and role of Hoo-Hoo. (f) Entrants shall provide the name(s) of the people who achieved this media result. (g) Entrants may provide


additional written comment explaining any special feature, local difficulties or any other factor which they feel should be considered by the judges. (h) Submissions can be made for single or a few outstanding media achievements during the Hoo-Hoo year under consideration.

4. Judging: The JACK CHESHIRE MEDIA AWARD shall be judged by the judging committee. The time of the judging shall be during the annual HHI convention. The selection of the winner shall be at the sole discretion of the judges and no right of appeal will be considered. The judges shall consider the following criteria when making the decision but have the right to decide the relative importance of each of the criteria.

5. Judging Criteria: (a) The primary criteria shall be the media exposure of the Order of Hoo-Hoo, its image and the role that Hoo-Hoo and the forest industries play. (b) Judges shall consider both the work put in (gaining media attention is hard work!) and the quality of the result. (c) Judges shall consider all the forms of the media-printed word, radio, and television. (d) The award shall be for the "media coverage" rather the "activity" since the "activity" may possibly be the basis of other Hoo-Hoo awards.

6. ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE WINNER OF THE AWARD AND PRESENTATION OF THE TROPHY: The winner of the award shall be announced by the judging panel at the HHI Annual Convention and shall be presented to a representative of the winning club.



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
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## Shasta Cascade Club #133 Community Involvement




Presentations were made to Chris Rogers 94176 for his effort in promoting Hoo-Hoo and also to Graeme Smith 74395 for his work over 30 years.


"The Effect of the Environmental Movement on US Forestry." By the way, Hoo-Hoo is very active in Georgia and sponsors student awards at the university.

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#### **COWICHAN VALLEY CLUB #229**

A fire in the workplace is something everyone in the lumber industry fears. A longtime member of the Cowichan Valley Hoo-Hoo Club, Jerry Doman, recently went through that gutwrenching experience.

Following is a reprint of an article that appeared in The Cowichan News Leader newspaper in Duncan, British Columbia, written by Robyn Swanson, that gives an account of the details:

A blaze that ravaged a Chemainus remanufacturing plant has jeopardized employment for 50 workers and threatened the livelihood of the plant's four owners.

"I felt sick," Chemainus Forest Products' co-owner Jerry Doman said about his reaction to the fire. "We all did. We're a hands-on operation and we've built this thing from the beginning."

Doman arrived on the scene at about 10 p.m. January 29 to find the plant's planer mill reduced to smouldering remnants.

"It was totally destroyed," he said.

It's not known what time the fire started but Chemainus's volunteer fire department received a call at about 9:20 p.m. By the time firefighters pulled up to the Trans Canada Highway location, the plant was engulfed in flames.

"My boys did the best they could," said Fire Chief Tom Millard. "It was fully involved."

He guessed that thick fog may have hampered early detection and helped the fire gain hold. Doman agreed.

"It was pretty socked in," he said. "(The fire) kind of looked like it was a glow."

Chemainus RCMP Sgt. Don Butler said the incident is being treated as an accidental fire.

Doman estimated the inferno caused more than \$1 million damage. The company is insured, but he hasn't determined the total associated costs.

While the fire razed the five-year-old planer mill, it hasn't flattened the owners' resolve to continue work and keep their staff employed. A handful of the 50 full-time employees returned to their jobs three days after the fire and Doman hoped the remainder would be back at work the following week.

Staff are attempting to ensure a less damaged portion of the mill would be in operation as soon as the main power source was in working order. The company has also made arrangements with Futura Forest Products Ltd. to lease a vacant planer.

"We hope it will keep our people working," said Doman. "It won't be a profitable venture for us but it will keep our business going."

The company will continue to buy rough cut lumber and manufacture it for worldwide export as well as carry out custom work for larger companies, Doman said. There may, however, be some delays.

"We're going to be behind and we might not make our deadlines," Doman said. "It's just one of those things."

Meantime, the Cowichan Valley Hoo-Hoo Club is contributing \$5,000 this spring to have students in School District 65 bused to the B.C. Forest Museum in Duncan and then back to their respective schools again, said president Mike Osborn.

This allows students to take part in the museum's educational program, something that hasn't always been possible in the past due to cutbacks in the school district. "Last year we didn't have many kids from the School District (at the museum), other than with their parents," said Osborn

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


