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FORESTRY DOINGS IN GENERAL



Recognition

That part of Past Snark's Dickason's report referring to "Reforestation and Conservation," one which is worthy of the attention and consideration of every Hoo-Hoo and lumberman, is further substantiated in the recognition and consideration by the highest official of the United States Forestry Service, as was first brought to his attention through the resolution approving Past Snark Dickason's recommendation which resulted in Chief Forester of U. S., Colonel Greeley, honorary member, No. 107, writing as follows:

"Dear Mr. Isherwood:

"My attention has been called to the report of your Committee on Resolutions, Constitution and By-Laws, in which endorsement is given to the plan of reforestation proposed by Mr. W. S. Dickason in his address at New Orleans, before the last annual convention of the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo. I was particularly gratified with that feature of his proposal which suggests the acquisition of tracts of land by local bodies of your Order, or groups of members, with a view to their reforestation and continued care. What you do under this modest, tentative plan of action may, I hope, develop into something much more extensive. Certainly its influence will be far-reaching. The Forest Service will be very glad to keep in touch with this undertaking and, if desired, to advise you in its development.

Upon receipt of the above letter we forwarded to Colonel Greeley, copy of our Annual Bulletin containing a complete report of Past Snark Dickason's Report and in return received the following letter:

"Dear Mr. Isherwood:

"I am very glad to receive and to have an opportunity to review the complete report of the annual meeting at New Orleans and to again express my interest and hope of success for the undertaking.

"I want to suggest the possibility of tying together the recommendations contained in the report with respect to the growing of timber on sample areas throughout the country and those concerning assistance to the Boy Scout movement. It seems to me it might be well worth while to choose the location of sample woodlands to be retained by the Hoo-Hoo with reference to their suitability for Boy Scout camps as well as their fitness for the growing of forest trees representative of the state for-

est conditions. I think you will appreciate the opportunity which exists, particularly if accommodations are provided for the Boy Scouts, to secure pretty wide advertisement of your forestry efforts in a way which would appeal strongly to the public imagination and at the same time impress upon the growing boys the importance of forestry and show its relation to the lumber industry.

Let us bring to your attention again that part of Resolution No. 1 of the Resolution Committee which was unanimously adopted and approved, referring to the "Reforestation and Conservation," recommended in Past Snark Dickason's report, which reads as follows: "In regard to all of the items of the Snark's report upon the question of forestry, the working out of forestry on various tracts of land in various parts of the United States and the general encouragement of the forestry idea amongst the whole of the membership of Hoo-Hoo is highly approved, and we believe ways and means should be arrived at for carrying it out fully."

Let us refer you to report No. 13 in the October issue of our Bulletin, under the title of "Cooperation of Boy Scouts in Forestry." As you will note, Colonel Greeley has referred not only to Past Snark Dickason's recommendation, but also to the above Resolution No. 13, which was presented by Brother R. H. MacKinnon, No. 18825, President of the MacKinnon Lumber & Pole Company of Shreveport, Louisiana. This offers us an opportunity to cooperate with the greatest organization we have in this country, the Boy Scouts, and let us hope that every district will become

SECRETARY WALLACE THANKS CHARLIE WILLIAMS.

Secretary H. C. Wallace of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, who accompanied the late President Harding on his trip through the Northwest and to Alaska last summer, has written a very interesting and unique letter to eleven-year-old Charlie Williams, lauding him for his reporting a forest fire and giving his assistance in quelling the flames, reports District Forester George A. Cecil. Here is the letter: "My dear Charlie:

"I have just been reading a report by Forest Supervisor Agee, in which he tells how you noticed some smoke in the forest and reported it to the section crew, and how you insisted that they go and look after it. He says that when they finally went to the place where you saw the smoke they found a fire was just getting under way in a fine young forest, and that they arrived just in time to put out the fire. Supervisor Agee says that when he went over the next day you went with him and you found some stumps and fallen trees still smouldering, and that you were of a great deal of help to him in covering these smouldering trees so that there would be no danger of the fire breaking out again. He says that this fire was in a very bad place and that if it had not been attended to promptly it would have burned a great deal of valuable timber before it could have been controlled.

"I am writing this letter to thank you on behalf of the Department of Agriculture, which is charged by Uncle Sam with taking care of our forests. By discovering this fire and getting the people to go to it promptly, you have rendered a very real public service, and you are entitled to the thanks of the Government. If I were in your part of the country I would go to some trouble to find you and shake hands with and tell you this personally. Since I can not do this, I am doing the next best thing, telling it to you by letter.

"I am sending you a few bulletins in which I think you will be interested. I think you will especially like the one on birds.

"Good luck to you, and if you are ever back here come and see me.

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WE BELIEVE

STATE COUNSELOR A. A. HOOD GIVES NINE REASONS FOR HOO-HOO.

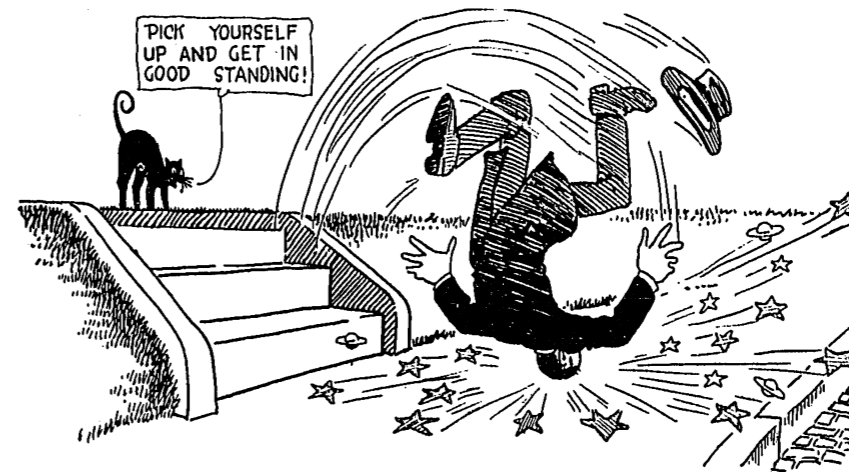

cial Organ of the club, "The Hoo-Hooter." Following is list of committees: Standing, Advisory, Entertainment, House, Program, Traffic, Fraternal, Finance, Publicity, Sponsor, Sports, Arbitration, Attendance, Research, Public and Roster Committees.

Hoo-Hoo Club Committee Organization and Duties.

The general instructions to all committees are as follows:

Hold one regular meeting of entire committee immediately after appointment.

Hold as many additional meetings as is necessary to accomplish one hundred per cent efficiency in committee activities.

Make frequent reports to President. Make semi-annual reports to club at annual business meeting.

Chairman will send copies of all committee communications to other committee members.

Take charge of one regular meeting of the club per year.

All committees are appointed for one year.

Chairman should appoint Vice-Chairman to act in case of emergency.

Every committeeman should consider his committee's work as his personal obligation.

Program Committee.

The duties of the Program Committee are as follows:

To prepare the serious side of the program for the regular bi-monthly luncheons, as well as other meetings of the club.

To introduce speakers to the club.

To arrange for speakers far enough in advance to make certain of an adequate program available for each meeting.

House Committee.

The duties of the House Committee are as follows:

To prepare a set of rules, regulations, and by-laws governing the club, and have sufficient copies made of same for distribution to the entire membership.

Conduct all business pertaining to the house items of club affairs.

Recommend to the board of directors the amount of the individual annual dues of the members of the club.

Finance Committee.

The duties of the Finance Committee are as follows:

Report when called upon as to the financial condition of the club.

The auditing and approval of all bills for payment.

Publicity Committee.

Preparation of identification badges to be worn by each member and their guests.

Visiting and care of the sick.

Reports of accidents, sickness, deaths, births, marriages, and other items of interest with regard to members.

Origination of stunts to produce better fraternal feeling.

Public Affairs Committee.

The duties of the Public Affairs Committee are as follows:

To make recommendations as to club's policy on public affairs.

To investigate all causes and organizations sending propaganda to us for any purpose whatever.

Promote cooperation in inter-club relationship.

Attendance Committee.

The duties of the Attendance Committee are as follows:

To get out the fullest possible attendance at each meeting.

To secure one or two inexpensive attendance prizes to be drawn for at each meeting.

Registering attendance. (It is suggested that you have slips prepared for the members to sign before they enter the room where the luncheon is held. All the information necessary on these slips would be the name of the member and his guests, if any.)

Registering guests. (It is suggested that you secure a book with a page for each meeting, on which the guest can register his name, address, and kind of business he is in. Also their luncheon affiliation, if any.)

The check of the attendance of each meeting against the membership list, and the report at each meeting of the present attendance.

Notification to the house committee of what you expect at each meeting in the way of attendance.

Origination of ideas and contests to promote better attendance.

Sports Committee.

The duties of the Sports Committee are as follows:

To discover the individual club member's tastes and preferences in indoor and outdoor sports.

To arrange games, contests, hunting, and fishing trips, etc., which will bring together members who are fond of the same sports.

Prizes for the day were donated by the Northwestern Lumbermen's Association.

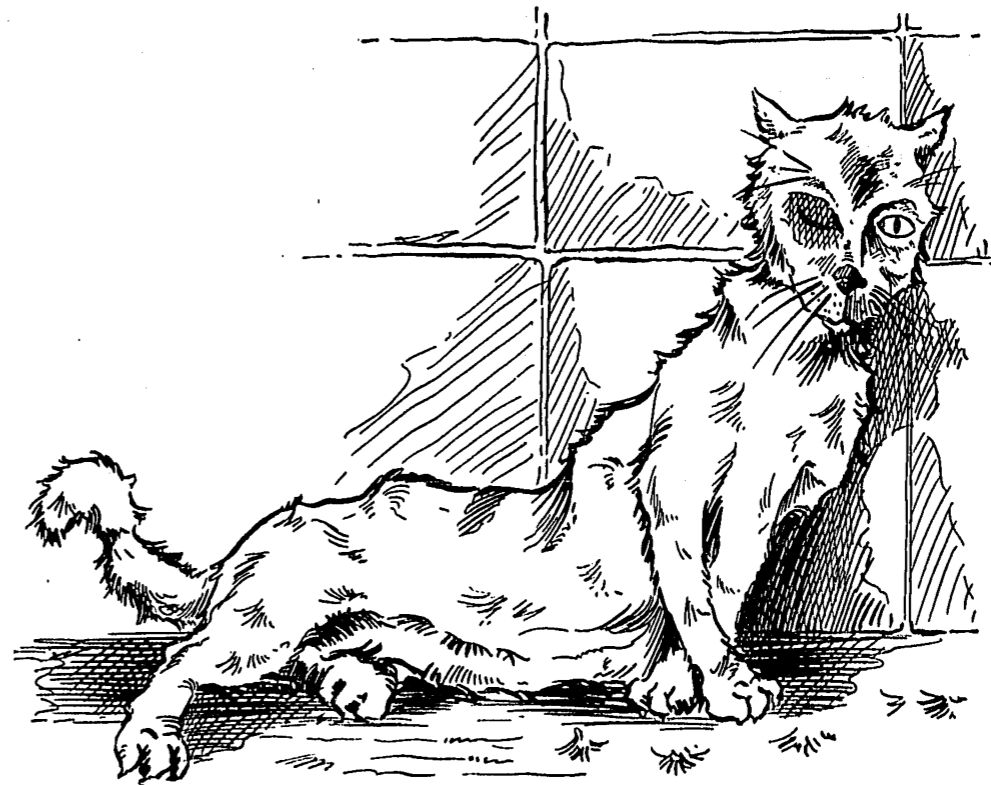
DINNER DANCE AT BEAUMONT.
