


My report of a year ago was not read at the Vancouver convention, neither were parts of it published in Log & Tally. I will repeat two important developments in the past two years.

There has been much mention made of the possibility of shifting the present Hoo-Hoo Grove to one more accessable. This was thoroughly investigated by Committee member Al Bellwith Newton Drury of the Save the Redwoods League. Any groove more accessable and with not as good timber would cost an additional \$50,000. The committee did not pursue

such a move further. Eventually the Hoo-Hoo Grove will have good access when the freeway is built along the east boundary of the park and the Park Dept. obtains the buffer strip between the east boundary of the park and the freeway. Then the Park Dept. will put East Ridge Road in good condiition, not only to provide access to the existing groves in that area but also to make additional groves more saleable.

Now for the good news, as to the present value of the Hoo-Hoo Grove. This was purchased in 1969 for \$12,400 of which Hoo-Hoo members contributed \$6,200 and the State matched this amount. An appraisal was made a year ago in August by the Save the Redwoods League and valued at \$200,000. It is today valued at \$250,000. This is based on a cruise of the timber on the 10 acres of 100,000 feet per acre and the million feet of Douglas Fir and Redwood valued at \$200.00 per Board feet plus the value of the land. This tells the story of the value.

As I proposed some three years ago that we develop a slide program of the Grove, but this is slow in coming. Ihave some good pictures of the trees, better pictures of the people involved from the day of dedication to the present. Former Gov. Ronald Reagan mentioned at a luncheon meeting that if you see one redwood tree you see them all. So it is with taking pictures. Take a picture of one big tree, then a picture of the next big tree and they both look alike. Also because of shadows, from real dark to bright sunlight it takes the best of equipment. Leonard has this equipment and should have a good slide program. Perhaps some day we can get together on this and develop a tray of eighty slides for showing to all clubs.

I have been asked several times as to the title of the Hoo-Hoo grove. This property is in the States Park System. Land is purchased by the Save the Redwoods League and resold to individuals or organizations and put into the Parks system which match funds in an equal amount. Any monies received by the Save the Redwoods League is used to purchase additional land.

All committee members are enthusiastic about the project, it is a good Hoo-Hoo International asset.

Report From Juris VIII

Jurisdiction VIII in Mid-America includes the states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa. This past twelve months has been successful for most of the clubs in Jurisdiction VIII.

This last year I have attended Concats of the Central Minnesota Club #91, Iowa Club #102, Omaha Club #124, Southern Minnesota Club #150, Hawkeye Club #193 in addition to many other regular meetings and the popular annual Christmas Party of Southern Minnesota Club #150 which was held at Rochester, Minnesota was very enjoyable.

In visiting the various clubs I found a good deal of effort has been spent this last year in obtaining new members and collecting of dues. Tree's Friend Is "Cold" Person

To a tree, Greg Brown is a "cold" person.

On more than one occasion he has calmly watched little seedlings freeze to death.

Then he has torn apart the seedlings—right down to their cells—to find out why some trees are more cold-hardy than others.

The "autopsies" are beginning to pay off. The University of Missouri—Columbia professor of forestry had identified factors ranging from a "supercooling" phenomenon to a built-in "antifreeze" that could help us have more cold-hardy trees in the years ahead.

And he and his colleagues have isolated and identified a glycoprotein (a protein bound with sugars) which binds the water in the cells and keeps it from turning into ice. They found the glycoprotein in black locusts, well-known for their

hardiness. Similar glycoprotein has been found in fish which live in the Antartic Sea.

Brown's basic research findings will be used by plant breeders who will now be better able to select for cold hardiness. Others will use his information to develop chemicals that will stimulate plants to produce glycoprotein or other forms of plant "antifreeze."

Manufacturers are already selling cyro (cold) protectants which basically slow plant growth. "Dormant plants are more hardy." explained Brown.

The UMC research will help protect trees from early fall freezes and late spring freezes—something that would be worth millions of dollars to the fruit and nursery industries.

"And by extending a tree's hardiness, we could introduce desirable species into areas where they couldn't grow before," said Brown.

One of the most cold-hardy trees is the black locust. It survives harsh weather much better than the hickories, black walnuts, red-buds, cottonwoods and others.

Brown said there are three main reasons for the black locust's coldtoughness.

One is the glycoprotein explained earilier.

Another is that the locust, like other cold-hardy plants, has a special type of cell membrane that tends to keep ice out of the plant's cells. The membrane also allows water to move out of the cells more quickly. Without water in them, ice can't form.

"It's the formation of ice that kills the cells," said Brown. "If this happens in the 'vital' parts of the tree—like the bud tips—results are fatal. Fruit production is lost for at least a year, and the tree may never recover."

Another factor which makes trees more cold-hardy is the "supercooling" phenomenon. "Without going into a lot of physiology." said Brown, "some plants have mechanisms which tend to keep ice crystals from forming. For example, in trees like black locusts, cellular ice crystals won't form until cell sap reaches 15 degrees Farenheit or below."

Another minor reason for black locust's toughness is their built-in "antifreeze."

"Living cells contain lots of sugars and other organic substances which act as an antifreeze," said Brown. "Just like the antifreeze in your car, they lower the freezing point and protect plants at colder temperatures."

Now that UMC researchers have identified the processes which affect cold-hardiness, Brown said the next step is manipulating these processes—for the benefit of trees and their friends.

So you see, Greg Brown isn't such a "cold" person after all.
