

With spring springing all over and summer just a hot day away, there are two little girls in Washington D.C. just waiting for the mercury to climb. Not that that's slowed them down much...

First daughters Malia. age 10, and Sasha, age 7, got their big surprise after school Wednesday, March 5, 2009, when they arrived home from school and found a brand-new swing set from Rainbow Play Systems of Brookings, South Dakota, in their backyard. "They squealed with delight upon seeing it," a spokeswoman for the first lady said.

President Obama and his wife, Michelle, went to work while the girls were at school, arranging for the set to be installed on the south grounds of the White House within sight of the Oval Office, where their father spends plenty of time.

Late last year as the couple planned the family's move to Washington, they talked about ways to make the historic residence feel more like home for their girls, said Katie McCormick Lelyveld, a spokeswoman for Michelle Obama.

"It was an honor the owner of Rainbow Play Systems, Greg Foster, didn't take for granted and enjoyed throughly," said Rick Cornell, Rainbow's Director of Lumber Purchasing and member of Club 118. When Greg, his wife and team arrived at the White House, the girls had not gone to school yet so they were lead in to the basement of the White House and had breakfast with the staff.

About 1:30 PM, the crew had just finished picking up and out comes the President. He shook all their hands and then the First Lady and her mother came out with the kids who ran to the new set screaming all the way. President Obama said to Greg, "Your swing set is a hit". A little while later as Sasha was looking out the glass bubble and pounding on it, Greg said to Mr. Obama, "Look Dad, she's trying to get your attention." Greg later thought, "Wow, I just called the President, 'Dad'." Mr. Obama shook everyone's hands again and said thank you and he told the kids to do the same. Mrs. Obama, like all good moms, then told them they had to go inside and do their homework.

As a special present to the White House, Rainbow gave them a large picnic table made of 4x10 Clear redwood where he had routed out a space for 44 brass plaques. In each routed spot they had the name of every U.S. President. Mr. Obama thought it was wonderful and thanked Greg, telling him they would have several picnics on it. According to Greg it all turned out perfect. It was a day he and the Rainbow staff will never forget. We are now part of White House history!

The swing set, which includes three regular swings, a tire swing and a tree house, sits near the White House pool and the horseshoe pit. It is emblazoned with a plaque proclaiming that it is "Malia and Sasha's Castle."

in 2008 and 12% in 2006. I want to encourage those clubs that have been participating to continue and hope that more of us can find a way to raise funds for this project. Our children deserve the truth about our industry and this program has been a great success in getting that truth to some of our teachers.

Although the Temperate Forest Foundation may be the cornerstone of our education initiatives we should not forget the other educational and charitable projects that are funded by many of our clubs. Jurisdiction V maintains and operates the Evan's Lake Forest camp North of Vancouver, B.C., where hundreds of children have learned first hand the value of the forests. Several of our clubs fund scholarships for forestry students. The Twin Cities Club #12 sends 10 teachers or more each year to the Forestry tours and built a Habitat for Humanity home several years ago. The NW Montana Club #187 supports 'The Logjam" which is a fund for logging families who have lost a loved one to an accident at work. Jurisdiction II continues to support the "Project Learning Tree" which is aided by set aside money at HHI. Our brother's and sister's "down under" have similar projects. The book about the forest products industry that they had published and distributed to the schools in Australia is a huge success and they should be praised for the effort that was put into it. Lastly I am always impressed with the High School Woodworking contest that the Spokane #16 puts on each spring. I am sure I missed many other projects but I just want all of you to understand that these projects are at the center of Hoo-Hoo.

As in everything we are involved in during our lives, we should always remember one thing that I have learned through Hoo-Hoo. There is nothing wrong with making something fun and enjoyable. Perhaps this is why Hoo-Hoo has survived for 117 years. People always go back and do the things that are enjoyable. I am looking forward to 6 more months of Hoo-Hoo travel and suspect there will be a good deal of fun involved.

We will be convening in Reno, Nevada, this September, for our annual conference and convention. I want to invite all of you to consider joining us this year. Museum Dedicates the new Ernie Wales Wing

After several months of planning and building, the Ernie Wales Wing of the Hoo-Hoo Museum was dedicated on March 7, 2009, during the mid-year Board of Directors meeting in Gurdon.

The new structure is designed to blend in seamlessly with the existing log structure. Under the direction of the Chairman of the Museum Board, Rameses 93 Teeny Johnston, and HHI Executive Secretary Beth Thomas, the pole construction was done by local contractor Jimmy Hogue.

HHI NEWS ROUND-UP

The original log building was built during the 1930's by the WPA and was used for many years as Gurdon's City Hall. Hoo-Hoo negotiated a 50-year \$1/year lease for the building in 1982. Since then we have added to the structure twice before, once in 1986 and again in 1996. The new addition will provide much needed storage for records and museum artifacts allowing for exhibits to rotate in the public displays.

"The nice thing is if we need additional office space someday, we can easily convert the new space for that use," commented Beth Thomas. "In the meantime, having a well organized storage structure as well as space to properly catalogued Hoo-Hoo artifacts will be wonderful."

The money needed for the new construction came from donations from individual members and clubs, plus a very generous \$10,000 donation from Gurdon's Horace C. Cabe Foundation.

The project is named in memory of our last Seer of the House of Ancients, Ernie Wales, who passed away February 14, 2008, at the age of 81. The original fundraising was started last summer by Bill Lentes and Joanne Jones during a meeting at Ernie's home club Spokane 16. After pitching the idea at the HHI Convention in Tacoma, the funding was well underway and sent over the top by the Cabe Family.

HHI Gets new Gavel

At the 2008 International Convention in Tacoma, Snark Yeakel mentioned to VP Jim Spiers that after his name plaque was put on the handle of the Snark's gavel there would be no room for any more. Jim offered to have a native friend of his, John Henderson from the Kwakwakuwak Nation of Weiwaikum Band in Campbell River, BC, make a new one. The new gavel will be passed on to future Snarks for use at meetings.

Jim Spiers grew up in Campbell River with many of the talented members of the Henderson family. John Henderson is the second youngest of seventeen children all of whom are carvers, artists and makers of native jewelry. The carving talents and skills were passed on from their father, master carver Sam Henderson Sr. John learned to carve by watching his father work in the shed next to their home and learned his father's unique style which is from Naxuwakduk (Blunden Harbor) where his father was originally from.

John's work can be found throughout museums and galleries in the Pacific Northwest. All of the Henderson family are very giving and are always the first to donate to local charities and fundraisers. Many of the Henderson family have been commissioned by collectors around the world to do carvings and artwork. Proudly, this generation is working closely with their children to pass on not only the carving and artistic talents, but also their heritage. John's given crest, the eagle, and his given Indian name (Tl'Wakgila) were passed on to him at a memorial Potlatch in the early 70's.

Jim has spent many hours in the Henderson's carving shed, sitting by the potbellied stove with a tall cool one watching John and his siblings carve masks, totem poles and paddles. To be there and watch the designs emerge from scratch is truly a wonderful experience. We are honored to have this master carver's work now part of Hoo-Hoo's history.



Spokane Club 16

The Hoo-Hoo Club of Spokane, on behalf of the Forest Clinic Foundation, continued its scholarship program for college forestry students. One thousand dollar scholarships were awarded to Michael Coey, Colin Longworth, and Jacob Wells, all students at the University of Idaho. In their scholarship applications,

each student was asked to identify a primary forest management problem and suggest a solution.

Michael Coey sees the primary forest management problem to be one of neglect caused by reduced budgets and fewer managers. Reduced harvests resulting in over mature trees increase the fuel load and the potential for catastrophic fires. He suggests reinstituting the small sales program largely scrapped during the Clinton Administration. This program, for example, gives managers the flexibility to deal with localized pathogen outbreaks allowing eradication before they become epidemic.

Colin Longworth believes that politics have been allowed to interfere with good forest management. Politicians lack the vision of managers trained to deal with the dynamics of such problems as climate change, insect infestations, plant diseases, fires, etc. He believes that on-the-ground

foresters should be given a larger say in the decision making process. Too much management is being done from the office and boardroom.

Jacob Wells suggests that continuing education is the key to solving the problems of forest management. Managers need to keep up with forest research and new management practices. For example, harvesting methods have been developed to minimize soil disturbance, fish friendly stream crossings constructed, and climate change needs to be considered in seed selection. Supervisors need to ensure foresters include continuing education as part of their career progression. Class and field work should be used to expose managers to the latest research and management practices. Relevant scientific journals and research reports should be readily available to field managers.

Debbie Knudsen, from the University of Idaho, also submitted a strong scholarship application. She suggests that many forest managers are forced to react to problems rather than being proactive through public education programs. Reacting to problems adversely affects public relations and is detrimental to gaining public support for new management practices. Forest managers need to do more public outreach such as free seminars, school visits, education booths at public events, displays in public arenas, newspaper fliers, etc.

Hoo-Hoo Announces Proposed By-Law Changes

The HHI Board of Directors at their mid-year board meeting in Gurdon on March 7, 2009, approved and recommended to the membership the following proposed HHI By-Law changes:

First Change:

Article 2: Membership – Section 1: Eligibility *presently states:*

The membership of this Order shall be limited to persons of full age of eighteen (18) years, with the local club having the option to raise the age of eligibility to twenty-one (21) years. These persons shall be of good moral character who are actively identified with, or retired from, one or more of the following business classifications as their main or principal occupation:

- (a) Those persons who are engaged in the growing, production, manufacturing and distribution of forest products at any and all stages and in any and all forms.
- **(b)** Those persons in industry, journalism, education and government engaged in forestry including members of related boards, commissions, and associations.
- **(c)** Those persons representing the forest products trade at any and all stages and in any and all forms.
- (d) Those persons engaged in the transportation of forest products at any and all stages and in any and all forms.
- **(e)** Those persons engaged in the production, manufacturing and distribution of forest products equipment at any and all stages and in any and all forms.

It is the responsibility of the local club to determine the legitimate eligibility of any and all candidates under all the By-laws of the Order before their application is presented to the International Board of Directors for approval.

The HHI Board of Directors proposed the HHI By-Laws be amended to state: The membership of this Order shall be limited to persons of full age of eighteen (18) years, with the local club having the option to raise the age of eligibility to twenty one (21) years. These persons shall be of good moral character who are *engaged in the forestry product industry or any person genuinely interested in supporting the purpose and aims of our order*.

It is the responsibility of the local club to determine the legitimate eligibility of any and all candidates under all the By-laws of the Order before their application is presented to the International Board of Directors. (Note: "for approval" is dropped)

Second Change:

Section 8: Action in Writing or by Facsimile *presently states:*

Any action of the Board of Directors that can be taken at an Annual or Special meeting of the Board may be taken by the majority written consent of all members of the Board of Directors. Written submissions may in all instances be received by mail or by facsimile. The Secretary-Treasurer shall cause such actions to be recorded in the minutes of the Corporation.

The HHI board is proposing Section 8: Action in Writing or by Facsimile be changed to read as follows:

Any action of the Board of Directors that can be taken at an Annual or Special meeting of the Board may be taken by the majority written consent of all members of the Board of Directors. Written submissions may in all instances be received by mail, *facsimile*, or *electronically*. The Secretary-Treasurer shall cause such actions to be recorded in the minutes of the Corporation.

In order to make these proposed changes to the HHI By-Laws there must be a two-third affirmative vote of those present and voting at the HHI convention and there must be a notification of such intended amendments published in the Log & Tally at least 60 days prior to the opening date of the annual Convention.


