

We have been working diligently to achieve our objectives in an effort to move Hoo-Hoo forward.

At the onset of my term, the board adopted an annual strategic plan to guide its actions towards achieving the objectives laid out for 2016. Committees, made up of willing participants from throughout Hoo-Hoo were formed. The 2015/2016 strategic plan objectives were assigned to the appropriate committees. Here is what your committees have achieved to date:

THE ADVERTISING COMMITTEE established a formal advertising program promptly, and began promoting and selling advertising for the 2016 Log & Tally year. The advertising revenue raised by the committee was the most in my memory and while short of the goal of \$20,000 still came in at roughly \$16,000, and was a home run in my book. The advertising program was established to give us an organized and effective approach to selling advertising going forward which helps to offset the cost of producing the LOG & TALLY. THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE is developing a membership kit that will be made available to all local clubs to help them establish and increase their new membership as well as retain existing members. The new kit will include an updated tri-fold full color promotional piece and an equally impressive Hoo-Hoo value points post card.

THE OPERATIONS MANUAL COMMITTEE is in the process of updating the operations manual which is an important go-to guide for local Hoo-Hoo clubs.

THE WEBSITE COMMITTEE is completing the new website development and implementation. The new website should go live very soon. The improvements to the website will make a visit to it more interactive and offer many exciting features including credit card transaction capability and an individual website template for all local clubs to populate and use. We would love to hear your feedback as the site development is dynamic and work in progress.

THE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE is reviewing the bylaws and making recommendations to the board for potential updates and improvements.

THE LEGISLATION AND GOOD OF THE ORDER COMMITTEE is reviewing bylaw updates and potential amendments for submission at the general meeting.

THE FOREST PRODUCTS EDUCATION COMMITTEE has assembled a universal program that all clubs can use as a plug-and-play club project that will give back to the community they serve as well as the forest products industry. The GAP program (graduate and prosper) will help school kids complete their education, give them a better understanding of our industry and provide a snapshot of their future potential as a member of it.

We increased our number of board meetings by adding a special board meeting to coincide with the Forest Festival in Gurdon, AR on Halloween of 2015. The meeting was very productive. We finalized our strategic plan and established a sub-committee to review investment options for our LP stock gift and excess working capital. During the festival we handed out Halloween candy to kids while marching in the Forest Festival parade, judged a Halloween costume event, and supported the local Gurdon community by bidding for everything at the Festival auction! If you have not been to Gurdon, it is a must-see. The Hoo-Hoo museum is an absolute gem.

I am extremely proud of what we are accomplishing in Hoo-Hoo. Everyone's efforts are rooted in the desire to move Hoo-Hoo forward by creating value for the local clubs and all members. - **4.** Performing a formal and standard concatenation ceremony as described in the operations manual and explaining the value of Hoo-Hoo is valuable to new members and they very much appreciate the tradition.
- **5.** Promoting the value that Hoo-Hoo provides is the key to growing our membership. Product knowledge is the key to successful promotion.
- **6.** Expand your club membership base to all who are affiliated with the forest products industry. Invite them with a personal touch and they will come.
- **7.** Participate at all levels of Hoo-Hoo if you are so inclined. Your club needs you.

As I know you are, I am proud to be a part of the greatest industry on the planet and honored to be able to participate in it and give back to it through Hoo-Hoo. Where the Rainforest Meets the Reef for the 124th HHI Convention September 8–13, 2016 9 Cairns, North Queensland, Australia Hosted by Far North Queensland Hoo-Hoo Club 261

Hoo-Hoos will gather in Cairns, Australia, this fall for an outstanding meeting of international dimension where the rainforest meets the reef. Convention host R97 Ray Lamari promises he is pulling out all the stops in planning a memorable time for all. Besides official convention activities (which will involve the embalming of a certain Surfin' Snark), plans are in place for day trip adventures that will bring the convention slogan to life.

The Great Barrier Reef, one of the seven wonders of the natural world, will be our destination for one convention day. Larger than the Great Wall of China and the only living thing on earth visible from space, the reef is one of Australia's most remarkable natural gifts. Blessed with breathtaking beauty, the reef contains an abundance of marine life and comprises of over 3000 individual reef systems and coral cays. It is the world's largest marine park and stretches over 3000km (1800 miles) along the Queensland coast from Lady Elliot Island, off the coast of Bundaberg, and up past the tip of Cape York.

Our *Reef Magic* adventure, will take us out for an afternoon of exploring the underwater grandeur of this incredible eco-system.

GLIDE ABOVE THE RAINFOREST CANOPY

As part of our convention time in Cairns, we will spend the day discovering the rainforest. Our adventure starts with a breathtaking journey on one of the world's most scenic train routes through hand-hewn tunnels and across bridges. The train will stop at Barron Gorge to view the amazing falls before arriving at the beautiful Kuranda Station. Here we have free time to explore the quaint village before departing for our Skyrail journey over the beautiful canopy of the rainforest.

Kuranda is a lovely little village 984 feet above sea level. The main street (about two football fields long) is comprised of cafes, restaurants and shops hosting arts and crafts. The village has three different markets, a butterfly sanctuary, bird world, koala gardens, mini crystal museum, and much more.

A short shuttle bus ride out of the village center will take us to the Rainforestation Nature Park which offers activities such as the Wildlife Park and the Pamagirri Aboriginal Experience. Here you can learn to play the didgeridoo, discover the medicinal values of bush tucker, throw a spear and enjoy professional theatre incorporating traditional Aboriginal dance, fire making, storytelling, and more.

Next, the Skyrail Rainforest Cableway experience will have you gliding just feet above the rainforest canopy. During the trip you will decend through tree top layers and deep into the heart of the forest for stops at two rainforest mid-stations creating the ultimate tropical experience.

These are some of the incredible things planned on just one day to make this a truly great international convention. We hope you will make the decision to come join in all the Hoo-Hoo frolics and fun.



Neither Hoo-Hoo International nor any of its jurisdictions, officers, directors, or members will participate in, meet for the purpose of, or even authorize any discussions, agreements, comparisons or other conduct which could be construed as or give rise to an inference of contracting, conspiracy, combination, tying, unfair competition, monopolization, pricing or any other activity which would lead to an inference of restriction of competition, price fixing, markups, discrimination, market allocation, or any other conducts prescribed by the Sherman Antitrust Act, the Clayton Act or any other state or federal law relating to competition.

Vancouver Club 48 is passionate about forest education. As most folks who follow our updates know, we dedicate significant time and money to the Evans Lake Forestry Camp in Squamish, BC — but that's not our only educational interest. For many years, our club has sponsored web hosting for a local tour group called the Festival of Forestry.

Launched in 1967 by veteran coastal-logger Bill Moore, this group of volunteers have focused their time and attention on taking urban teachers into rural forest-dependent communities. The impact on teachers is impressive, one teacher told us, "This tour was an incredible learning experience for me. Coming from the city, I never realized all that went on to bring me my wood and paper".

The Festival of Forestry is a non-profit organization committed to providing quality professional development experiences for school teachers.

Their annual tours—accommodating up to 20 participants—provide an interactive learning experience to enhance teachers' understanding of the complexities of sustainable forest management, and methods to integrate information into their classes.

Tours immerse teachers in resource-based communities where they interact with the people most connected to resource issues. Activities include hikes in various forest ecosystems, visits to active forest management areas, protected areas, and tours of processing facilities. Presenters represent a wide range of interest areas providing a clear balance of perspectives.

Activities include tree identification, wildlife habitat issues, water quality and other riparian considerations in forest management, soil characteristics, ecosystem management, conservation and preservation of sensitive and special areas of the forest, forest management and harvesting as well as the social and economic values we gain from the forest.

The best part for the teachers is that the entire three-day adventure is absolutely FREE!





Whether in the woods or touring log decks and mills, the teachers were always learning something new to take back to their classes.



Hands on field learning with a professional logger gave the teachers a chance see first hand the professionalism that goes into the job.



Every opportunity was given to better learn about and understand the forest products industry and its value to us all.

This past summer, the forests of Vancouver Island became a classroom for sharing the many values that forests provide. Teachers learned that forestry is about much more than trees!

Day One included a tour of family-run Headquarters Creek woodlot where non-timber forest products are harvested alongside about fifty logging trucks a year of timber. Next in the program was Sylvan Vale Nursery. A coastal production facility generating more than 8 million seedlings a year for a range of BC and US Pacific northwest clients.

The following day teachers visited actively managed forests where they learned about managing for Roosevelt elk, fish, and riparian values; explored research trials in big tree forests; learned about visual and aesthetic management and tourism and saw how land managed for timber can also be used by the public for recreation. Along the way they learned about the Provincial Biogeoclimatic Ecosystem Classification system used in BC, and participated in a tree identification activity and

used some tools of the trade including a suunto and an increment borer.

Many tour participants are from the Vancouver area and often return from a tour asking how they can share the forest with their students. We all know you don't have to go far from Vancouver to find a forest—so this summer the Festival of Forestry is hosting "A tour in your own backyard". It's still an adventure—but an adventure that is more accessible for teachers to return with their students.
