One other person who deserves our thanks is Ted Severence, owner of Coastal Forest Products, for allowing so many of his key staff to be out of the office making sure convention attendees had the times of their lives. There are some great folks in these two clubs and I feel fortunate to have had the chance to meet and get to know them.

Constructing Opportunities

I'd like to welcome two new members to our International board. Ray Lamari was elected Vice President and Jim Spiers has joined the board as Supreme Nine for Jurisdiction V replacing Paul Beltgens. I know I will enjoy working with both these men.

One convention item the HHI Board discussed was to continue the efforts we began last year to seek opportunities to build coalitions with other industry associations.

With this in mind, we are proud to work closely with Lee Freeman of the Temperate Forest Foundation in our support of the Teachers' Tours. Lee was a guest speaker in New Hampshire, and become one of Hoo-Hoo's newest members. Welcome, kitten.

Next, a call from North Cascade club member Fred Scheffler sparked an idea on how Hoo-Hoo could participate in the rebuilding homes that were damaged on the U.S. gulf coast by hurricanes Katrina and Rita (for the record *not* Hurricane Rita Miller). Since the convention, the president of the National Lumber & Building Materials Dealers Association (NLBMDA), Shane Conrad, and new chairman, Kevin Hancock, and I have forged an agreement for Hoo-Hoo to partner with the NLBMDA in the hurricane relief effort. Our combined efforts will channel donations to Habitat for Humanity's Gulf Coast relief effort called "Operation Home Delivery".

As a result of the combined destruction caused by hurricanes Katrina and Rita, some 75,000 homes will have to be rebuilt in the affected areas. Approximately 25,000 of these homes will require outside assistance to get them built. Because of the magnitude of the logistics required to build thousands of homes compared to the historic Habitat for Humanity model, an entirely new approach is being designed to develop a way to construct houses in these quantities by charitable organizations. These plans will be completed soon. Information on how individual members and clubs can participate will be available on the HHI website and from your Supreme Nine member within a few weeks.

The HHI Mid-year board meeting will be held in Denver, Colorado, March 9-11, 2006. This date and location were chosen so Hoo-Hoo could participate in the annual Mountain States Lumber Mountain States Lumber & Building Material Dealers Association's trade show. 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The History of Our HHI By-Laws

Over the upcoming issues of the Log and Tally, we will take each of the Articles that comprise our by-laws and endeavor to give you some of the background and history from the last 113 years that influenced their creation and their amendments.

Like most endeavors that span a long period, the mists of time can hide and/or blur the facts, so it is with some trepidation that I set forth on this journalistic voyage, and I welcome the assistance of any interested members who can contribute to the ensuing story.

Articles on by-laws have the potential of becoming very dry reading. Yawn. The by-laws themselves are written in very plain language, requiring little or no explanation. The history and events that resulted in the by-laws as we have them today, is colorful stuff, having evolved over probably the most dramatic years our countries have experienced in their histories. Two World Wars, a couple of "Conflicts", Civil Rights and Discrimination Legislation, Stock market crashes, have all added their hues to the palette of Hoo-Hoo and its by-laws.

It is interesting to note that our current by-laws show they were originally adopted and approved on January 16th, 1939 – 47 years after the creation of Hoo-Hoo. Hoo-Hoo, had fallen into decline after the crash of '29, and could have been considered virtually non-existent were it not for at least one club that met continuously, & Hoo-Hoo was re-organized, beginning in June of 1933, when a duly appointed "Reorganization Committee went to work, changed the by-laws, rewrote the ritual, and discontinued the Insurance plan".

The Committee met a couple of times later, and finally in Jan 16th, 1939, at which, apparently, the by-laws that had been changed in 1933, were officially adopted.

There were no further changes until 1968. In the ensuing years, there were no less than 19 changes made. Two changes in 76 years and then 19 changes in the last 37 years. Could this be an indicator as to how fast our societies have changed?

As the Societies in which we live, have evolved over the past 113 years, so has our Organization – sometimes we were a little slower and more reluctant to give up some of our original guidelines, but change inevitably comes, even to the most ancient of orders.

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

As he says, "A few years ago I got completely absorbed in the Osirian Cloister concept after spending some time in the archives in Gurdon. On each and every trip there I spent hours scouring through the old "BULLETIN" magazines and made copies of some of the pages that pertained to the cloister. I brought them home and studied them and became even more fascinated with the thought that went into the formation of the formation of the Cloister."

Rediscovering Hoo-Hoo's Osirian Cloister

Did'ja know there once existed, as part of our organization, a group called "The Osirian Cloister"? This gathering of dedicated members was authorized shortly after the beginning of our order through Section 2, Article V of the original Constitution of the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo, which states, "The Osirian Cloister shall constitute the Upper Chamber of Hoo-Hoo".

We have all read where Bolling Arthur Johnson and his cohorts sat on a lumber pile in Gurdon on a cold January day and conjured up the idea for a lumber fraternity – an unusual setting for such a group of scholarly men. However, with all the thought that went into the formation of the Osirian Cloister phase of our brotherhood, I have to believe the men, in this instance, were in a more comfortable and inspiring atmosphere for them to have planned an organization with details of such magnitude. I can even imagine them enjoying a libation or two in the process.

The Osirian Cloister was actually an out-growth of an earlier situation in which several members decided they needed some sort of celebration when a Snark retired from his leadership position. The archives reveal that the team of men who first gathered to conduct this ceremony called themselves "The Chamber of Horrors" and they assumed the duty of sending the retiring Snark off to his reward with great gusto and all sorts of devious behavior. Bolling Arthur Johnson alluded to this chicanery in his speech to the assembly on September 8th, 1913, in which he talked about a previous meeting in Minneapolis where the first embalming took place. He said, "At the time I was a passing Snark and they did things to me, which was the first embalmment of the Snark."

There must have been some second thoughts about the Chamber of Horrors, because he also said, "The Chamber of Horrors seemed a good thought, with a bad name" and he asked William Ellis and William Ewart, who were in attendance at the time, to explore other options.

During this same speech, Johnson opened the door to another probability by saying, "It seemed an unnatural thing that there should come in the world an order with only one degree." So from the beginning, those people who belonged to other orders wanted several more degrees added.

These two things came together and with this challenge Ellis and Ewart went to work and conceived the idea of renaming the Chamber of Horrors something truly Egyptian. Their inspiration came from a book published in 1894, titled "The Book of the Dead". This book was an English translation of the hieroglyphs in the tombs of the Pharaohs—and there they found OSIRIS! Osiris was the god of the lower world and judge of the dead to the ancient Egyptians – and a perfect connection for the name of the group whose work it was to send the Snark on his way to join the House of Ancients and his new title Ramses. From then on the group was known as "The Osirian Cloister" and it was their job to perform the task of embalming the Snark.

This was the genesis of the Osirian Cloister!

LOOKING BACK IN HISTORY

It was Ellis and Ewart who also created a Cloister ritual which was first put into practice in Detroit in conjunction with the Annual Convention in September, 1922 – two years before the Detroit Club #28 was chartered.

But the reason for the creation of the Cloister was not simply to handle the embalming of the Snark! The reason was twofold. One was to give structure to the ritual team that handled the embalming of the Snark. Secondly, and perhaps more importantly, it was to provide another level of service in our order. The second level was the entry into the Osirian Cloister and was handled through another initiation or degree.

The initiation into Hoo-Hoo back then was known as "The Degree of Friendship", one of frivolity and sometimes mayhem. The initiation into the Cloister was known as "The Degree of Immortality" and was done with the utmost solemnity. The initiations were called "degrees" during that period and that's why we still refer to those who handle the club initiations the Degree Team. It's a carry-over from that time!

Qualification for entry into the cloister was covered by "the Tablets of the Law" which read, in part, "All Vicegerent Snarks who shall have served one year in that capacity and all ex-members of the Supreme Nine with at least 2 years membership in Hoo-Hoo may be eligible to membership. The candidates were voted on by secret ballot and upon approval were put through an elaborate ceremony in what they called "The Hall of Two Truths".

Osirians wore a lapel pin, given them on completion of their degree – like the one shown here. The pin was topped by a cameo of Osiris and the bottom was made up of reeds and lotus blossoms which grew in profusion along the Nile. You can see the design in the logo on the previous page. The circular part of the pin contained our typical black cat - with his tail formed into the number nine, the "Eye of Horus", (an Egyptian God – whose claim to fame I will not go into here) and the letters O and C, for Osirian Cloister. To the best of my knowledge, Gene Zanck has in his possession the only known Osirian Cloister pin in existence.

There was much symbolism at that time! The cloister used a truncated pyramid, for instance, in some of their ceremonies – imitating the Egyptian pyramids – but with only nine courses of blocks. Again the use of the number nine.

I mention the "Eye of Horus" and the abbreviated pyramid because others have used these symbols as well. For instance, take a minute and look at the back of a U.S. dollar bill and you will find a likeness of the front and back of the Great Seal of the United States. On the back side of the seal (left), if you count the courses

of block in the pyramid you'll find 13 – representing the 13 original colonies. And if you look closely, you will find the same all-seeing "Eye of Horus" (on top of the pyramid) that was used in the Cloister pin.

This information and the dollar you hold in your hand will buy a cup of coffee most anywhere, but I thought this little bit of trivia in the midst of such ramblings might be useful for a bar bet somewhere along the line.

The management of the cloister was made up of a nine man board and it was at this point that Ellis and Ewart dug further into the depths of the Book of the Dead and gave each of them a title after one of the many Gods in vogue in ancient Egypt. For instance, there was the High Priest of Isis, the High Priest of Ptah and the High Priest of Anubus, among others.

The Cloister members assembled the day before each annual Hoo-Hoo convention where they conducted business and ended with a sumptuous banquet.

Over a couple years, starting in 1988, an attempt was made by several energetic members to reactivate the Osirian Cloister. This endeavor was short-lived but there is lasting evidence of their effort hanging in a prominent spot in the Museum in Gurdon in the form of a beautifully framed painting of Osiris in a scene called "The Final Judgment". This painting is by a noted Egyptian artist and is done in silver and gold pigments on papyrus made from the reeds of the Nile. It was purchased by those involved members and presented to the museum on March 10th, 1989.

There are several remnants of the Osirian Cloister in the museum, but none as attractive as this reminder of the important part the cloister once played in Hoo-Hoo.

N. B. Giustina L-48740

Eugene, Oregon Willamette Valley Club #33



Natale B. "Nat" Giustina of Eugene, who left a bold mark on the wood products industry died Saturday, August 13, 2005, of emphysema. He was 87.

Giustina was a retired, second generation timber baron. He helped parlay a mill that was founded in 1934 by his father and three uncles into what is now a pair of family owned companies with extensive timber holdings and a thick portfolio of real estate investments. Known as a man of great integrity, his word was always his bond, and was considered a real credit to the whole forest products industry.

Giustina was born in Portland on April 7, 1918, to Erminio and Irene Onorato Giustina. His father and three uncles emigrated from the San Vita di Cadore Province in the Italian Dolomite Alps during the early 1900s, and in 1934 founded the Giustina Bros. Planning Mill in Eugene. They eventually also operated a green veneer plant, plywood mill, sawmill and stud mill. Nat Giustina became logging manager for the operation in 1941—the year he graduated from Oregon State College (now OSU) with a degree in mechanical engineering—and took over as president and general manager of Giustina Bros. Lumber Co. in 1948. Along with his brother, Ehrman Giustina, he headed the companies until he stepped down in 1985 and passed control along to his family's next generation.

Nat joined Hoo-Hoo in 1947 and was still an active member. He was given a life membership in 1988, and at the time of his passing had the lowest Hoo-Hoo number of any member of Club 33 (L-48740). Besides Hoo-Hoo, Nate served on the boards of directors of numerous state and national wood products associations and organizations, from Associated Oregon Industries to the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, as well as the National Association of Manufacturers. He was also active in local charities.

He also remained true to his school, serving on the boards of OSU's Alumni Association, the OSU Foundation, the Board of Intercollegiate Athletics and the Trysting Tree Golf Club. He and his family have donated generously to the OSU Forestry program, requesting only that "funds be used to provide the most possible help to the forest land owners of Oregon." Giustina's donations and leadership were instrumental in OSU projects ranging from the LaSells Steward Center, which features the Giustina Gallery, to the construction of Richardson hall for the forestry program and the recent Reser Stadium expansion project. Nat Giustina received the Alumni Association's E.B. Lemon Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1981 and OSU's Distinguished Service Award in 1990.

He was also the driving force behind construction of the Trysting Tree Golf

Club, one of three renowned courses in which Giustina had a hand. He built Tokatee Golf Club on 380 acres of family-owned land in the McKenzie Valley east of Eugene beginning in 1964, and helped to spearhead the 1967 redesign of the Eugene Country Club course by famed designer Robert Trent Jones.

Nat Giustina is survived by his wife of 62 years, Jacqueline; daughters Natalie Newlove of Eugene and Irene Goldbeck of Kirkland, Washington; his son, Laraway (Larry) of Eugene; and by five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.
