


CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

THE HOUSE OF HOO-HOO AT THE CHAUTAUQUA

The Pana Historical Society recently recreated an historic event in early October - the Chautauqua. These events were held in Pana from 1900 - 1931, for 10 days, in what is now Pana's Kitchell Park. The event used to be centered on religious, political, social and sporting themes.

Pana has been rich in history and one of the things about the Chautauqua which intrigued people was the House of Hoo-Hoo at the event.

In recreating the Chautauqua, the historical society also recreated the House of Hoo Hoo as part of the festivities, drawing the interest of nearly all who intended. featured in the "House" were photos and relics of Pana's past, which included a racing cup won at the 1908 event, which was presented to Zora Ledbetter by Frank James, brother of the infamous Jesse James. Frank used to call the horse races at the event.





Some other notable people who were highlighted at the older events were Williams Jenning Bryant, John Phillips Sousa, and well-known regional preacher Billie Sunday. Bryant is shown in the middle of the above photo, seated. To the left of him is locally famous philanthropist, Capt. John Kitchell, who donated the land for the park, hence it being named after him.

Included in this year's event were a kids fishing derby, old time baseball game, pie baking contest, pie eating contest, Black Horse Native American Lodge, bike races (in lieu of horse races), and two nights of musical entertainment.





HARRIS CREEK LOGGING CAMP

It's Brad Techy (95518). I'm a member of the Vancouver Club 48. My Dad, Sig Techy, who was also a Hoo-Hoo member of the Vancouver Club 48, studied at the University of British Columbia in the Engineering Faculty. He obtained his degree in Forestry in 1948.

Sig then got hired by BC Forest Products and moved to their Harris Creek camp on Vancouver Island outside of Port Renfrew. It was east of Port Renfrew shown on the map below. He was hired as the camp engineer. Sig and my Mom (Pearl) lived in a house in the logging camp. The photo below shows the houses that were at the camp. It was quite remote. Once logs were logged, they were transported out of the camp by rail as there was no road into the camp. The rail tracks and train are at the far right in the photo below. To get in and out of the camp, you went on a speeder on the train tracks.

I was born in 1956 and spent my first 5 years of life living in the Harris Creek camp with my parents. I still remember it well. It was quite an experience! There was a big water tower up on the hill above the camp that supplied water to the camp. We used to hike up to it. It was great! The houses were also raised up on stilts so that it was easier to get into them when it snowed heavily in winter. In early 1960, we moved to Vancouver when Sig was promoted to BC Forest Products head office. He was made the logging manager. On July 3rd, 1960, our family had gone up to Squamish for the day. On the drive back home, Sig heard on the radio that the BC Forest Products sawmill in False Creek was on fire. It was a windy day and the fire was fierce. Sig quickly drove us down to the area to see what was happening. (See photo above.) The company's head office was also located next to the mill. It had become Vancouver's first 5-alarm fire in the city's history.







The mill was never rebuilt. The head office was also destroyed. It was relocated to downtown Vancouver. Over the years, Sig became the Log Supply Manager and President of Swiftsure Towing (BCFP's tugboat company). Sig retired in the mid 1980's with over 40 years at BC Forest Products.

I began my career in the tugboat industry in 1979 with Rivtow Straits. After working there for 10 years, I joined Harken Towing where I worked for 32 years. I retired 2 years ago.



JANUARY 10, 1914 - CONCATENATION 1898

This concatenation was worked up by Brother J. H. Thomas (26858), of Onalaska, Texas, his good work is highly appreciated.

The concatenation was held at Woodman hall and after the initiatory ceremonies were concluded all adjourned to the Gibson hotel, where great arrangements had been made for their entertainment. The dining room was decorated with pine and Hoo-Hoo decorations, and the menu was a most elaborate one. The Gibson Hotel Orchestra furnished the music and the affair was a very gay one. The Cats gave the hotel manager great credit for his splendid assistance.



JOHN HALKETT 100731

As much a force of nature as the trees he loved, John Halkett, born Palmerston North, New Zealand, 19/10/1946, has passed away suddenly on the afternoon of 10 October, aged 76, at his home in Potts Point, Sydney.


John Halkett was the Co-founder of Timber Media Australasia, managing director of Forestlands Consulting and the general manager of the Australian Timber Importers Federation. He wrote multiple books and scientific papers on the importance of trees and forests in the world and was a powerful font of enthusiasm and expertise for forestry in the Australasian region and beyond. If you were fortunate enough to meet John, you would quickly learn three things about him: he loved his family, he loved trees and he loved New Zealand, his birth country.

A graduate of the School of Forestry at the University of Canterbury, John's early career was as a forester in New Zealand, focusing on management. However, resource intellectual curiosity quickly led him to a wider scope, both working with industry bodies and communicating his work to a bigger audience from an early career point. He published his first book, The World of Kauri, in 1986, the same year he joined the editorial board of the New Zealand Journal of Forestry, where he was highly instrumental in modernising that august publication.

[John's books were never theoretical. The cover pic for his book, Jungle Jive was taken in the tropical jungles of Southeast Asia in 2016.] While he held senior forestry roles within the NZ Department of Conservation and also in Australia, John knew that the Australasian timber sector was never going to be selfsupporting. Accordingly, he advocated for a well-regulated but accessible international trade in timber and spent much of his career focused on the issues of importing, which he believed was a route to not only address supply needs in wealthy Western nations but to improve employment and social prospects in their poorer, tree-rich neighbours. As John wrote in a 2015 editorial, "The timber industry is not an end in itself, but a means of realising key national social, environmental, and other goals." This wasn't a theoretical stance, his career took him to roles in the United States, Canada, Papua New Guinea, Myanmar, China, Chile and elsewhere across Southeast Asia and Africa and onto the board of the Global Tree Forum.

John was a keen environmentalist of the John is survived by his daughter Jonelle and practical school. He agitated strongly against three grandchildren and much missed by his over- harvesting around the world and was wider family and the many people he took instrumental in creating legislation that under his wing throughout his life. allowed for ready trade while protecting native species, both tree and otherwise. In recent decades, he worked hard to stamp out conflict timber, whether arising out of war or illegal cartels exploiting local peoples.

Over multiple decades he helped develop a range of waste- and CO,-minimising industries in Australia, and had a dream to produce green hydrogen in the Hunter Valley. His most recent book, Planet of the Trees, was uncompromising in its condemnation of decades of laggardly political response to the perils of climate change and set out a clear agenda for urgently re-focusing the debate around carbon.



He was not, alas, optimistic that politicians would meet that challenge, saying towards the end that the most likely outcome was a planet we had vacated, "allowing trees and nature to reassert themselves - and perhaps over geological time a smarter breed of bipeds may inherit the Earth."

Vibrant and highly engaged in person, John was indefatigable when it came to pursuing his passions, which included friends, family and adventuring. A recent trip to Malaysia saw him canoeing down rivers past orangutans "Between the river and the little buggers moving, it was hard to get a good photo," he reported.

John was active in the timber sector till the very end of his life, hatching plans for a Gala Industry Dinner just hours before he died. "We need to get people in the same room, talking with each other, because that's how change happens!" he said, adding, "Plus, everybody likes a good feed..."

Born on April 12, 1934, Pete came of age in Philadelphia where he honed his love of hot rods and rolling cigarette packs into the sleeves of his white t-shirt. He served in the army during the Korean War, built fast cars and fell in love with Reba Marie Pate. He was her Prince Charming and they married in 1953. Kathleen, Jeanne, George "Pete" IV, and Suzanne followed. Pete and Marie had all sorts of adventures. Pete worked for Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company while Marie became an artist and college teacher.

They moved a lot, but finally settled in North Fort Myers, Florida surrounded by loving neighbors. Pete spent his retirement caring for everyone. He built businesses, houses, run-in sheds and a sharing house. He rejoiced in the lives of his children and his grandchildren Emma, Megen, George, Louise and Julia. He loved his dogs, the Villanova pep band, daily calls to his children, Pit Bulls and Parolees, and the UConn girls' basketball team. He never liked getting permits for anything he built, insisted on getting on the roof after having his hip replaced and, epically, jumped into an alligator-infested canal to save his beloved dog Max. It was a story that will be passed down through the generations.

Pete was a humble man who was delightfully imperfect. Except for his white hair – that was perfect.
